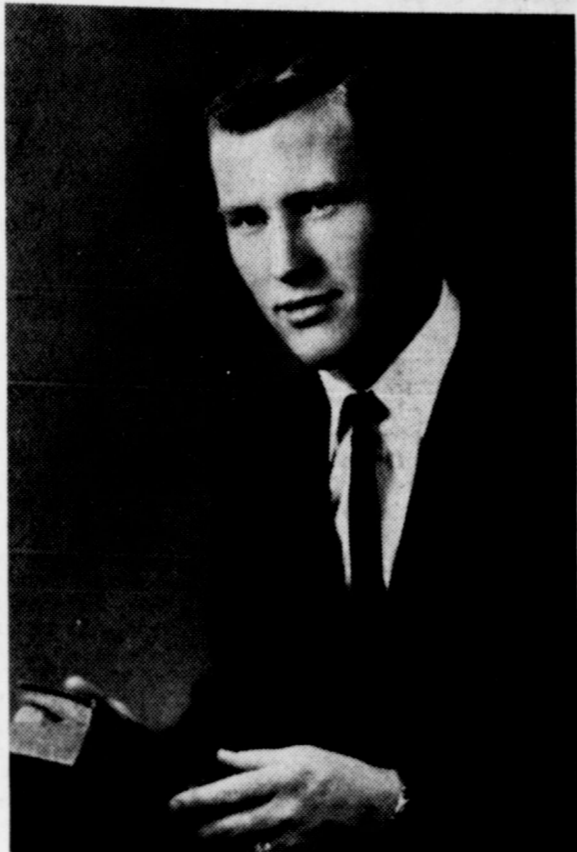

## Cancer Crusade Receives \$700; More To Come

More than \$700 has been contributed to the local Cancer Crusade as of Saturday, April 20, according to Willis Jernigan, chairman.

The report, which is incomplete, covers only the house-to-house canvass, the blockade, and memorial gifts. The fund drive in the business district, under the direction of F. R. Anderson, is still underway.

To date, 90 individuals have contributed their time and efforts toward making this year's campaign the most successful ever conducted here.

More than 50 women assisted in the residential drive on Tuesday, April 16. A total of 470 was collected by these women, under direction of Mrs. Raymon Lloyd, Mrs. Gattis Neely, Mrs. George Poe, and Mrs. B. F. Byrns. The total figure will run higher, as follow-up contacts with people missed on the initial drive are expected to raise the amount.

Members of the Sub Debs and Goal Digger Clubs collected \$142.99 on Saturday in a street blockade.

John Foster, who is in charge of the crusade at Wingate, has reported a collection of \$80, with the drive still incomplete.

Memorial gifts account for \$21 to date. This phase of the fundraising for the American Cancer Society is a year-round program.

A final report on the April campaign will be made following the close of the drive, Jernigan said.

## City Won Garbage Collection Fee Suit

A jury of eleven men and one woman Wednesday morning returned a decision favoring the City of Winters in a \$7,500 damage suit filed in 119th District Court by A. L. Crockett.

The jury, receiving the case about 10 a. m., refused to allow for the plaintiff in a single one of the pleadings of the petition. The jury's verdict was announced about noon.

Testimony in the case had ended about 3 p. m. Tuesday after the appearance of three witnesses called by T. D. Smith of Houston, lawyer for the plaintiff. Only witnesses appearing were Crockett, Winters Mayor Harvey D. Jones, and Mrs. Crockett. Lyndon Olson of Waco, attorney for the City of Winters, cross-examined plaintiff's witnesses but called none himself.

Crockett was seeking \$2,500 for actual damages and \$5,000 exemplary damages following severance of utility service to his home in Winters on Aug. 2, 1961. He had testified that he refused at first to pay a \$1 garbage pick-up fee charged by the city, and that after two notices of non-payment, city utilities to his house were cut off.

The ordinances and resolutions enacted by the city council, which were to lead to the suit, progressively provided for the garbage pick-up service and fee, made the fee compulsory, and provided for

rejection of partial payment of utility bills. On June 25, 1961, an ordinance was passed specifying that if the \$1 garbage fee was not paid, the other utility payments would be refused.

Mayor Jones testified that the severance policy adopted by the council was to prevent abuse of the service and provide revenue for operating a sanitary system.

Crockett said he offered a check to the city in payment for his utility, but purposely deducted the \$1 charge for garbage. His check was returned and after two notices the city disconnected his water and lights on Aug. 2, 1961. He said he later paid the \$1 fee and a re-connect fee and utility service was restored.

Besides the \$7,500 damages, Crockett had petitioned for a permanent injunction against the city prohibiting further utility severance. A temporary injunction to that effect was issued on Nov. 20, 1961.

Thursday morning it had not been decided whether or not the case would be appealed to higher court.

## Winters Lions Club Donates \$700 To Buy Windows For Hospital, Library Shelves

The Winters Lions Club Tuesday voted to give a total of \$700 to the Winters Municipal Hospital and the Winters Library. The money is an accumulation of funds from the several projects sponsored by the service club, to be spent on local programs.

To spearhead an anticipated campaign to make improvements to the hospital building, the Lions Club is giving \$350 to the hospital to purchase aluminum windows.

Also, to assist in a campaign currently underway to improve and publicize the Winters Library, the Lions Club has donated \$350 with which to purchase double shelving for the library.

It was pointed out that all windows at the hospital are in need of replacement, but funds with which to do the work is short. The City Council voted recently to purchase several windows, and the amount donated by the Lions Club will go a long way toward doing the necessary work. Several other windows and other repair work and equipment is needed, Lions Club spokesmen pointed out. It is hoped that other organizations and individuals will follow the course of the Lions Club, and investigate the possibility of helping in the hospital work, they said.

A special committee recently was organized to work on getting financial assistance for the Winters Library. Many things are needed at the library, members of the committee have said, but shelf space is critical at the present time. The money donated by the

Lions Club will go for purchase of five sets of floor-to-ceiling double shelves, to hold approximately 500 books per unit.

## Charles Simpson Receives Defense Fellowship Award

Charles Simpson, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. C. Simpson of Winters, has been awarded a National Defense Fellowship from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare. He is a senior at Texas A. and M. College.

The fellowship is a three-year grant during which he will work on his master's and doctor's degrees. He will be engaged in research in the grass cytogenetic field.

Requirements for the fellowship were a high academic rating, and intentions of going into the field of college teaching. It allows \$2,000 for the first nine months; \$2,200 for the second, and \$2,400 for the third. During the summers he will receive an additional salary for work with the department.

Simpson, who has a 2.5 grade point average, has been named a member of Alpha Zeta, national honorary agriculture fraternity, and Phi Kappa Phi, national honorary society for students with high academic ratings.

A 1958 graduate of Norton High School, Simpson has held the Wichita Farm and Ranch Club scholarship. He is a member of the Dormitory Council, a member of the Agricultural Council and Senior Editor of the Collegiate FFA yearbook.

Recently he completed several weeks of practice teaching at Burnet High School, working under the agriculture teacher, Tom Henry.

He will graduate from A. and M. on May 25.

### Advise Caution, Investigation Before Speculating in Florida Developments

Babson Park, Mass. — I came to Florida 46 years ago when contemplating from tuberculosis (TB, not TV) I never got mixed up with the Florida boom as I then had neither ambition nor strength.

#### Boom Or Bust

As this is the 46th anniversary of the beginning of the famous Florida Boom, I want the younger generation to know what then happened. One illustration will give the picture. The young man who typed for me showed me a check for \$10,000 which he had received as a commission; he immediately bought a Rolls-Royce with the money.

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Very few people actually saw any money, or even the property they "bought". They were content to receive a "purchase and sale agreement" which they did not bother to file at the Court House. They merely gave their note for the sales agreement; then they sold this at a profit to someone else, who, in turn, sold it to another party. A man could build \$1,000 up to \$100,000, swapping one piece of paper for another. Finally the crash came, and the last party lost everything.

#### Florida Municipal Bonds

Farmers were not the only ones taken in. Many banks failed. And municipal bond prices collapsed. Sarasota bonds fell from \$100 to \$20; Orlando bonds fell to \$40; the bonds of the city of Sanford dropped from \$100 to \$10. Beautiful homes costing \$500,000 sold at 10 cents on the dollar. Most people called it a "panic" but it was more like an epidemic of diphtheria or typhoid, except that it was mental. Will it come again? I don't know; but there are no signs of it now.

People are no longer speculating in pieces of paper. Most speculators are buying large acreage and dividing it into house lots. People are buying one or two lots on speculation, but their total loss would be not more than \$5,000 even if the development company went into bankruptcy. The difficulty is that these companies sometimes fail to put in water systems or hard roads or other improvements promised. There is still considerable speculation in Florida land, but it is legitimate; the lots have been bought and the deeds recorded.

#### Where To Buy?

I do not answer specific questions which come to me, as I cannot afford to get involved in any lawsuits, but I am willing to say that anyone who buys a small house and an adjoining lot in a Florida city of 20,000 or less, in which he plans to live, should make a good and thoughtful investment. He, however, should first drive down to Florida and take a trip around the state. The local bank of any city will give the name of a reliable real estate agent. It is a mistake to put all your

Many groves are good investments if they are in frost-protected sections and old enough so that a freeze will not hurt the trees, even if the fruit is lost for a year. However, if I had all my investment in orange groves, I should certainly sell one-half and invest that money in the stock of General Foods Co. or Coca-Cola Co. (which owns Minute Maid). I also advise all subscribers to this newspaper to read "The Day Money Stopped" by Caroline Bird (Look Magazine for March 12th).

#### Different Sections Of Florida Discussed

If buying land for speculation—by the acre or by the foot—I would surely get ocean-front property. For many years there will be plenty of available land in Florida, but ocean front will be very scarce; the most expensive is on the East Coast north of Miami.

The Everglades should be avoided on account of mosquitoes and other insects. The most attractive area at present may be the West Coast south of Sarasota—including Venice, Punta Gorda, Fort Myers, and Naples. A portion that has appealed to friends of mine is Sanibel Island. A bridge to Sanibel is soon to be opened and a second bridge to Pine Island is under consideration. If prices have not increased too much in anticipation, seashore property on one of these islands might be attractive.

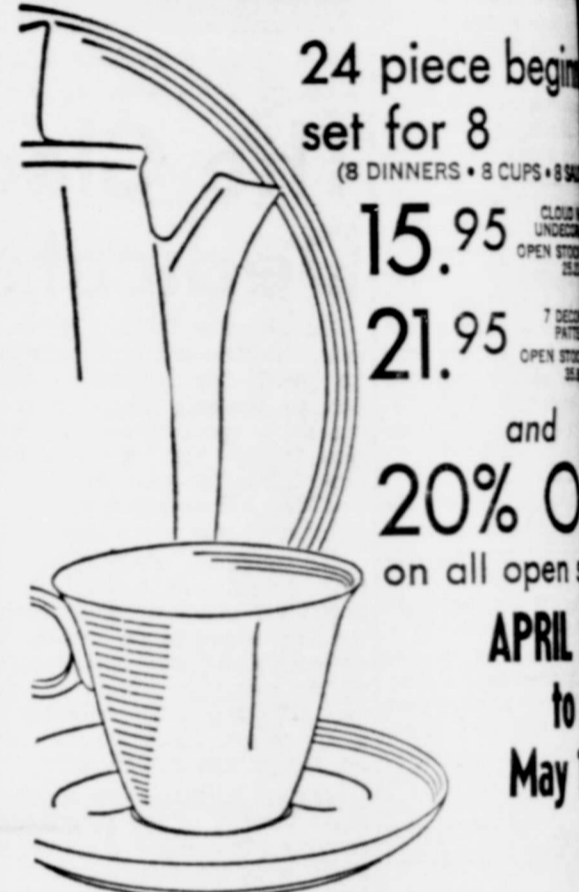

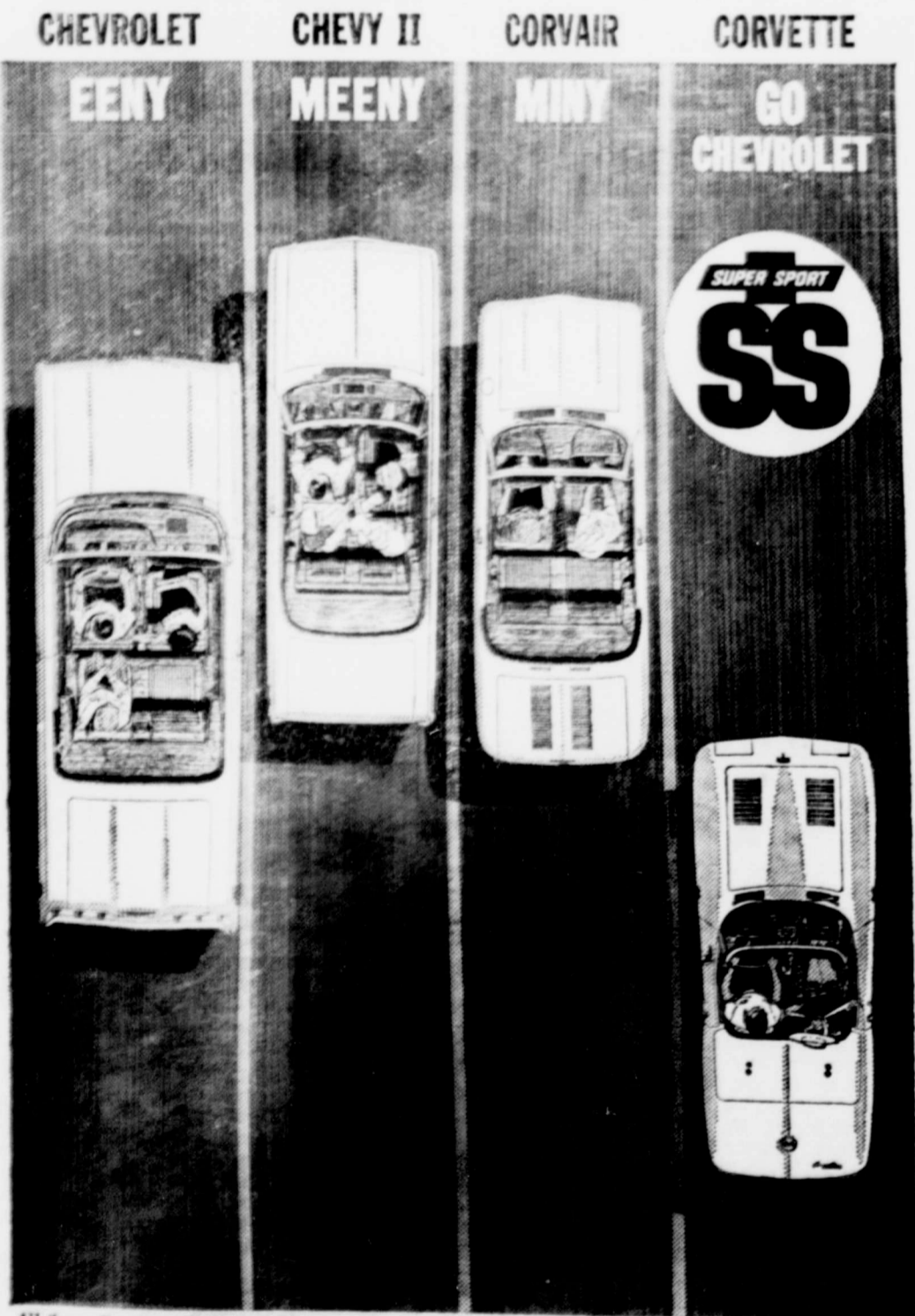

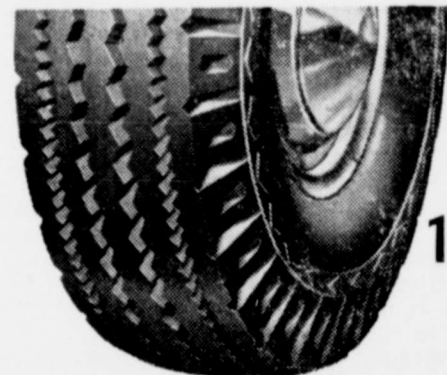

## Wheat Certificate Plan Explained At FB Meeting

A meeting to explain provisions of the wheat certificate plan that will be voted on in the May 21 referendum was held in the Runnels County Farm Bureau building last Thursday evening. Edward W. Canine, Area VII Field Representative, Texas Farm Bureau, was the speaker for the program. Qualified wheat farmers will go to the polls May 21, to cast their votes in the referendum authorized by the Agriculture Act of 1942. The choice in the ballot will be whether to vote "yes" or "no" in a multiple-choice certificate plan for wheat. If two-thirds or more voting vote "yes," the proposed plan will go into effect, beginning with the 1954 crop. If more than one-third of those voting vote "no," it will not.

Mr. Canine stated that the Texas Farm Bureau is not attempting to tell wheat farmers how to vote in the referendum. "We believe that if wheat farmers understand the full impact of the certificate plan, they will vote 'no' by an overwhelming majority," the Farm Bureau leader said.

He said a "yes" vote means a reduced market divided among "family farms" by the government, a franchise to grow wheat even for food and or feed, cross compliance as determined by the Secretary of Agriculture, heavy penalties for violators, compulsory land retirement, and eventual control over other commodities.

Mr. Canine stated that a "no" vote means prices determined by demand, the right to grow wheat, a revised government program, the right to be a large or a small grower, increased markets for wheat at home and abroad, the removal of incentives to be dishonest, the removal of government-imposed penalties, the right to manage one's own land, and the freeing of feed grains and livestock from one of the threats of control.

**CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS**

**Legislature Studying Complete Overhaul of Texas' Election Codes**

Sen. Sanford D. Dicks, president of the Texas Legislative Council, announced today that the legislature is studying a complete overhaul of the election codes. The bill, which would correct scores of errors in the old law, was passed in 1951. The bill would amend the "agent form" for taxes. Instead, proposals would have to go through a deputy clerk to certify qualifications.

Members refused to require assessors to name deputies. The bill would slow down the process of the poll tax as a condition of voting. It also passed a proposed amendment to let the legislature decide whether they want to tax. But after some discussion, the committee put it off.

The national convention to outlaw in election of President, Senators and members has been ratified. When eight more of the poll tax in Texas are out of the window. Rep. Kazen Jr. of Dallas said the possibility of election could be held by federal officials by the end of the year.

**TEST SESSION?** A record for short sessions may be set if the session starts on Monday. Speaker Tammell can get legislation up their business by the end of the year.

**BILLS PENDING** The legislative session will be the biggest issue of the year. The House passed a tax bill of \$2,000,000 to finance B. Connally's higher education and industry programs. The appropriations committee is being worked out in a committee headed by Speaker Tammell. Bill Heatly of Dallas allocates the funds to be spent during the year.

**SECURITIES REGISTRATION UP** State Securities Board granted investment permits in Texas totaling \$25,000,000 last month. February total ran only \$17,000,000. Thirteen of the 42 companies granted the right to sell stocks in Texas were Texas firms.

**HOUSE BILLS** Beetles better beware if Conroe Rep. David Crews' bill to cause forest landowners to pay for their extermination becomes law. Victoria Rep. Dick Cory's bill authorizing district judges to provide jurors' meals in the jury room, rather than dismiss them, is ready for Governor Connally's signature. House endorsed a bill to require school boards to advertise for

competitive bids on purchases totaling \$1,000 or more. Kerrville Rep. Jim Nugent gained approval of his bill to set up strict supervision by the Secretary of State for charity fund-raising organizations which solicit \$10,000 or more a year. Women's rights gained a small victory when the House passed bills, authored by Rep. George Cowden of Waco, to allow a woman to make contracts concerning her own property.
