

Grain Elevator Burned Tuesday

Fire destroyed the grain elevator at Bradshaw Tuesday afternoon. The fire was reported about 3:30, and the Winters Fire Department answered the call but firemen were unable to save the grain holding bin. The steel elevator leg was left stand-

ing, but was greatly damaged. Workmen were in process of dismantling the elevator and from the pit the day before. It was thought that a spark from a cutting torch used is the dismantling dropped into the dry timbers of the holding bin. Loss was estimated at about \$250.
