## HOME TOWN Talk

Much-needed rain has fallen in this area within the last few days, adding to prospects for a good grain crop this year. Some hail has fallen in this part of the county, but damage has been slight, according to reports which have been received.

Winters received 2.1 inches (unofficial) of rain from Sunday thru Tuesday night, bringing the April total so far to 3.5. Total for the year has been 8.9 inches, which is considerably more for the period than was recorded for the same time last year. According to our unofficial record, the first three months of last year saw very little moisture. For the month of April 1959, a total of only 2.4 inches of rain fell.

Light hail was mixed with the rains which came Sunday afternoon and Monday, but this part of Runnels County has so far been out of the heavy damage area. Some small grain received slight damage, but according to all the reports we have been given, there is a chance for even that grain to go ahead and mature.

We had heard that one rancher had many sheep killed by Monday's hail, but so far have not been successful in tracking down the source of the information. Sometimes we wonder how stories of that nature get started.

Weldon Huntsman of Winters reported that his automobile, which he had bought only a few days ago, received extensive damage in the hailstorm which swept San Angelo Tuesday afternoon.

Now is a good time to start thinking about the Democratic Primary, May 7. The new, early date for the primary probably has confused many people; we've even heard that some of the candidates themselves have put off hard campaigning, forgetting that the primary is earlier this year.

We read it: The average girl would rather have beauty than brains because the average man can see better than he can think.

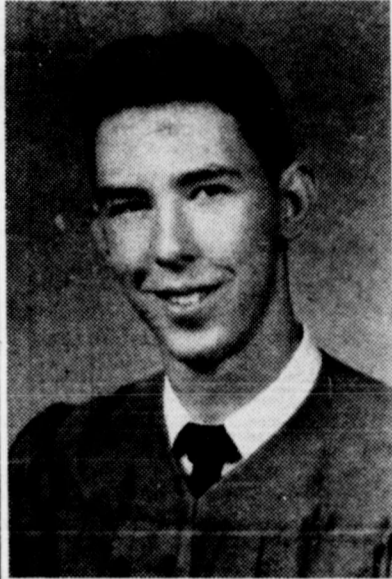

## WHS HONOR GRADUATES

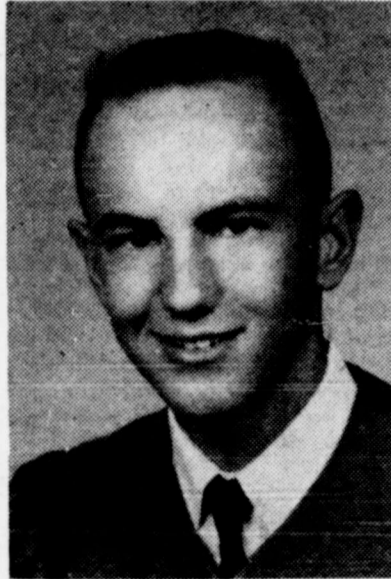


PAT PATTERSON

## Been Counted? If Not, Mail In Blank

With the 1960 census of population virtually completed, a "Were You Counted?" campaign has begun, according to Dist. Supervisor William G. Stacy.

The campaign is to insure that no resident of the area has been overlooked.

Persons who believe they have been missed by the census takers are urged to notify the census district office by means of the "Were You Counted?" forms.

The forms to fill out if you were missed can be found on page 2.

Preliminary figures presenting the total population of incorporated places of 10,000 or more population, and for counties, will be issued as soon as the district supervisor is convinced that a complete count has been made. Final

detailed population figures will be issued in Washington later this year after the returns have been tabulated on the Census Bureau's electronic computers.

The importance of a complete count was stressed by Stacy, who pointed out that the population figures compiled in the current census must stand as official until the next federal census.

"Federal aid funds are allotted to states and state funds, in turn, are allotted to counties and municipalities on a per capita basis. So a short count means a short allotment. Thus, it is imperative that we have a complete count. The help of every resident of the area is needed to reach this goal," Stacy said.

## Primary Children Present Spring Program Friday

Winters Primary School will present its annual spring program Friday (tonight) April 29, at 7:30 in the high school auditorium. It is entitled "All God's Children," a song story written by Genevieve K. Arnold and Satis N. Coleman, with additional songs arranged by Mrs. Dorothy Akins, music teacher in the Primary School.

The song story is based upon a Negro Spiritual which says, "I got a song, You got a song, all God's children got a song," and it shows that all countries contribute to our music of the world.

About 250 children will be in the program with 130 of those being in costumes which are representative of different nationalities. Sammy Graham, a Cub Scout, and Mary Lou Wilkerson, a Brownie Scout, will serve as master and mistress of ceremonies. They will stand behind a table on which there is a world globe.

After an introduction which is sung by a group of second and third grade children not in costume, the program proceeds from German girls, Swiss boys, Dutch girls, Danish boys, Japanese girls, Italian boys, Mexican girls, Negro boys and American children dressed as cowboys. One speaker from each group carries a gift typical of that country and lays it on the table around the world globe. After placing the gift for all God's children to see, the group sings songs which are typical of that country.

Betty Armstrong will be speaker for the girls wearing German costumes; Wesley Crouch, Swiss boys; Zola Ruth Crowley, Dutch girls; Tommy Chapman, Danish boys; Babs Tatum, Japanese girls; Darrell Hill, Italian boys; Carla Sue Davis, Mexican girls; Robert Moore, Negro boys. First grade children are the cowboys with Tony Rougas being their speaker.

Tommy Young was high-point man with 19 1-2 points in the 9th grade division.

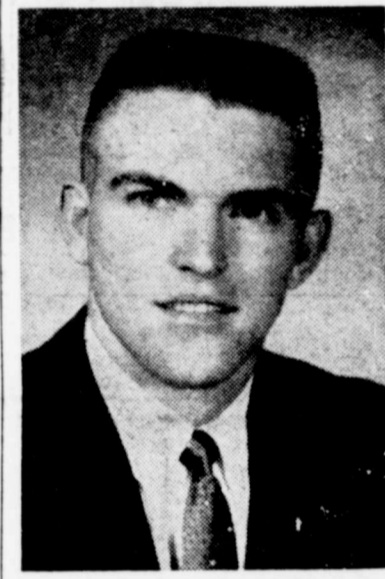

## City Passes Civil Defense Ordinance

An ordinance setting up a Civil Defense program for the city of Winters was passed by the Winters City Council in their regular session Monday evening. This was the first business meeting of the council after reorganization following the recent election.

The City of Winters will work with civic and service organizations in setting up a Civil Defense program. A committee from the Winters Lions Club has been working on the project for several weeks, and plans are being completed for a Civil Defense organization to swing into action in case of some kind of emergency such as fire, windstorm, tornado, and the like. Of much concern to the group is the protection of school children in case of some emergency.

Three new members of the Council were installed at a special meeting last Friday night. They were elected to office April 5. New council members are J. F. Richie, O. B. Raper, and J. E. (Buck) Smith.

The new members of the council have been assigned to different departments of the city administration. Richie will head the Parks and Sanitation department; Raper will run the Water and Sewer department; and Smith will have charge of the Winters Municipal Hospital.

Old members of the Council and the departments they will head are Raymon Lloyd, streets; and Barney Bryant, Light Plant.

Charles Hester, who is in the administrative department of the City, and Frederic Poe, who is business manager for the hospital, are attending an accounting school at Austin, sponsored by the University of Texas and the Texas Municipal League.

Mayor Harvey D. Jones said this week that payments on delinquent city taxes are coming in. The City of Winters recently started a drive to collect all delinquent taxes, and bring the tax records up to date.

The records showed about \$36,000 in delinquent taxes, according to the mayor. In most instances,

Mayor Jones said, the citizens are showing much cooperation in this attempt by the city administration to bring the tax records up to date. Jones pointed out that there have been errors made in the past, but these are being corrected as soon as possible and whenever possible. He further pointed out that there is no statute of limitations on taxes, and that some kind of action must be taken wherever the records show that taxes are delinquent. He said that with the present cooperation of the people, it is expected that most cases would be cleared up within a comparatively short time.

## Carol Ann Smith Will Go To State Meet May 5, 6, 7

Carol Ann Smith was the only student of Winters High School winning a first place in the Region I Interscholastic League meet held at Texas Tech in Lubbock last week-end.

Carol Ann presented a perfect paper in shorthand to win a trip to Austin to compete in the State Meet May 5, 6, and 7. This was the second perfect shorthand paper for her. Her paper at the District Meet was also perfect.

The boys' debate team, Bill Little and Pat Patterson, defeated debate teams from Muleshoe and Quanah before falling to Alpine in the Regional finals. However, their second place win does not qualify them to the State Meet as only one debate team from each region goes on to state.

Billy Pumphrey placed third in the journalism contest and will probably be able to compete at the state meet. Just first and second place winners in this event can continue on; however, Billy is alternate and the contestant who placed second will not go to the state meet because of previous plans.

### Farm Bureau Meet With Candidates Was Well Attended

The "meet your candidate" meeting which was sponsored jointly by the Runnels and Coleman County Farm Bureau was held in the Farm Bureau office on Thursday evening, April 21, with about 130 persons present, including district candidates for the Legislature, Rep. A. J. Bishop Jr., of Winters, and J. W. (Bill) Moore of Ballinger, as well as unopposed Senator Dorsey B. Harde-man of San Angelo.

Ed Cumbie, Area Supervisor of District VII of the Farm Bureau, acted as moderator of the meeting giving each of the candidates three minutes in which to introduce himself and state his qualifications for the post he seeks.

Bishop, leading off, went on record as having announced on the basis of his previous record in filling the office as representative of this district for the past seven years. He cited many of the bills which he has had a hand in clearing the state house, and further stated that he had served as chairman and vice chairman of various livestock committees.

Moore stated that he has announced on the basis of his past record as a business man stating that he had been in business in and around this area for some 30 years. He is presently engaged in stock farming in Runnels County, and has served as Mayor of the City of Ballinger for 11 years.

Following the introductory session, Cumbie followed with the question and answer session, beginning with the question of animal health program in the State of Texas. Cumbie stated the Farm Bureau policy of granting the animal health commission authority over range and stocker cattle, adequate funds for operation of the commission, and the Animal Health Commission authority over issuance of regulations without the governor's approval. Both candidates answered in the affirmative to the Bureau policy and both favored the policy of appropriating funds to further the Brucellosis program in the state.

Both Moore and Bishop stated that they did not favor a general sales tax, or a state income tax, and both favored the exemption from registration of farm trailers up to a weight of 10,000 pounds.

## Overseas Veterans Proud of Their Home for Orphans

As the Winters Post No. 9193 of the Veterans of Foreign Wars announced plans to observe the week of May 1-7 as National VFW Week, Commander Ted Meyer stated that his organization took a great deal of pride in the modern home for widows and orphans of veterans at Eaton Rapids, Mich.

He told of the modern million dollar institution the VFW and Ladies Auxiliary own, and how hundreds of unfortunate children have been afforded a regular home life and schooling there, after the loss of one or both of their parents. The institution is the only one of its kind in the world, the commander said.

"At this home," Meyer declared, "the some 30 odd individual modern two-story brick homes have every modern convenience. The children are cared for by a house mother, often a war veteran's widow with several children of her own, also caring for several other youngsters." There are modern hospitals and clinics, swimming pools, playgrounds and the normal home life surroundings, he continued.

The VFW National Home is located on a 600-acre plot of land, which operates a diversified farming program, a dairy, workshops, and such programs as to help finance the institution, in addition to the splendid training program for the boys and girls living there, he pointed out.

Commander Meyer revealed that the ever-increasing demands for admittance to the VFW Home, the Board of Directors had limited the facilities to widows and orphans of war veterans who were members of the overseas organization.

The local Veterans of Foreign Wars Post has 175 members and the Ladies Auxiliary has about 100 members and all of these contribute toward this Home annually.

## Miss Marie Maughan Accepts Position At DeLeon School

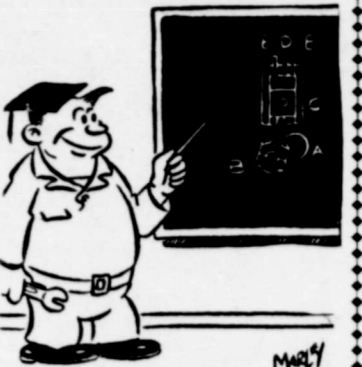
Miss Marie Maughan has accepted a position with the DeLeon school system for the coming year. She will teach Homemaking I, II, III.

**State Capitol Highlights**

**Last Legislature Moved Texas Primary Up To Saturday, May 7th**

A great number of persons are not aware of the fact that the Legislature, at its 1959 session, moved the primary and run-off elections forward several months.

Candidates are not in sufficient abundance this year to impress this fact upon the voters. Now with only a short period remaining, many of them are surprised to learn that not one out of a hundred voters knows when the elections are to be held.

Those who are campaigning have not failed to stress the earlier voting dates. First primary will be held on Saturday, May 7. The run-off, if any should be necessary, is scheduled for June 4.

If you are going to be out of town during the first primary election, May 7, you have from now until May 3 to vote absentee for that election.

After May 3 you must go to the polls if you want to vote. For those living in a county seat town, the simplest procedure is to go by the county clerk's office. If you do not live in the county seat, you can write the county clerk for the necessary forms.

Voting in the Democratic primaries is essential to participation in other Democratic party activities this year. No one will be allowed to take part in a Democratic precinct convention unless he has a poll tax that has been stamped "Democratic." Poll tax holders must vote in the primary, absentee or at the polls, to get their poll taxes stamped.

This new section of the election law was designed to keep out the so-called "one day Democrats" who participate in Democratic primaries and conventions and Republican conventions, too. People who go to the GOP precinct conventions will have their poll taxes stamped "Republican." This shuts the door on their having any part in Democratic Party affairs until they get a new poll tax.

**DOOR KNOB COSTS CUT**

Amid a statewide hullabaloo over the cost of hardware came a quiet explanation that door knobs in the State Office Building really cost only \$3.65, not \$36.00 apiece.

H. R. Nieman, executive director of the State Building Commission, said the cost of all the hardware for the building—including automatic closers, locks, keys, hinges and doorstops for 1,000 doors—came to \$36,000.

Nieman, who was not with the building commission at the time the State Office Building was constructed, called the hardware cost "well within reason."

Nieman's statement punctured a story that had been the subject of almost as many jokes as Pappy O'Daniel's flour barrel. It got started when a House committee on tax saving investigated the building which had cracks in the lobby's terrazzo floor.

Sightseers had come, almost as to a museum, to look at the highly publicized stainless steel knobs.
