New Clinic For Eastland

Construction began Wednesday on the new three-doctor B&M Clinic building on the block due south of Eastland Memorial Hospital.

Contract was signed Monday between B&W officials and the Sonny Armstrong Construction Co. of Breckenridge. Constructors began moving equipment onto the site Tuesday and completion is due in 190 days—hopefully late spring of 1971, it was said.

The clinic will be of masonry and steel construction and will provide 2,000 sq. ft. of floor space. The block is bounded on the north by Plummer St.; on the west by S. Daugherty St., and on the east by Green St.

Dr. H. J. Bulgerin and Dr. B. E. Alexander are physicians at the clinic, located for the past 11 years in the Petroleum Building. Support facilities will be adequate for a third physician it was said.

The new clinic will afford parking for approximately 40 patients automobiles on site, off Green St.

B&W Clinic was established in 1956 when Dr. B. D. Westbrook and Dr. Bulgerin came to Eastland to begin practice together. Dr. Westbrook is now practicing at Beaumont.

Dr. Alexander came to Eastland and joined the Clinic in 1958. The physicians are in general practice and surgery.

The new clinic will offer a modern laboratory and x-Ray facilities, 12 examination rooms, treatment rooms and

The Wolverines Close District Tie With 7B

The Carbon Wolverines closed their district tie of 7B with a 28-10 victory over the Longhorns. The Wolverines defense held the Longhorns to as few points as anybody this season. The Wolverines didn't worry about losing two fumbles. They gave Gordon an 8 point lead. He came back to lead at 10-0 with a score of 26 to 10. Don Jackson and Bobby Carls each scored the Wolverines with 7 points each. Durward Webb caught a touchdown pass from quarterback James Noggle. Don Duncan kicked 4 field goals for the other 8 points.

Thad Davis lead the Longhorns with 20 points, Johnny Joe Jackson had 6 and Tommy Grace had 4.

Although Larry Griffin, Doug Bryant, and James Norris didn't get into the scoring for the starting offense, they did their part in blocking and opening up the middle for their running backs. The spirit and aid to each other gave the Wolverines a chance for the first time in 4 years at the bi-district battle against Cransville Gap. The Wolverines have scored 416 points to 134 for the opposing 8 teams during the season.

County FB's Attend Conclave In Fort Worth

Eastland County Farm Bureau was represented at the 37th annual meeting of the Texas Farm Bureau Nov. 8-11 in Ft. Worth by 8 delegates. Sessions were held in the Convention Center Theater and the Sheraton-Fort Worth Hotel.

State policies and recommendations on national issues were adopted by more than 800 official voting delegates from 200 county Farm Bureaus. Total attendance at the convention was about 2,000.

Registration got under way on Sunday, Nov. 8. Highlights of that day included Discussion Meet and Talent Find competition for young people and vesper services.

The Monday morning program included the annual address by TFB President Sidney Dean of Victoria, and an administrative report by Executive Director O. R. Long of Waco. Special conferences were held Monday afternoon on women in Farm Bureau, young farmers and ranchers, farm labor, natural resources, dairy, research and education, community services, livestock, field crops, poultry and services. The annual TFB sueten contest was held Monday evening.

Featured Tuesday morning were recognition and awards for counties and an address by Dolph Briscoe Jr. prominent Uvalde farmer - rancher. Banquet speaker that evening was Dr. Charles Allen, pastor, First Methodist Church, Houston.

The business session got under way Tuesday afternoon with voting on resolutions sent in by counties. The voting session continued Wednesday until all recommendations were either amended, adopted or rejected. Final order of business Wednesday was election of officers and directors.

Carbon Wreck Victim Buried in Friday Rites

Funeral services for Roy Gene Burns, 22, killed in a two-car accident south of Carbon Wednesday night about 7:30, were held at Higginbotham Funeral Home at Rising Star Friday at 2 p. m. with burial in Elm Cemetery near Okra. Military rites were observed.

Survivors are his father, John Henry Burns and his stepmother, Barina of Carbon; his mother, Mrs. Edith Tuggle of Stephenville; two brothers, John Wayne of Fort Worth and Ronnie of Carbon; four stepbrothers, Gerald Timmy and Bobby Wooley, all of Carbon, and Danny Wooley of Weatherford; a sister, Mrs. Carol Burke of Fort Worth; a stepsister, Mrs. Fannie Smith of Dyersburg, Tenn.

Born Dec. 29, 1947 in Gorman Sgt. Burns had just returned from Army service in Vietnam where he had received the Purple Heart, two Bronze Stars, the Air Medal and Combat Infantryman Badge.

He was a member of the Church of Christ.

Burns, son of John Burns of Carbon, was killed instantly when the 1969 Chevrolet Camero he was driving collided with a truck driven by Joe Donald Tucker of Cisco. The collision occurred on a curve of FM road 1027. He was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace L. W. Dalton of Eastland.

Tucker was not injured. Two other Carbon youths, Mike Stanley, 22, and Randy Peck, 18, were treated at Eastland Hospital and later released.

Highway Patrolman Gary Brewer investigated.

Young Burns, a native of Rising Star and graduate of Rising Star High School, was a Vietnam veteran. He returned from that theater about a month ago and was sent to a U. S. Army installation in England for a month. He had just returned from that assignment and was preparing to report to Fort Hood for further duty Thursday morning.

Peanut Crop Is Better Than Expected, Processors Report

Favored with good open weather for most of the harvest season, the peanut crop in Eastland county was better than 50 per cent about ground and in storage this week. The nuts were moving to processing plants in and increasing tempo as the week advanced.

Reports from processing plants in this area indicate that the yield and grade in general are better than was anticipated at the beginning of the harvest season.

Jerry Winfrey of the Winfrey Feed and Peanut Company in Rising Star, estimated that the crop in the Rising Star area was about 60 to 65 per cent harvested. Irrigated peanuts, which there has

been a considered increase have been running high in grade, from 70 to 76 per cent and better, Mr. Winfrey said, while the yield has been better than expected. Dry land peanuts are grading less but are holding in good quality Winfrey said. He estimated that his plant has handled between 2,500 and 2,750 tons so far.

James Cox, manager of the Pioneer Farmers Coop plant at Pioneer said the yield will approximate that of last year. In both grade and volume the crop is better than expected, he said.

Overall, the grade will run from 70 to 73, he said, "although we have had some

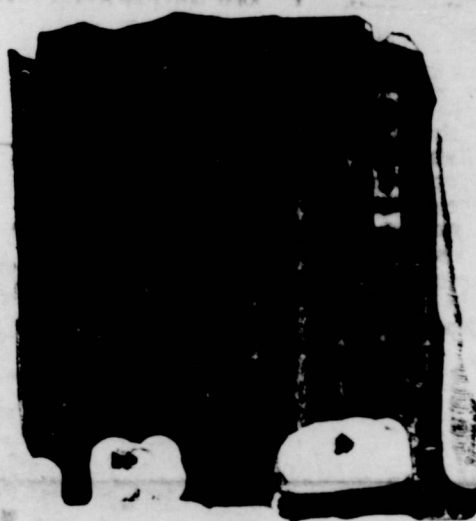

Rising Star was facing a new experience in April 1929, that of having a Country Club. The new club was being developed on a tract of land acquired from The Phillips Petroleum Co., about six miles west of Rising Star and Cross Plains. The club was to be shared by both towns.

A group of Latin American workers were grubbing fairways and cleaning grounds east of the Philpeco Lake.

A caretakers home was under construction. A large room to be used by club members joined the home, where cold drinks, cigars, golf balls and tees and various articles to fill the needs of members and visitors, could be bought. Two double tennis courts were completed under the direction of Dr. R. G. Head, local dentist. Croquet grounds nearby and greens were started.

Fishing was started on May 1, under the supervision of the caretaker, who was provided with a game warden's commission. Fish and game laws were strictly enforced.

A bath house was being built for the convenience of members and their families and guests. The bathing beach was located at the north end of the lake near the railroad crossing.

The Boy Scout campsite was laid out at the north end of the golf course. Huts built of logs donated by the Phillips Petroleum Co. were set up in the woods. A baseball diamond and other playgrounds were available.

Club members from larger cities visited the new property and were profuse in their praise of the entire layout.

Membership lists both at Rising Star and Cross Plains were filled.

(Continued from Page One) grades of 80 and several of 75 and 76 per cent."

The Pioneer plant draws from the western Eastland county areas, from eastern Callahan and it has had several loads from Baird and Clyde vicinities.

Mr. Cox said that he estimates that the plant has processed to date about 50 per cent of what it can expect to handle.

With the continuance of dry and favorable weather, however, it was expected that the harvest would be practically completed within the next two or three weeks. Already there were lone lines of waiting trucks awaiting dryers.

The crop during the past three years has meant an annual farm income to the county of more than \$5 millions. It is the largest single source of cash to the economy of the area.
