Winters Vs. Olney In Bi-District Tilt

Following their whirlwind tour through the 1962 football season, with an all-win-to-loss record, capped off by their shut-out of Ballinger here last Friday night, the Winters High School Blizzards move on to bi-district play this week, representing District 4-AAA against the winners of 3-AAA, Olney, with the game to be played at Stamford.

The 4-AAA Champions return to Stamford tonight (Friday) under different circumstances than that which greeted them three weeks ago. Instead of a hostile camp, they will find a solid phalanx of backers from the district, energetically backing them on to even higher honors.

The game Friday night will begin at 7:30. Winters fans will be in the west, or home section, of the Stamford stands. Tickets went on sale at the school Tuesday at 1 p.m. Additional tickets will be on sale at the gate prior to the game, it was announced.

The winner of the Winters-Olney game Friday night will be paired against the winner of the Crane-Comanche game, which is scheduled for 7:30 Friday night in Colorado City.

The Blizzards, grown adept at the art of bowling over their adversaries this season, enter the playoffs for the first time since 1952. The Winters team remains one of the three undefeated teams in State Double-A conference, and are listed in the No. 3 spot in the Star-Telegram rankings, behind Denver City and Jacksboro. The three undefeated teams, ironically are all in the top or West Texas bracket in the 22-team state playoff schedule.

Winters has come through the ten-game season with 98 points against 42 for their opponents. In District play, five games, the Blizzards have chalked up 48 points against 25.

Olney, considered one of the might teams of the area, has a 4-0 season's record, with a perfect score for district play. The Cubs have totaled 279 points against 86 for the season, and 127 in 17 district play. Olney is listed in the No. 5 spot in the S-T rankings. Olney's only loss was to Jacksboro, 14-21.

Winters defeated Haskell 14-6 and Albany 28-8, in pre-conference play. Olney defeated these respective squads 24-22 and 14-4.

For Friday night's game, the Blizzards will be wearing solid blue, while the Olney Cubs will be in white jerseys and red pants.

For the eighth consecutive year, the Winters High School Blizzards Marching Band won First Division honors in Region II at the University Interscholastic League marching contests in Abilene Saturday.

The band is under the direction of Robert R. Gans. Declared outstanding in marching competition, the Blizzards Band marched in all degree weather, in a slight mist. Although the weather was disagreeable, members of the band, as one observer noted, "proved they were from Winters, and couldn't be powder."

In the twirling competition, all majorettes won medals for outstanding baton twirling, and some of them won double awards for ensemble work. Winning double awards were Tamara Gans, Mary Young, Russell Bedford, Joanne Fuller and Jeanne Hood. Winning single awards were Barbara Burdwin and Judy Matthews.

The marching band also won a First Division for inspection. In this competition, the bandmen answered verbal commands given by Drum Major Tamara Gans, and were judged according to appearance and cleanliness and condition of instruments.

Fifty-two bands and about 3,000 students competed in the contest. Performing in Fair Park Stadium in Abilene, the bandmen did not compete against each other, but against a standard rating.

Capital Highlights

"Configuration Fever" Hits Capital

Expects Large Celebration

Legislative session for the second time. Committee, headed by Rep. W. T. Dungan of McKinney, will meet on December 31. Then each of its five members will submit individual reports on hearings held in Austin, Amarillo and San Antonio. Decision to make separate reports from each committee member underscored the squabbling which has beset the committee since it began public hearings last January. Committee voted to exclude mention of a Dallas hearing, where former Maj. Gen. Edwin A. Walker testified, since Representative Dungan was the only member present.

RABIES DOWN

State Department of Public Health reports that the incidence of rabies is decreasing. For example, the number of rabies cases reported between January 1 and September 30 of 1962 was 1,336. Reports for the same period in 1961, nine years later, totaled 446. No cases of rabies in bats were listed from 1962 to 1959. But they numbered 26 this year. Dogs were the animals most frequently infected with rabies. Foxes followed second. Only 15 cases of rabies in humans have been reported over the past 10 years.

EIGHT DAYS AGAIN

Texas Railroad Commission has set an eight-day oil allowable for the 11th month in a row. January was the last month that oil producers were allowed to operate prorated wells on a nine-day allowable.

Texas Independent Producers and Royalty Owners proposed fractional-day orders. A spokesman for the Texas Landowners and Independent Producers Association said his group will ask the Legislature to change the market demand law so the Railroad Commission can set allowables on a basis of Texas' share of national oil reserves.

But Chairman William J. Murray Jr. stated that the commission believes it now has the authority needed "to set allowables as high as the market will take." He added that the commission would go to fractional days, or to a percentage, if such a step is needed.

Murray also said that a plan for tougher new test requirements in the East Texas field is being devised by the commission.

HOUSE CEREMONY

Speaker of the House James A. Turman invited newly-elected members of the House of Representatives to take their oath of office in a mass ceremony on November 23.

That's the day votes officially will be canvassed and all non-returning representatives will be removed from the House payroll.

Turman's invitation was issued immediately after Attorney General Will Wilson ruled that Turman will continue to serve until his successor, Rep. James Dee Cole of Greenville, qualifies for his new term.

Opinion was requested to clear up a situation muddled by redistricting of legislative districts. Cole was elected to represent a new district which included his old one as well as Turman's. Members whose districts were abolished by redistricting can hold office until newly-elected members qualify.

ENROLLMENT UP

Number of students attending local state-supported junior colleges increased 15.3 per cent over the past year to reach a total of 42,991 on October 15.

Thirty-six of the 37 colleges showed an increase in enrollment. But Lee College at Baytown showed a decrease of 7.6 per cent. It's estimated that some former Lee students now are attending San Jacinto College in nearby Pasadena, where enrollment boomed by 59.5 per cent.

State Board of Education voted to appoint a commission to study criteria for the establishment of new junior college districts.

BUS, TRUCK SPEEDERS

Texas truck and bus drivers are

worse speeders than passenger car drivers. So reports the Texas Highway Department. Speed recording tests made by the Department shows truckers are the worst offenders with an average speed violation record of 75.3 per cent exceeding the legal speed limit.

Department's annual speed survey shows buses came next to truckers in speed-limit disregard. Their average was 61.7 miles per hour.

Average speed of passenger cars was 51.4 mph—within the limits of 60 mph during the daytime and 55 mph at night.

PRE-CHRISTMAS SURPRISE

A quarter of a million Texans have received a pre-Christmas surprise.

The aged, the blind and the disabled got a raise in their public assistance checks from state welfare agencies.

Increase amounted to \$1 per month for the 75,000 old folks on maximum relief. Minimum was no less than \$1 and up now to \$2 a month.

LAND INVENTORY

State school land and mineral ownership is being inventoried. Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler reveals that close examination of over 150,000 separate files is half completed.

He reports that during 1974-1981, school lands were sold under dozens of different statutes.

Sadler estimates that "a mineral estate of 4,000 acres was reserved in these transactions."

This, with riverbeds, submerged lands, the University domain and the almost 900,000 acres held outright by the state, create the 22,000,000-acre total endowment for public education.

Cotton Root Rot Kills Shade Trees, Shrubs, Flowers

Cotton root rot is one of the most common plant diseases in Texas. Except for the Panhandle and High Plains, the disease is found throughout the state, says Harlan Smith, extension plant pathologist. It is very common in heavy alkaline soils. Smith points out that about 80 percent of the wild and cultivated plants are susceptible in varying degrees to the disease. The fungus may live in some native trees and shrubs without killing them, he adds.

Small flowers, shrubs and trees die suddenly after the first winter symptoms appear. Large shrubs and trees may die more slowly. Smith says the bark of affected roots is decayed and brownish. Woolly, buff or brownish, fungal strands are present on the surface of the damaged roots.

The whole root system decays, he adds. Bark is rotted off the harder wood of the root, and roots slip out of the soil with comparatively little pulling effort. Under moist conditions, with or without affected plants, spore mats sometimes appear on the soil surface. The mats are 2 to 12 inches in diameter, at first snowwhite and cottony; later they appear tan and powdery.

Cotton root rot fungus generally invades new areas by continued slow growth through the soil from plant to plant. It may live in the soil for many years. The disease is often found as deep in the soil as roots penetrate, says Smith.

The disease is controlled by the growing of resistant or immune trees and shrubs. Certain cultural practices may also help in checking its occurrence.

Smith suggests a visit with the local county agent for more information on the disease and for a copy of L-390 "Cotton Root Rot." The publication is available for the asking.

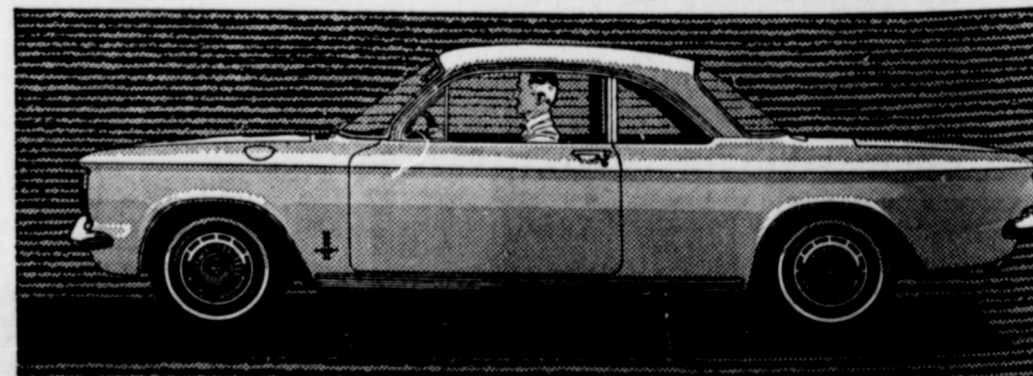

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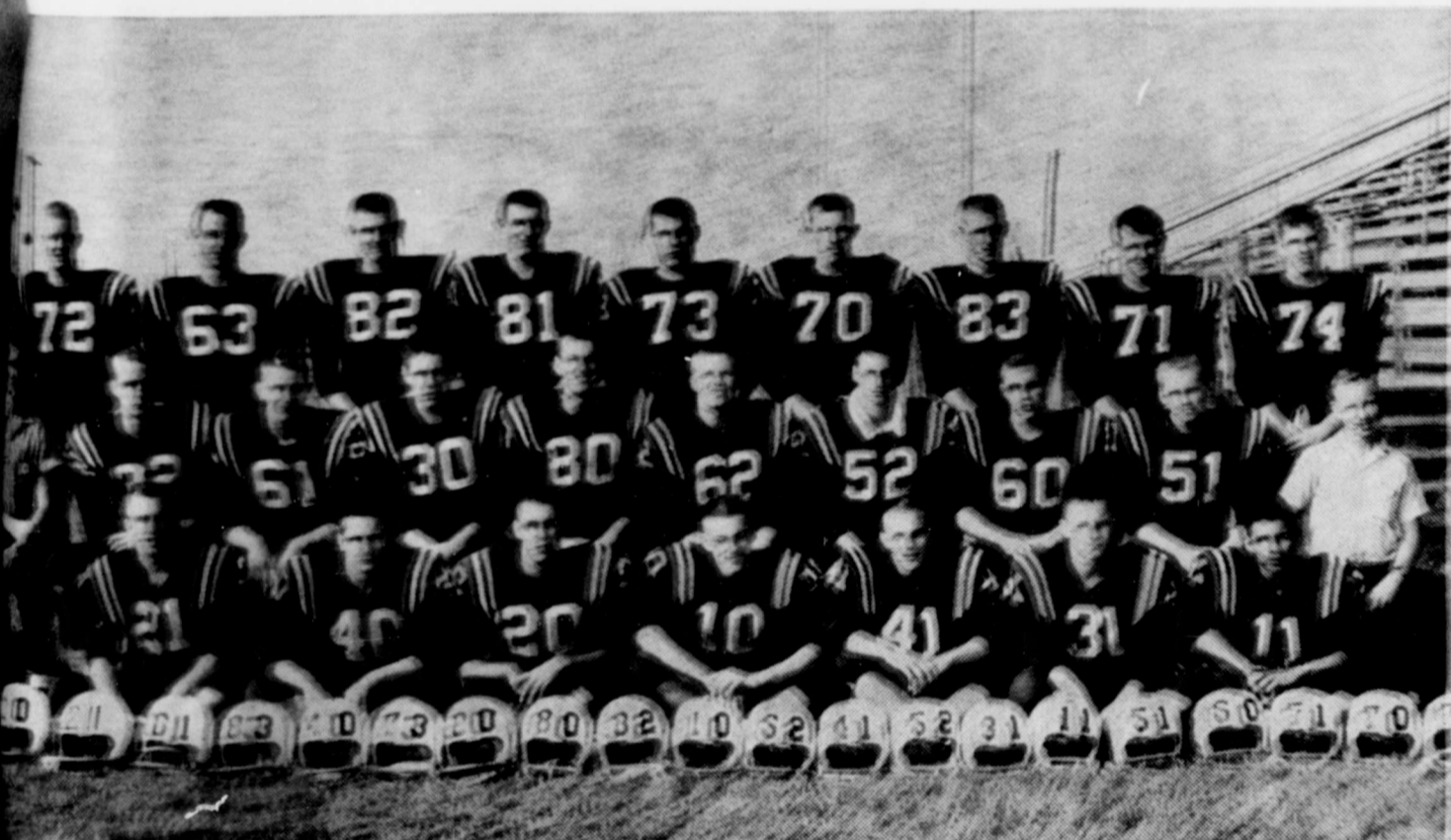
