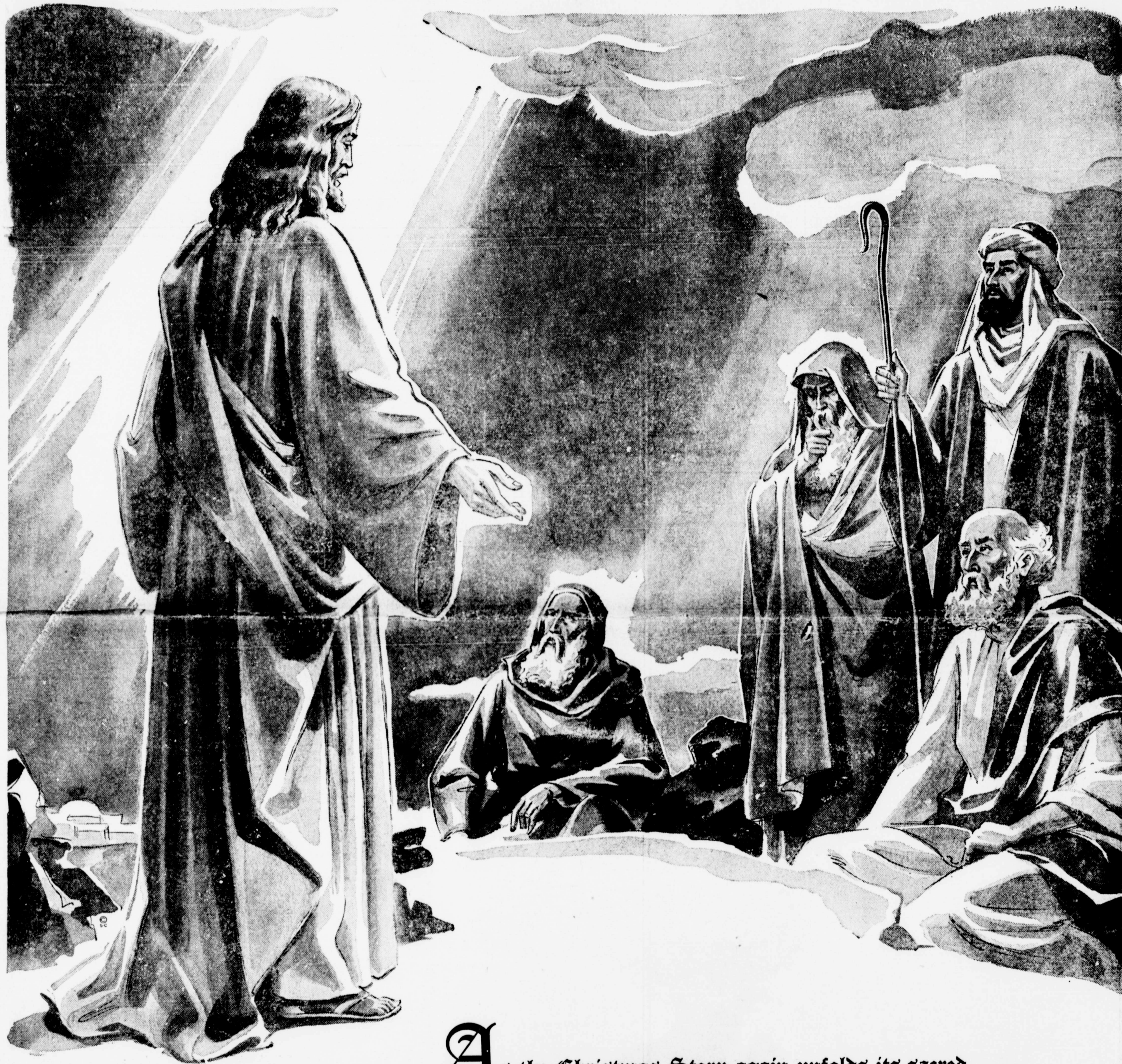

SLAUGHTER CALVES SCARCE AND HIGHER

FT. WORTH — Cattle trade was active and prices strong to unevenly higher Monday at Ft. Worth. The scarcity of the better kinds of fat calves, which has become more and more pronounced in recent weeks, led to some sharp gains for that class.

Slaughter calves drew 50 cents to \$1 higher prices, the most of the advance on the choice grades. Fed steers and yearlings were stronger with some sales 25 to 50 cents up on fat mature steers.

Cows, bulls and stockers and feeders enjoyed active trade and steady to strong prices.

Good and choice slaughter calves cleared at \$14.50 to \$19, with some fancy fed calves to \$20. Common and medium slaughter kinds sold from \$10 to \$13, and culls sold from \$7 to \$10.

Packers reported cattle grubs were more in evidence this year than last and in most cases ten per cent more calves are showing "grubby" backs than a year ago.

All packers discount grubby calves and it is a heavy loss to cattle producers. Your County Agent can give you a simple remedy to clear them up, or your local feed store or drug store can likely furnish a remedy.

The few cents it costs to rid calves of these grubs can mean as much as \$5 to \$10 per head, since grubby calves everywhere sell around \$1 to \$3 per hundred under those without grubs.

Good and choice stocker steer calves sold from \$16 to \$20, and stocker steer yearlings sold from \$19.50 down. Stocker cows drew \$7 to \$10.

Fat steers and yearlings of good

and choice kinds sold from \$19 to \$23.50, while plain and medium sorts sold from \$12 to \$18, and some canner yearlings sold from \$9 to \$11.

Fat cows cleared at \$8.50 to \$11, and canners and cutters sold from \$5 to \$9. Bulls drew \$8 to \$12.00 odd head above or below that range.

HOGS STAGE WEAK RALLY, TOP \$18.25

Butcher hogs were around 25c higher and top hogs sold freely at \$18.25 at Ft. Worth Monday. Less desirable kinds because of heavy or lighter weights, or medium finish of fat backed kinds, sold from \$16.50 to \$18. Sows sold from \$14 to \$16.

LAMBS WEAKEN AS TRADE STILL SPOTTY

The lamb trade was again an off-again and on-again affair at Ft. Worth Monday. Monday was the "off" day it seems and most slaughter and feeder lambs were 25 to 50 cents lower.

Last week the trade jumped around 50 cents lower to 50 cents higher, to 50 cents lower, etc., from day to day and apparently this situation was going to prevail again—judging from the start Monday.

Fat lambs of the good or choice variety cashed at \$16 to \$18, and cull, common and medium sorts sold from \$10 to \$15.50.

Stocker and feeder lambs sold from \$12 to \$16. Old bucks cashed at \$3 to \$4. Old ewes sold from \$4.50 to \$5.50, and are quotable to \$6 or better on the right kind of smooth light choice fat kinds.

Old wethers drew \$7 to \$10.

It was announced at Ft. Worth today that the market will be open for business as usual on Dec. 24. Market spokesmen take the position that livestock producers may have some stock they need

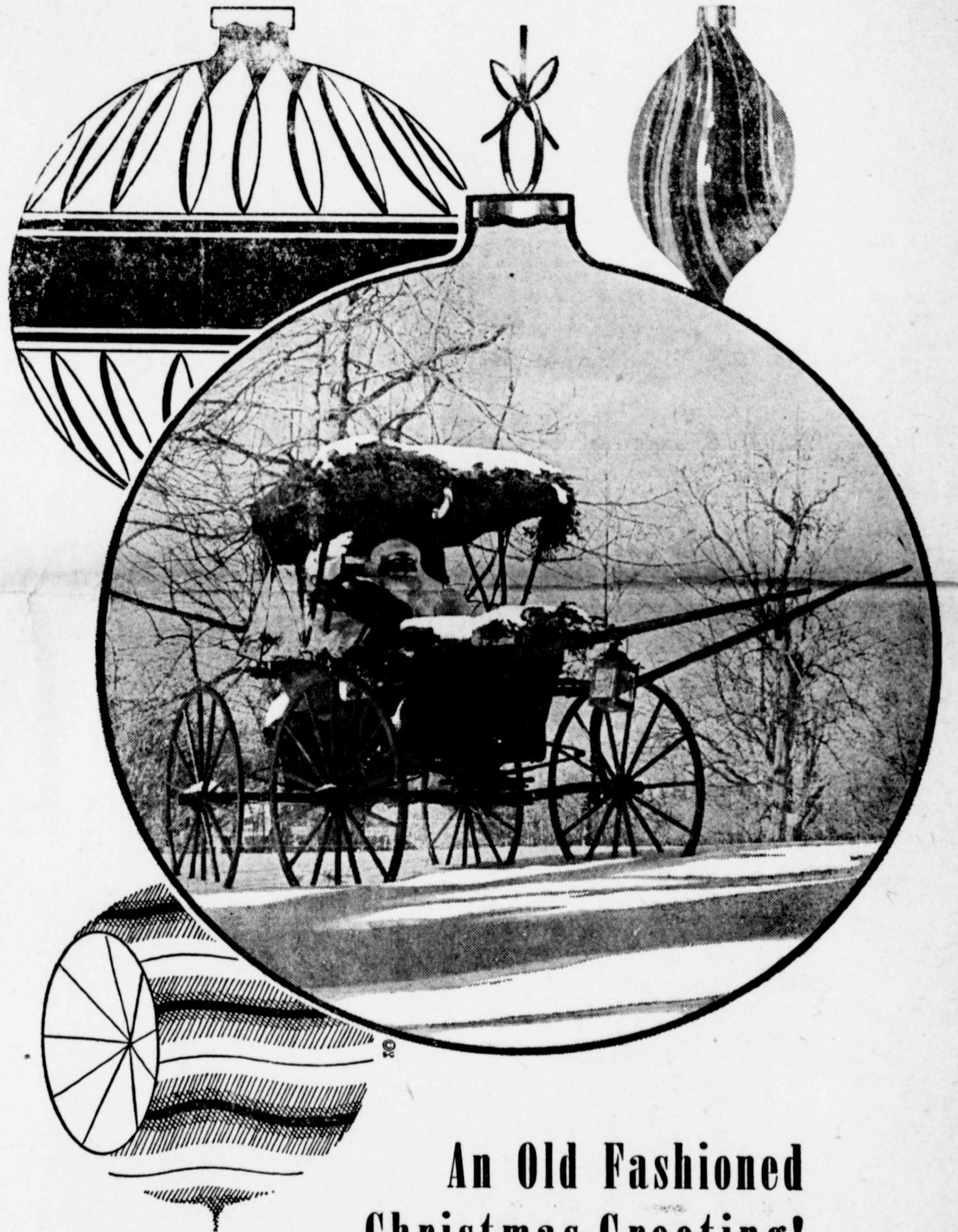

ette lighters and other dangerous objects safely out of their reach.

As long as your company stays keep these safety tips in mind:

1. If you're heating more rooms than usual, don't try to "force" your furnace if it won't take the added load. Call an experienced repairman instead.

2. Keep portable heaters away from combustibles, and also out of people's way.

3. Keep order in the kitchen. Several extra people all offering to help can cause a "traffic jam" in which someone may lean too far over a lighted burner, or tip over a pot of scalding liquid.

4. If more electrical appliances than usual are being used—space heaters, for example—don't overload circuits. Fifteen ampere fuses are the safe size for most household circuits, and if a fuse blows some appliances should be switched to another outlet.

Guests have responsibilities, too. If you are going to be a guest instead of a host, see that you and your entire family are on your best fire safety behavior. It is also wise to be prepared for an emergency. Just as you always note the location of the nearest fire escape in a hotel, when you are an overnight guest in someone's home figure out two ways of reaching the ground from the room in which you sleep.

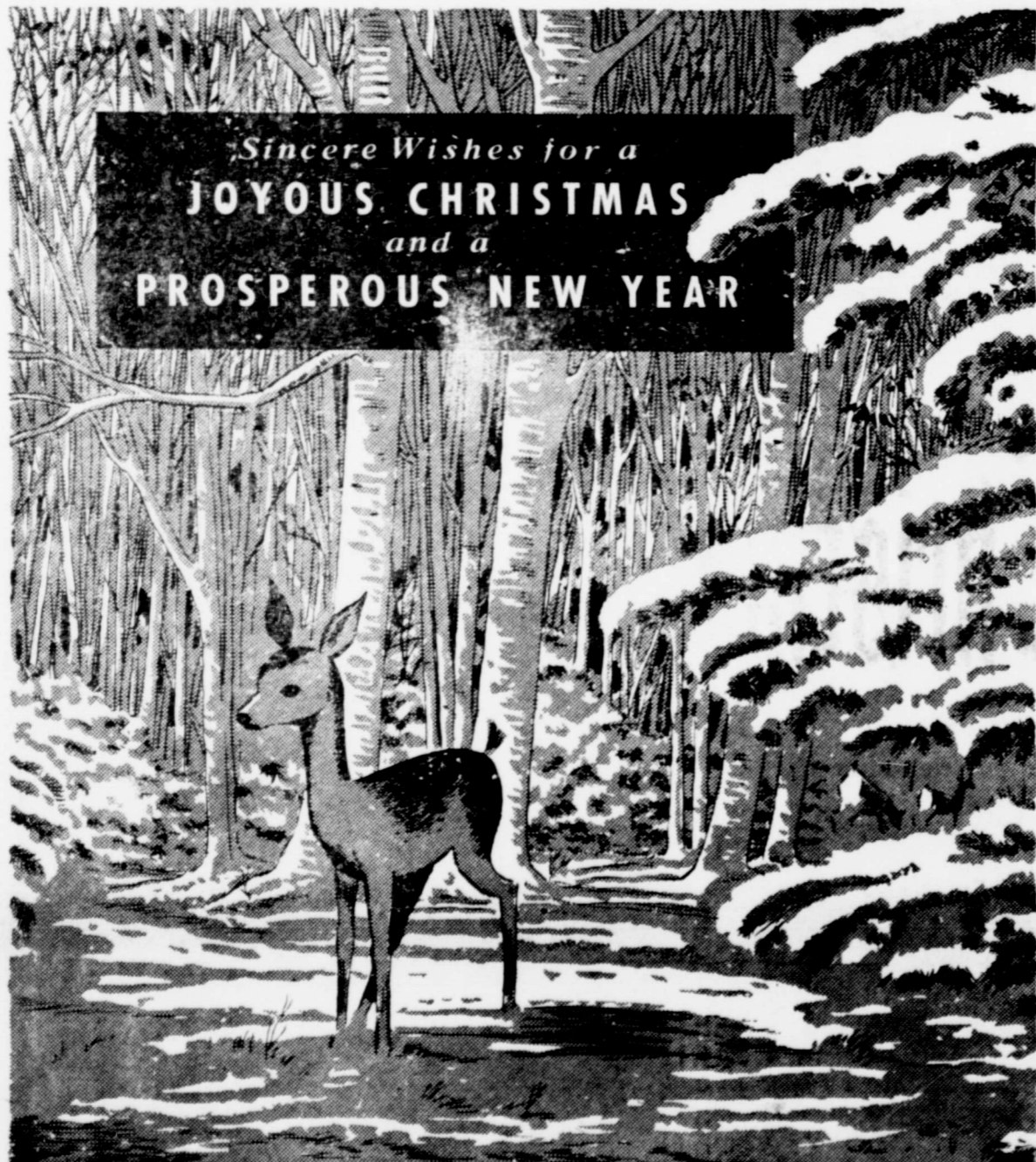

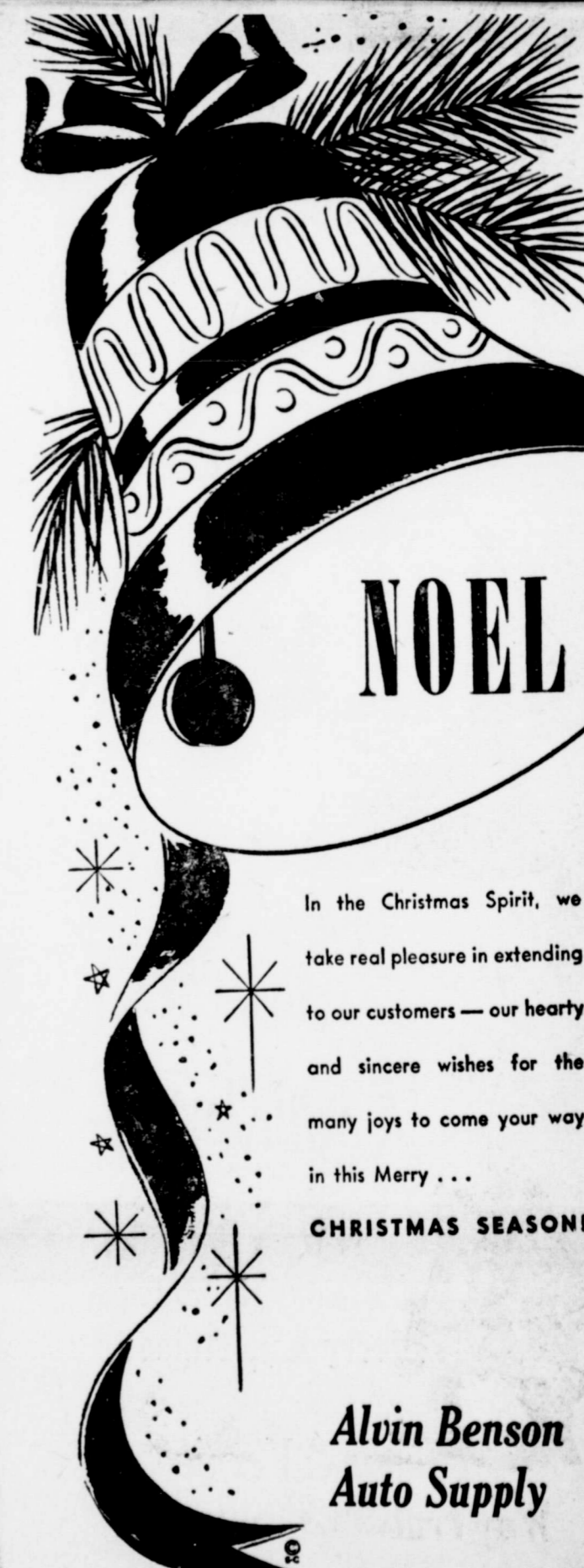

BABSON DISCUSSES CHURCH MONEY RAISING

During 1936-1938 the Moderator of the National Council of Congregational and Christian Churches made a revolutionary suggestion for raising money. He combined a religious and business appeal. His words then fell on barren soil. The leaders of the great church denominations called his suggestions "sacrilegious." He had preceded them with two books published by the Macmillan Company entitled "Enduring Investments" and "Religion and Business."

FEELINGS HAVE CHANGED SINCE

If you will turn to page 7 of Time Magazine for October 11, 1954, you can read a most remarkable advertisement of a Church Money-Raising Organization. I don't know anyone connected with this group. Hence, this column is not to help its business in any way. The advertisement, however, says that a spiritual revolution is simmering.

Every reader must know of the universal habit of the members of certain churches to give one-tenth of their income to their church. The members of most churches, however, are—in plain English—stingy. They try to get by with giving as little money as possible to the Lord's work. Too many will not give until person-

ally asked. This requires organized campaigns and personal calls. Then, when solicited, they give as little as possible and still retain their social standing.

NEW APPEALS FOR MONEY RAISING

This attitude is changing in a marvelous manner. It makes me hopeful for the years ahead because, fundamentally, business prosperity is dependent on our spiritual growth. The modern church canvasser no longer begs. He now merely says: "Statistics show that your family, your business, and your community will prosper in accordance with that you and others GIVE. I am asking you to subscribe to an enduring investment. The more you invest therein the more you will get out."

This new concept is not based upon "how much the church needs," but upon the fact that you and I need to give more in order to offset our sins and develop spiritual power. It links up personal prayer with a giving campaign and makes giving a form of prayer, meditation, and worship. The Catholic Church has long preached this; but most Protestant Churches are just awakening. The reaction is not "How much will I give to the deserving, but what will I give in order that I, myself, may live?" The giver is taught to understand

that the more he gives in proportion to his income, the better off spiritually he himself will be.

SAME PRINCIPLE APPLIES TO YOUR BUSINESS AND JOB

I, however, am interested in this Revolution in Fund Raising for a far greater reason. These "New Look" giving campaigns are led by successful businessmen who start off with large personal gifts, more than they have ever given before. They give principally for their own spiritual growth and not just to help a needy cause. But does it occur to them to apply the same principles to their own business?

I believe some physicians and other professional men have this desire to give every day of the week. Also some insurance and other salesmen pray about their work. But how many manufacturers or merchants make their business a part of their spiritual worship? How many church mem-

bers, holding jobs in factories, have in mind the buyer who is to use the product they are making? I forecast that the time will come when both employer and employee will pray for the consumers and costumers. If this appeal of these modern Fund Raisers could extend to our everyday jobs, think what could happen! An economic revolution would take place equal only to the great Renaissance (1400 through 1600). And based upon past history, another such may soon be due.

In fact, the Church Canvasser who calls upon us with this new message may be blazing the way for a new spiritual Renaissance. According to cycle theory, history must repeat itself—for good things as well as for evil things. Furthermore, there are many different cycles always in operation. It is the dominant one which will affect us. Perhaps that will begin with a new attitude toward giving—not only to our Church and

Watch For Turkey Cutback In 1955

COLLEGE STATION — Turkey raisers have an eye on reduced production in 1955 because of today's low prices.

Such a trend is expected after a record 61,045,000 birds this year, says John G. McHaney, extension agricultural economist. The extent of cutback in 1955 depends upon the number of breeder hens for hatching egg production, says the economist.

Sixteen per cent more light-breed birds and about six percent more heavy type turkeys were fed out this year. Prices, generally are five to six cents a pound below last year.

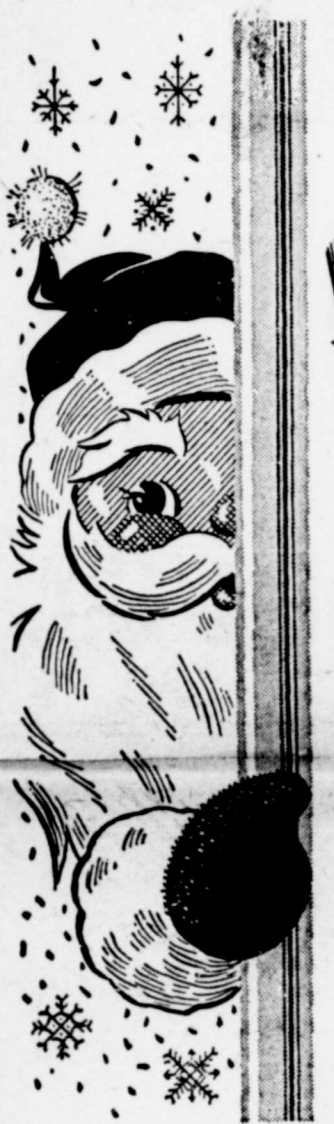

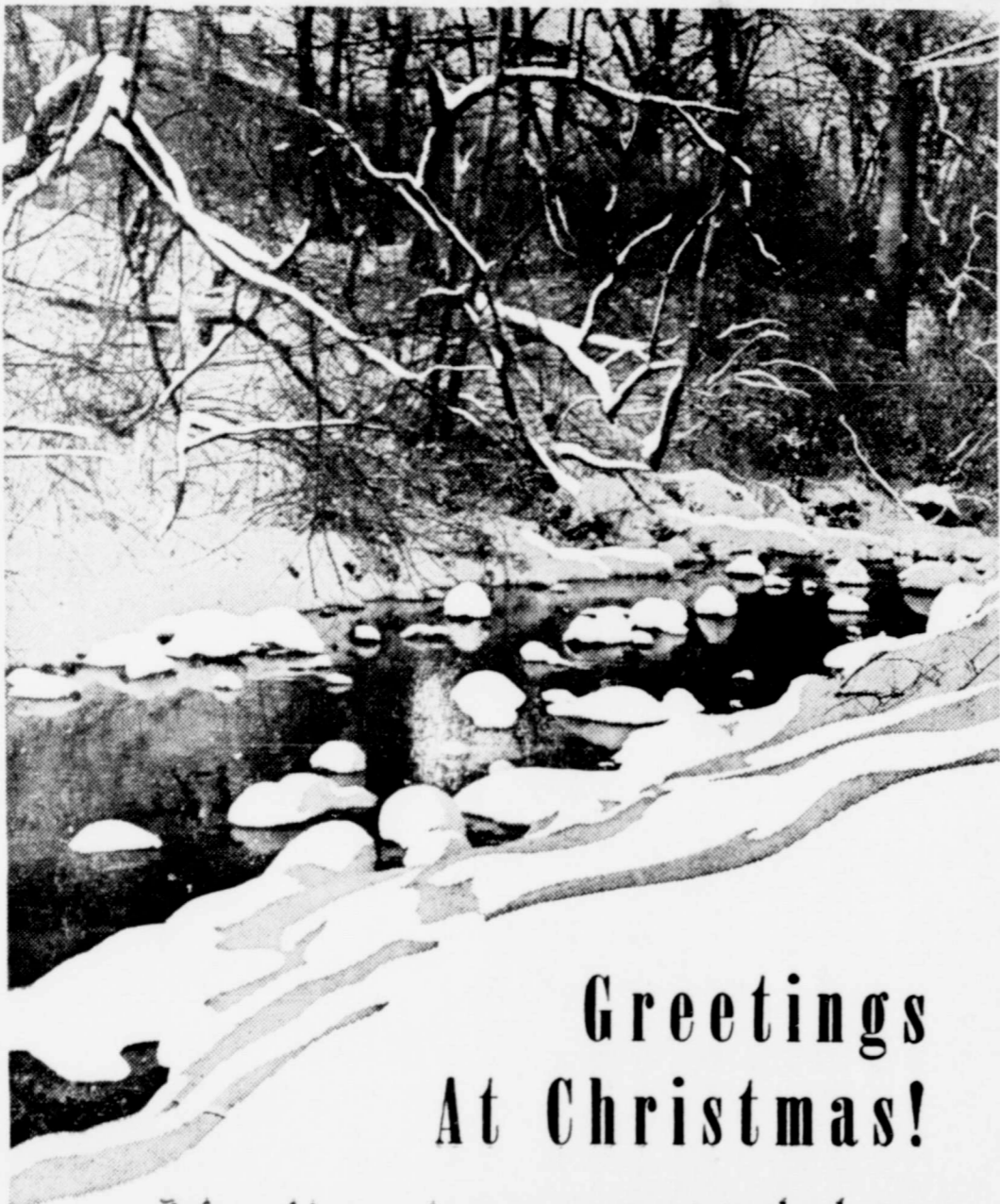

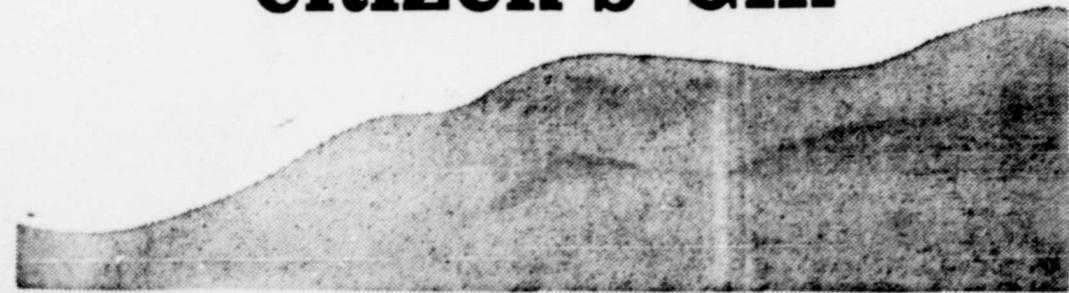

Substantial Increase In WAVE Enlistment Announced By Officer

Lieutenant James R. Meldrum, USN, the Officer in Charge of the Houston Navy Recruiting District, announced today a substantial increase in the WAVE enlistment allowance for this area, due to the Navy's intensified plan to bring to full authorized strength the complement of women in the Navy. Previously, only two or three women could be enlisted in the program each month from South Texas, creating long waiting lists.

The Recruiting Officer said that women in the Navy are offered

the same advantages as the men and that they may qualify for advancement in almost every rating group. WAVES are given the opportunity to compete in the 1-100 separate Navy job specialties covering 27 major career fields, or ratings listed under 12 occupational groups.

In order to qualify, women must (a) be between 18 and 26 years of age, (b) be unmarried, (c) have no dependents, (d) have a high school education, or pass a high school equivalency test, and (e) be able to pass mental and physical examinations. More detailed information may be obtained from your local Navy Recruiting Station at Post Office Building in San Angelo, Texas.

Bethlehem, Holy City Still Filled With Poor And Homeless

As they have done since the first Christmas, Christians will this year follow the Star to the stable-grotto beneath the Church of the Nativity, the traditional birthplace of Jesus of Nazareth in Bethlehem.

Always small and poor, Bethlehem is even poorer today than most people would believe. A recent visitor said, "Wanderers fill the streets—anyone can see why Mary and Joseph found no room in the inn."

Last Christmas, shepherds watching their flocks outside Bethlehem had to be especially watchful lest the sheep trap themselves in the barbed wire of the narrow no-man's land separating Jordan and Israel. Bethlehem, on the Jordan side of the wire, has as well been sorely affected by the hostility and the uneasy truce. It is crowded with Arab refugees who formerly lived in Israel.

The effect of the conflict has been crippling of Bethlehem's chief industry, the making and selling of objects of piety from olive wood, Dead Sea stone and mother of pearl. Except at Christmas, pilgrims are so few that the profits had gone from the business.

On Christmas Eve, however, the

dusty city takes on new life. Christmas diplomats living in divided Jerusalem expect to be escorted to the little town over the unused highway through no-man's land. Pilgrims rich and poor alike, worship together in the fourth century Church of the Nativity. There is a High Mass, during which the image of the Christ Child is carried from the Church through a series of underground chapels.

The ceremonies come to a climax before three adjacent shrines. The Altars of the Nativity, the Wise Men and the Manger. Outside, Christians from many lands will sing as angels sang nearly 2,000 years ago: "Glory to God in the Highest, and on Earth Peace, Good Will Toward Men."

Yuletide Observed Around The World With Each Country Having Their Own Customs And Methods Of Celebrating

MEXICO

A pretty custom of Mexico is the game of the "pinata" in which the children find great joy. The "pinata" is an elaborate and colorful earthenware bowl resembling a face or an animal, filled with fresh fruit, peanuts, candy and good luck charms. The children gather around in a circle and one after another is blindfolded and has his turn at breaking the "pinata." After many attempts, it is finally broken, and the scramble begins with each child keeping whatever he manages to find.

BULGARIA

A large round cake, called KRAVAI, which is decorated with

the figures of a bird, a flower, and a cross breaks the two week fast on Christmas Day the children receive their gifts from Grandpa Koleda—the Bulgarian Santa Claus. The father of the family brings in the yule log, while the other members of the family sprinkle him with corn—a custom which is followed to bring health to all and a plentiful crop the following year.

HOLLAND

In order to provide food and water for St. Nick's good white horse on Christmas Eve, the little children of Holland stuff their clean wooden shoes with hay and carrots and place them on the

window sills with a dish of water alongside them. The children are always pleased on Christmas to see that St. Nick has replaced the hay and carrots with small gifts and toys.

CZECHOSLOVAKIA

Christmas to the people of Czechoslovakia means the ending of all quarrels and the beginning of a new year among friends. It is the custom for all people to visit their friends and foes and forgive any misunderstandings that may have arisen during the year. A legend still believed in is the belief that St. Nick descends from a golden cord, led by a white-clad angel.

NORWAY

One of the most charming customs of Norway is the remembrance of the animals and birds since they were the only ones present at the birth of the Holy Babe. The farm beasts are carefully tended and the cattle are given extra fodder. The especially gleaned sheafs saved from the fall harvest, is placed on top of a

There are Scandinavian, French and ancient Egyptian legends which claim to have given the Christmas tree to the world. The first authentic mention of a Christmas tree is of one in Strasbourg, Germany, 1605.

Christmas south of the equator falls in midsummer. Thus the decorations are fresh flowers and the goodies often are fruits taken direct from the trees.

Christmas cakes, iced cookies and other goodies are survivals of the old custom of giving confectionery gifts to the Senators of Rome.

The hanging up of the mistletoe and the burning of the Yule log are two of the most ancient customs which come from our pagan ancestors.

He was a retired farmer and had been a resident of Runnels County since 1920.

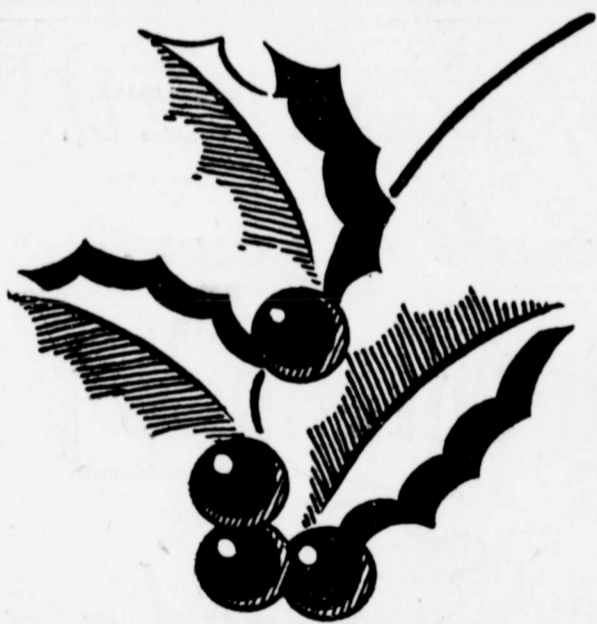
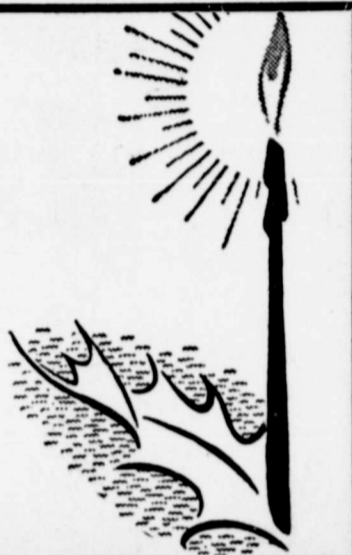
