Santa Claus To Be Here Friday 12:30

Baylor Sued As a Result of Fatal Crash Year Ago

Georgetown, Dec. 20.—Five damage suits against Baylor university of Waco for a total of \$49,240, growing out of the athletic bus crash at Round Rock last January in which ten students were killed were filed today in district court here. Negligence on the part of the driver of the coach is alleged.

Four of the suits were filed by parents of the young men killed when an L-G. N. train struck the bus, and the fifth by an injured occupant of the bus. All of the petitions allege negligence on the part of Coach Ralph Wood and Joe Potter, driver of the bus.

Suits were as follows:

William E. Kelly, \$7,930 for his son, James Clyde Kelley; William Murray and wife, Coryell county, \$8,100 for death of their son, Willie E. Murray; Rollo Hailey and wife, Falls county, \$8,250 for the death of their son, Robert Hailey; Fred Aeres, Jr., McLennan county, passenger in the bus, \$16,500 for hospital and injuries; B. G. Walker and wife, of Coryell county, \$8,450 for death of their son.

Large Crowds View New Ford

When the new model Ford car, which was on display here in the show rooms of the Nance-Brown Motor company Tuesday afternoon and Wednesday, backed into the show rooms on South Main street Tuesday evening at 4 o'clock, standing room was at a premium in spite of the snow and rain and decidedly unfavorable weather.

The new model was advertised to be on display here Wednesday and Thursday and but few people knew of the change of dates. The new car that was on display here was a 2-door, dawn gray sedan and was driven here from Merkel by S. H. Nance, accompanied by J. C. Mosley, a special representative of the Ford Motor company, and Gerald Black of the Nance-Brown company, and despite the rain, snow and mud the arrival of the new car was delayed only thirty minutes and a part of this time was consumed in washing it up and preparing it for the exhibition floor. Mr. Nance, who was at the wheel on the trip, stated that after they passed Bradshaw and got on the gravel highway, the car was pushed up to sixty miles per hour, and at this speed it was wonderful the way the car responded. During the local exhibition orders for the new model were taken at a brisk rate, and there's no way of telling just how many people viewed and complimented the new car.

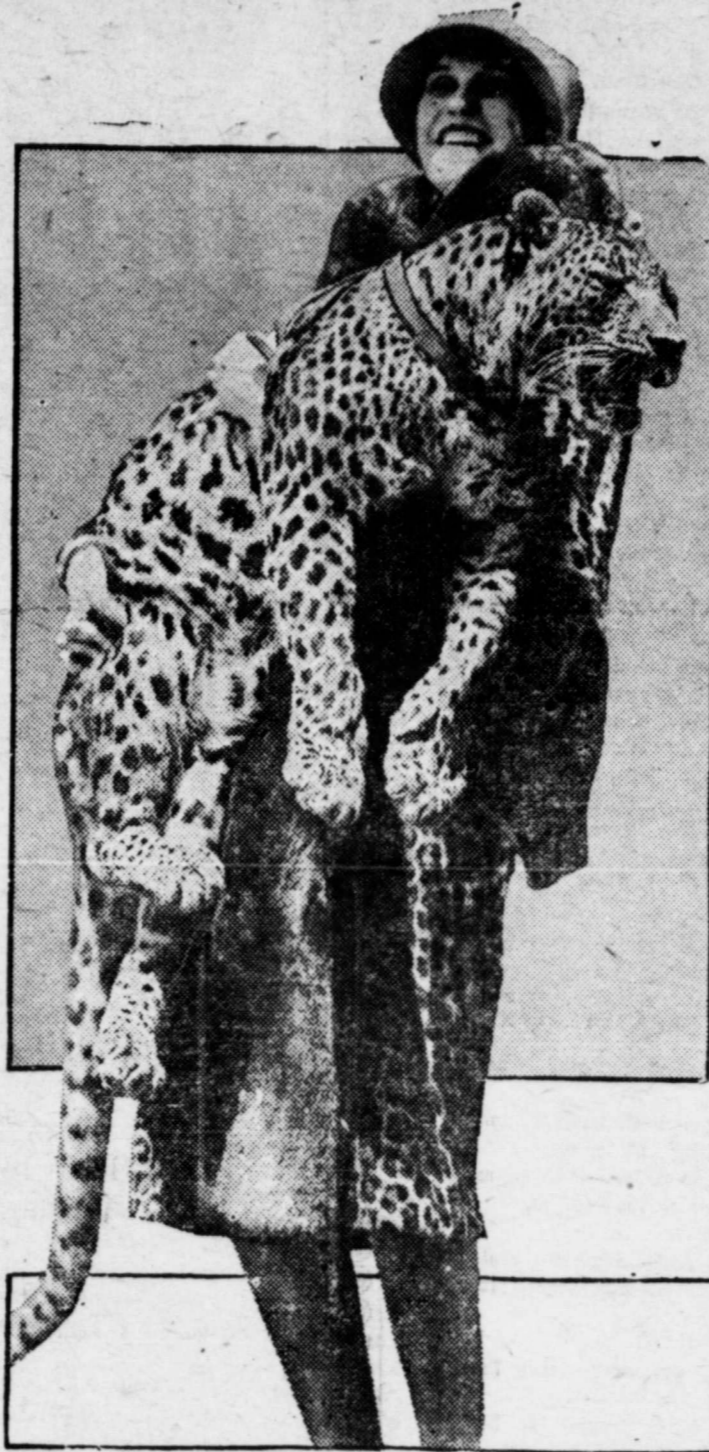

In 1897 there appeared in the New York Sun a letter from a little girl, asking if there really was a Santa Claus. An editorial writer, Frank P. Church, replied to the little girl's letter, and his editorial has come to be regarded as one of the classics of modern Christmas literature.

The letter:

"Dear Editor: I am 8 years old. Some of my little friends say there is no Santa Claus. Papa says, 'If you see it in the Sun it's so.' Please tell me the truth; is there a Santa Claus?"

"Virginia O'Hanlon."

The reply:

"Virginia, your little friends are wrong. They have been affected by the skepticism of a skeptical age. They do not believe except they see. They think that nothing can be which is not comprehensible to their little minds. All minds, Virginia, whether they be men's or children's, are little. In this great universe of ours man is a mere insect, an ant, in his intellect, as compared with the boundless world about him, as measured by the intelligence capable of grasping the whole truth and knowledge.

"Yes, Virginia, there is a Santa Claus. He exists as certainly as love and generosity and devotion exist, and you know that they abound and give to your life its highest beauty and joy. Alas! How dreary would be the world if there were no Santa Claus! It would be as dreary as if there were no Virginias. There would be no child-like faith then, no poetry, no romance to make tolerable this existence. We should have no enjoyment except in sense and sight. The eternal light with which childhood fills the world would be extinguished.

"Not believe in Santa Claus! You might as well not believe in fairies! You might get your papa to hire men to watch in all the chimneys on Christmas Eve to catch Santa Claus, but even if they did not see Santa Claus coming down, what would that prove? Nobody sees Santa Claus, but that is no sign that there is no Santa Claus. The most real things in the world are those that neither children nor men can see. 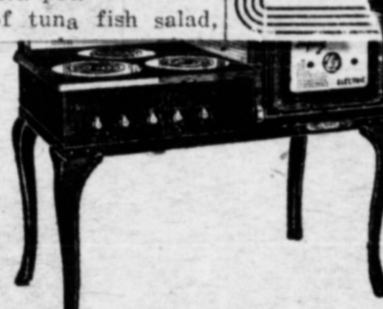

The Story of an Adventure- Seeking American Boy

WAR hero and soldier of fortune, Bennett J. Doty, who started out from his home in Mississippi to seek adventure, is now living the hardest chapter of his colorful career.

Fighting against the Rifian tribesmen in the wastes of Morocco, this young American must fight hard, and he must live. He must clear his reputation from the ugly charge of "abandoning his post in the face of armed rebels," he must vindicate himself in the eyes of his officers and a tough bunch of fellow troopers, and he must quiet his own conscience by serving out his term of enlistment in the French Foreign Legion.

The service is hard, the discipline relentless and the conditions uncomfortable. Only a true soldier of fortune, with the stuff of a Richard Harding Davis or Rudyard Kipling hero, could carry on.

Doty carried on for over a year in Syria, until "a wave of homesickness forced him to absent himself without leave." Under military law he should have been put to death, but his fine record with the A. E. F., where he served with the 30th Division as an artilleryman and was decorated with the Croix de Guerre for valor, won him clemency and he was sentenced to eight years in prison.

He Has the Courage
The charge of cowardice played no part in Doty's conviction. He wasn't a coward. Time and again he has proved his courage in hardship and in the face of fire. But he was homesick and with strange companions. The heat and the loneliness of the desert cut down his moral strength. He had a passing period of weakness. He left his duty and his fellows. He has been sorry ever since and ashamed of that transitory weakness.

Now he is determined to prove himself again. After 13 months of hard labor in a military prison he is glad to be back with his regiment. He welcomes those old conditions and is determined this time that they won't get the better of him.

Rather an active life, this young man looks back upon, but no more so than the life he faces. He may be Bennett Doty to his folks back home, but in the Foreign Legion he is Gilbert Clare, the name under which he enlisted. But his officers and fellows don't care what his name is or where he came from or what connections he has outside. That's the code of the Foreign Legion, which has been called the "Legion of the Damned." No questions are asked. The only demands are that a man must fight. And there is no way out except the two the Legion recognizes. One is an honorable discharge at

the completion of the enlistment. The other is death.

Doty's friends are trying to get him released from his service. Probably he doesn't know about their activities, and perhaps he would resent them, but if Doty is released his will be a very extraordinary case. Such a thing almost never happens in the Legion. The American State Department is practically powerless to intervene because Doty, by joining the French Legion, automatically ceased to be an American citizen. He is a man without a country.

The men of the Legion come drifting from many countries, for reasons best known to themselves. Since the war a large proportion of the members have been Germans. With their courage they have pride, and probably many of them wouldn't think so much of Doty if he did accept release under the present circumstances.

Sure of Enough Action
When the French are in a fight the Foreign Legion is sure to be there. And there is nearly always fighting somewhere along the far-away frontiers of France. Doty joined his regiment at Sidi Bel Abbes, in Algeria, but he is almost sure of service in the hills this winter.

He may even go back to Syria, for the natives are again showing signs of restlessness and something may have to be done about it. If so, the Foreign Legion will do it. Doty may be able to vindicate himself in the land where he weakened once.

Doty enlisted for eight years, but this enlistment period may under certain circumstances, be cut to five. Doty has nearly four more years to serve. If he lives through it his thirst for adventure will probably be satiated.

WANTS STATE HIGHWAY TO CONDEMN LAND

Raymondville, Tex., Dec. 21.—(UP)—A matter of probably far reaching importance took form this week when a resolution was presented the Raymondville Liverite Club by Judge Davis E. Decker and unanimously endorsed, seeking the passage of legislation at the next state legislature to empower the state highway commission to condemn lands for a highway when the county commissioners of a county refuse to do so.

The resolution was aimed primarily at Kenedy county which is accused of blocking the progress of the Hug-the-Coast highway. It is charged that in Kenedy county some of the ranchmen are opposed to construction of the highway. The proposed law would empower the highway commission to condemn lands for the highway through Kenedy county.

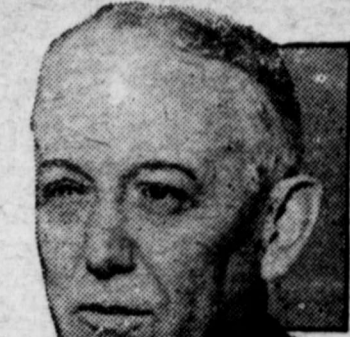
