The fishing was good, but the catching left something to be desired. The water is still too cold, some say; the moon is not right, others say; still others claim the wind has been blowing from the wrong direction. Be that as it may, the important thing was that the sun was shining, and a man could throw out a line and lean back and relax.

Fishing and water sports seem to be taking a more important place in the scheme of living of most everyone, and it's a rare family which does not have at least one or two fishing or boating enthusiasts. And a big percentage of the automobiles on the roads and highways within 50 miles of any sizeable body of water will be pulling boats. A boat parked in the carport has become about as familiar a sight as a car. Water skis are part of the paraphernalia of most teenagers—however, this sport seems to know no age limit.

This probably is a good thing, the interest and enthusiasm in water sports. It has a tendency to bring the family together—something in which all can participate. But this "togetherness" has its drawbacks: How can a man commune with nature and himself while putting worms on hooks for the kids and the wife?

Fishing has always been considered one of the most popular participating outdoor sports. As far as we are concerned, the fishing has been a participating affair, but the catching has always been strictly a spectator sport.

We understand that one of the projects of the Winters Sportsmen Club this year will be the rebuilding of the docks at the new lake. The old docks have about fallen apart, and the ambition is a worthy one.

Each year many people are bilked out of hard-earned dollars by some smooth-talking stranger who proposes to fix the roof, paint the house, or sign up residents for other services or contracts. It's always best to check with the city before making any agreements with these peddlers and "servicemen," Jones said.

Drove up to Sweetwater over the weekend and viewed the many hundreds of snakes brought in during the Rattlesnake Round-Up. By the time we had our fill of watching the writhing mass of rattlers the hunters had dumped into pits, they had brought in upwards of 5,000 — reports later stated that more than 6,000 snakes had been caught and brought in to the Sweetwater Coliseum. Even heard one report of a harmless grass snake getting caught and dumped in with the rattlers — they took him out and released him, but he'll probably never be the same again.

We got busy and didn't get up there in time for the rattlesnake steak feed, though.

There was a fellow up there who jumped over into the pit with all those snakes, and started poking around. He caught some of them and demonstrated the technique of extracting the venom from their fangs, and explained that rattlers shed their fangs periodically — but have as many as seven sets which take the place of the discarded ones. He also explained — for what good it might do — that when a rattler strikes, it's not mad — just frightened! He said that if one rattler is seen, there probably are more around, and advised that a person hearing one stand motionless, and then pick out a safe, clear path to get out of the vicinity.

## Will Discuss Tax Method to Finance Valley Creek Dams

A public hearing to discuss methods of taxation to finance construction and maintenance of structures in the Valley Creek Water Control District has been called for April 19 by the board of directors of the district, it was announced this week.

The meeting will be held in the Wingate School Auditorium beginning at 7:30 p. m. and any person who is a taxpayer in the district may appear and offer testimony to show what plan of taxation would be most equitable.

The following propositions will be discussed:

1. Shall taxes to pay off construction bonds and for maintenance, operation and administrative costs of the district be assessed, levied and collected upon the ad valorem basis?
2. Shall taxes be assessed, levied and collected on the basis of the assessment of specific benefits?
3. Shall taxes be assessed, levied and collected upon the basis of assessment of benefits at an equal sum per acre of land?
4. Shall the taxes be assessed and levied on the ad valorem basis as to some part of the total tax required, and upon the basis of assessment of benefits as to some parts of the total tax required, or as to some defined part of, or property within, the district?

## SCS Has Okayed Survey of Valley Creek Watershed

The State Soil Conservation Board has approved a request for a survey of the watershed of the Valley Creek Water Control District, according to information released this week by Hugo Vogel-sang, chairman of the board of directors of the district.

Vogelsang was told that a state engineering party would be here during the first part of May to begin making work plans, which will take about six months and cost \$40,643.

After the work plan is completed, it will be reviewed by state engineers and will be sent to the Soil Conservation Department in Washington, D. C.

The federal government will bear the actual cost of construction of dams and lakes in the district, it was said.

The water control district, however, must pay for the land covered by the lakes and for easements on waterways, damage to roads and for incidental items.

## School Science Fair Is Slated For Wednesday

About 400 projects in six separate divisions will be exhibited by Winters public school pupils in the annual Science Fair scheduled for next Wednesday, March 30, in the high school gymnasium.

All grades of Winters' school, from grade 4 through 12, will be represented in the fair, featuring biological sciences and physical sciences.

Each of the sciences will be divided into three divisions, the Intermediate Division, grades 4 through 6; Junior Division, grades 7 through 9; and Senior Division, grades 10 through 12.

Two winners in each division will take their projects to the regional fair in Brownwood on April 8. Winners at the regional fair take their projects on the National Science Fair.

In connection with the local Science Fair, there will be an atomic energy exhibit sponsored by the Oak Ridge Institute of Nuclear Studies. This exhibit should prove of interest to students and adults alike, school officials said.

The gym and exhibits will be open Wednesday morning at 8:30, for visitors, and remain open until 7 p. m. Judges will be furnished by the science department of Hardin-Simmons University.

## Census Takers To Attend Training Sessions Soon

Census takers who will visit every dwelling unit in the area during the 1960 Census of Population and Housing which starts April 1 will participate in four training sessions next week. District Supervisor W. G. Stacy announced this week.

The training sessions, to be conducted by the crew leaders, will be held on March 28, 29, 30 and 31 for Runnels County. Each census taker will receive a total of approximately nine hours of instruction. Emphasis will be placed on the importance of a systematic, thorough canvass of every dwelling unit during the census to insure a complete count. Class room training will cover proper manner of asking questions, use of the Census questionnaire, Census definitions, and map reading.

Map reading is an important census-taking technique, since, without maps, defining the limits of each district to which a census taker is assigned, the job would be a welter of confusion. About 25,000 maps have been prepared for the 1960 census. This provides an individual map for each of the 250,000 districts into which the country has been divided for the census. Every census taker will be furnished with a map of his district. As they make their rounds census takers will be required to canvass every street and road and visit every housing unit within the boundaries of their assignments shown on these maps.

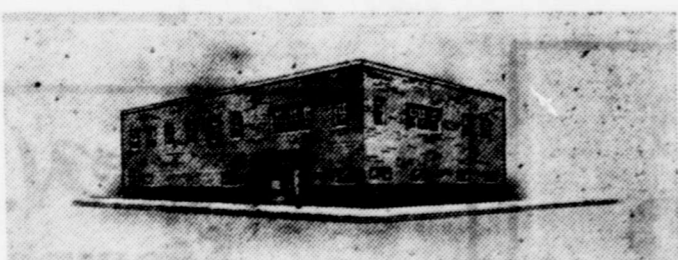

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## Amusements Coming to Local Theatres

**AT THE STATE THEATRE**  
"Career"  
It isn't often that one motion picture story boasts the four equally important, equally colorful characters contained in "Career," the new Hal Wallis Paramount production opening at the State Theatre Friday and Saturday. ## Range Land Should Be Allowed To Rest For Better Grasses

"Now is the time to make plans for deferring pastures," states H. Giesecke Jr., member of the Runnels Soil Conservation District Board of Supervisors. According to records, the rainfall in this area is higher during April, May and June. "Deferments during this period will allow the grasses to make effective use of this moisture," says Giesecke.

Rangeland should be allowed to rest for 60 to 90 days during the growing season about every third year, according to James Glynn of the Soil Conservation Service. This allows the better grasses such as sideoats grama, little and cane bluestem and buffalograss to mature and make seed. Under complete deferment, these grasses increase rapidly to provide a high quality vegetative cover. This cover will protect the range from wind and water erosion and provide more and better grazing.

Glynn pointed out that deferments should be applied to the better pastures first, as they will make the fastest improvement. Care should be taken to prevent other pastures from being overgrazed while pasture is being rested.

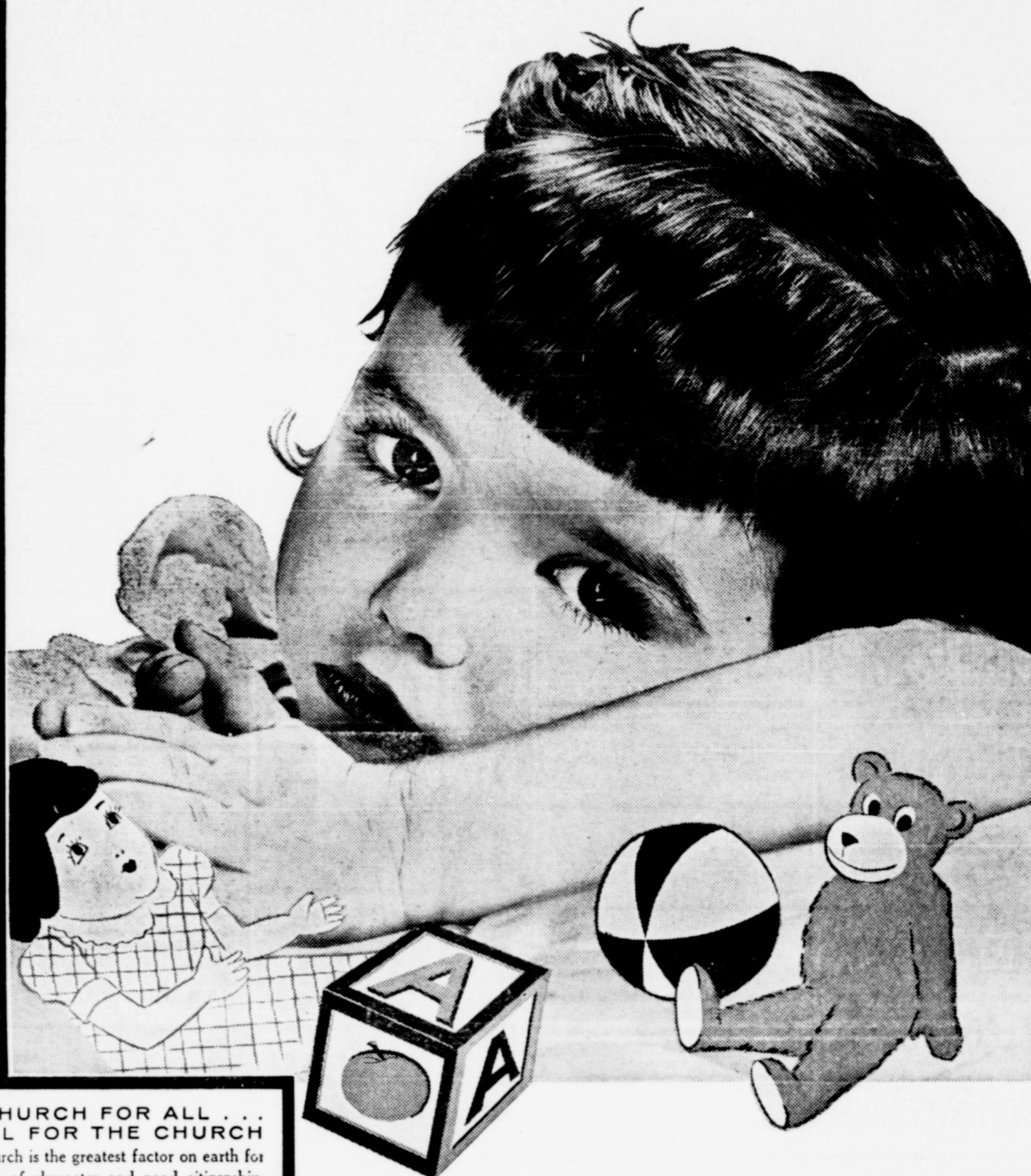

WHEREAS, an election has been duly and legally held in said District on the 6th day of February, 1960, for the purpose of authorizing the issuance of bonds for the purpose of acquiring the funds necessary to purchase, construct, acquire, improve, and repair dams or other structures or permanent improvements and the acquisition of land, easements, rights-of-ways, properties or equipment which may be needed to utilize, control, and distribute any waters that may be impounded, diverted, or controlled by the District, and any other expenses incidental or in conjunction therewith, and the levy and collection annually of a tax on all the taxable property in said District for the purpose of paying the current interest on said bonds and the principal thereof as the same becomes due; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors of said District now considers it necessary and proper that a public hearing be held on the plan of taxation for said District,

as provided in Chapter 280, Acts 41st Legislature, 1929, as amended;

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF VALLEY CREEK WATER CONTROL DISTRICT:

That a public hearing be held on the 19th day of April, 1960, at 7:30 o'clock, P. M. at High School Auditorium, Wingate, Texas, in said District, on the following propositions:

1st: Shall taxes to pay off construction bonds, and for maintenance, operation and administrative costs of the district be assessed, levied and collected upon the ad valorem basis?

2nd: Shall taxes for the stated purposes be assessed, levied and collected on the basis of the assessment of specific benefits?

3rd: Shall taxes for the stated purposes be assessed, levied and collected upon the basis of assessment of benefits at an equal sum per acre of land?

4th: Shall taxes for the stated purposes be assessed, levied and collected on the ad valorem basis as to some part of the total tax required, and upon the basis of assessment of benefits as to some part of the total tax required, or as to some defined part of, or property within, the district?
