W. J. Yates, 72,  
Died Thursday,  
Service Saturday

Funeral services were held Saturday at 10:30 a. m. from Spill Memorial Chapel for Willis J. Yates, 72. Officiating were the Rev. Virgil James, pastor of the Southside Baptist Church and the Rev. Harry Grantz, pastor of the First Baptist Church. Burial was in Northview Cemetery.

Mr. Yates suffered an apparent heart attack while having his pickup serviced at a service station Thursday, April 18, at 1:50 p. m. He was taken to the Winters Municipal Hospital, but was dead on arrival.

Willis J. Yates was born near Ebony in Mills County, April 25, 1895. He married Ola Egger at Ebony Aug. 19, 1917. The family moved to Rannels County in January, 1924, settling on a farm east of Winters, where they lived until 1937 when they moved to Winters. He was a stockfarmer and stock trader. He was a veteran of World War I, when he served in the Army, and was a member of Roy Scoggins Post of the American Legion in Winters.

Survivors include his wife; one son, Charles Yates of Odessa; five daughters, Mrs. Baxter J. Wilson and Mrs. Delbert L. Gunn, both of San Antonio; Mrs. Ernest Stehle of Tulsa, Okla.; Mrs. M. L. Guy of Winters and Mrs. John A. Sowers of Arlington; two sisters, Mrs. Lee Hobbs and Mrs. Raymond Shaw, both of Albuquerque, N. M.; a twin brother, Miles Yates of Pueblo, Colo.; twelve grandchildren and one great-grandson. Two children preceded him in death.

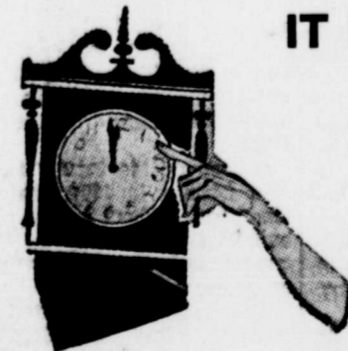

up. They'd probably have given anything to have something done about it before their long troubles were ended a few weeks ago.

Winters has only one garbage pickup truck. It was bought about five years ago, and it needs replacing right now, because maintenance necessary to keep it going is beginning to cost a lot of money. The small amount of the increase in charges will help to relieve a lot of pressure, and assure Winters' residents they will not be forced to live in filth.

Everybody seems to be taking polls of some sort, now that the politicians have been beating the bushes about the state. One pollster will say one thing, and then another will come out with entirely different "findings"—it all depends on who's paying the bill to have the polls taken.

John Purifoy of Ballinger was in Winters last week, and said he had just completed taking a poll on the governor's race. And his "findings" are really about as substantial as any other. Mrs. Rankin (Laura Kittrell) Pace is retiring from the post office after 48 years. Mrs. Pace is a member of the Texas Historical Association, Edwards Plateau Historical Association, and the Runnels County Historical Survey Committee. She also is a member of the American Legion Auxiliary and the National Association of Postal Supervisors. A member of the Methodist church, she teaches a ladies' Sunday School class.

Mrs. Pace says she plans to do some traveling after her retirement, to pursue her hobby of tracing her family lineage.

### LEGAL NOTICE

An Ordinance defining the various kinds of garbage, regulating the kinds and size of receptacles in which to place same, the manner of its preparation and where it must be placed to be collected by the City Garbage Department; providing regulations for collecting same; providing for service charges; providing collection methods; prohibiting the meddling, scattering contents or piling with garbage cans, trash or rubbish receptacles; prohibiting junking or carrying off the premises of the dump ground any article or junk; prohibiting the collection of garbage, trash or rubbish by others than city forces within the city limits; providing a savings clause; providing a repealing clause; and declaring an emergency.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WINTERS, TEXAS:

Section 1. This ordinance shall be known as the "garbage ordinance" of the City of Winters. The word "premises" as used in this ordinance shall be taken to mean business houses, boarding houses, theatres, hotels, restaurants, cafes, eating houses, tourist camps, apartments, sanitariums, rooming houses, schools, private residences, vacant lots and all other places

within the City Limits of the City of Winters where garbage, trash or rubbish accumulates in ordinary quantities.

The various kinds of garbage shall be defined as follows:

(a) By the term "kitchen garbage" as used in this ordinance is meant, dry kitchen refuse, all meat, vegetable and fruit refuse, small dead animals and dead fowls, from any premises within the City Limits.

(b) By the term "dry kitchen refuse" is meant the solids after the liquid or slop has been drained off.

(c) By the term "trash" is meant paper of all kinds, rags, old clothing, paper containers, old rubber, pieces of wood, boxes, barrels, crates, feathers, weeds, grass, tree limbs, from any premises within the City Limits.

(d) By the term "rubbish" as used in this ordinance, is meant tin cans, bottles, glass, scraps of iron, wire or any other metals from any premises within the City Limits.

Section 2. It shall be the duty of every person, firm or corporation owning, managing, operating, leasing or renting any premises, or any place where "kitchen garbage" accumulates, to provide a portable garbage can constructed of galvanized iron, tin or other suitable metal, with a tight fitting cover of a capacity not less than five (5) gallons nor over thirty-two (32) gallons and the daily accumulation of kitchen garbage and dry kitchen refuse shall be placed in this garbage can, and it shall also be the duty of every person, firm or corporation owning,

managing, operating, leasing or renting any premises to place all trash and rubbish from said premises in boxes, sacks or barrels or other receptacles of reasonable size, provided that the gross weight does not exceed 50 (fifty) pounds. Garbage cans, boxes, sacks or barrels of trash and rubbish and tree limbs (which shall be cut into lengths not exceeding four feet) shall, where an alley is accessible, be placed inside the property line at the edge of the alley, where there are no fences; where there is a back fence, garbage cans, boxes, sacks or barrels of trash, rubbish and tree limbs, shall be placed outside and against the fence in the alley. Where there is not accessible alley all kitchen garbage, trash and rubbish shall be placed inside the curb line of the street, on day of collection only, to be collected by the City Garbage vehicles.

Section 3. The places of wholesale accumulations, such as killing and dressing plants for fowl, wholesale fruit and vegetable houses, where the daily accumulation of kitchen garbage, trash and rubbish is more than the ordinary quantities, shall make special arrangements with the City Garbage Department for the daily pickup of such garbage, trash and rubbish.

Section 4. Heavy dead animals, such as cows, horses and mules shall be delivered to the City incinerator at the expense of the owner or person having same in charge in the manner and by the method directed by the designated official.

Section 5. Heavy accumulation such as brick, broken concrete, lumber, ashes, dirt and plaster, sand or gravel, automobile frames and parts, dead trees, and other bulky, heavy material shall be disposed of at the expense of owner or person controlling same under the direction of the designated official.

Section 6. Manure from cowlots, horse stables, poultry yards, pigeon lofts and waste oil from garages or filling stations shall be disposed of at the expense of the party responsible for same under the direction of the designated official.

Section 7. Entrance into the City Garbage Dump shall be limited to the following:

(a) City vehicles.

(b) Vehicles operated by persons presenting a "City Dumping Permit" to the caretaker. Such permit to be issued by a designated city official at a charge of \$5.00 (fifty cents) per month provided it does not cause any undue hardship on City employees to dispose of garbage such as shingles from hail storms, etc., in such case a special charge of \$10.00 per month will be levied. Such permit may be issued to any applicant, living within or without the City of Winters, and may be revoked by the designated official at any time, where, in his opinion, it is advisable to do so to protect the best interest of the City.

(c) Any person, firm or corporation who is currently paying the monthly garbage charge who wishes to haul trees, shrubbery, grass or weed clippings, brick, concrete or accumulation of heavy and bulky materials to the City Garbage Dump may obtain a temporary dumping permit from the designated city official at no charge. Such permit shall terminate after forty-eight (48) hours.

Section 8. The City Garbage Department will not make collection of kitchen garbage, trash or rubbish or tree limbs where same is not prepared for collection and placed as designated by the terms of this ordinance and failure to comply with this provision will be an offense and each day's failure to comply with this will constitute a separate offense.

Section 9. The meddling with garbage cans, trash or rubbish

receptacles or in any way piling, scattering contents or junkings in any alley or street within the City Limits is prohibited.

Section 10. Employees of the City and city officials directing operation of the City Garbage Department and persons who have obtained from the City a garbage dumping permit as herein provided delivering garbage or other rubbish to the City Garbage Dump are allowed on other persons are prohibited.

Section 11. All junk and other materials of the Dump Ground at the incinerator is the property of the City of Winters and no person is allowed to separate and collect, carry off or dispose of same except under the direction of the designated official.

Section 12. The collection of garbage, trash and rubbish or any kind of junk within the City Limits is prohibited except as provided for in Sections 3, 4, 5, and 6 of this ordinance.

Section 13. Garbage cans shall be kept in sanitary condition and closed tightly. The contents of all receptacles shall be so protected that the wind cannot blow out and scatter same over the streets, alleys, and premises of the City.

Section 14. There shall be charged, assessed and collected from each unit dwelling, firm or corporation within the City Limits of the City of Winters, Texas, the following monthly service charge for garbage, refuse, trash and rubbish collection and disposal:

(a) For a family unit (which shall be construed to mean any one-family residence or apartment, or any other one-family dwelling) the charge shall be \$1.50 (one dollar fifty cents) per month.

(b) For all premises used primarily for commercial or business purposes, the charge shall not be less than \$3.00 (three dollars) per month, and excess services based upon the actual cost of furnishing garbage collection service, as determined from time to time by the official in charge of the Garbage Department of the City of Winters, Texas.

The above charges shall be paid each month and within 30 days from the date of the monthly bill.

If any person, firm or corporation fails to pay said service charge on or before thirty (30) days from the date of the monthly bill, the garbage collection service shall be discontinued and water service furnished by the City of Winters to such dwelling, firm or corporation shall be discontinued until said delinquent bill is paid.

Billing for garbage service charge shall be listed as a separate item on the water bill sent to each unit dwelling, firm

enacted as an emergency measure, and be in full force and effect upon its passage, and it is so enacted.

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## Winters Had Few People In Early 1900s, But Band Put Town On The Map

Much has been written about the Winters Brass Band, organized in 1901, but little was known about its beginning until a charter member was discovered recently. She is the former Attie Grant, now Mrs. Asa Cordill of Ballinger.

The only living charter member, Mrs. Cordill says that her brother, Charles Tipton, known as Charlie, had played in a band at Denton and thought that Winters had to have a band, so he organized one. He also thought that they should have uniforms.

She recalls that their first uniforms were white middie blouses and dark pants, skirt for her of course. When Charlie called for the band members to be ready for their first formal appearance, the bass player turned up in a lawn blouse with drawing and sailor collar trimmed in embroidered ruffles.

They learned to march down the road, which is now Main Street, to the tune of "Hot Time in the Old Town Tonight." The road was so rough that it was hard to march and play at the same time. Charlie was about the only one who could manage both.

Although the date on the drum in the picture says 1901, Mrs. Cordill says that Charlie actually got the first group together in 1899. The names she recalls were Ben Spill, Albert Spill, George Lollar, Will Meek, Wilder Hunter, Will Burk, Mitchell Overby, Will Ernst, Fritz Ernst, Will Pierce, George Murray and a Mr. Crews.

"In addition to the brass band there was also a string band composed of four of us," says Mrs. Cordill. "Dr. J. H. Grant, who was also my brother, played the violin. I played the mandolin, Charlie the guitar and Mitchell Overby the banjo. We furnished music for all the little entertainments around and had a good time doing it. 'Turkey in the Straw' was one of our numbers that I remember."

Mrs. Cordill recalls playing for a picnic at Fort Chadbourne. And once the band drove over to Crews in the band wagon to put on a show, but when they got there the school building was dark and no crowd, so they drove home again.

"It was quite a feather in its cap for the small town of Winters to have such a band," says Mrs. Cordill. Although the town consisted of only a few people, and the only public meeting place until 1905 was the one room school building, the band was known throughout West Texas.

By 1905 the band had new uniforms, blue with gold stripes, which cost \$15 each. They were the finest that could be bought. Many more young men of the community had joined by this time. Among them were four who are living today. They are Louis and Adolph Ernst, Charlie Adami, and Charlie Kiefer of San Angelo. Ernest Adami joined later.

A band stand was built on the lot in front of the Methodist church. Every Friday night was practice night and the citizens turned out to hear the band practice, as well as to attend concerts on Sunday afternoon. In later years the band stand was moved to Tinkle Park. Where the park was discontinued it was moved to the Tinkle farm.

Traveling in a band wagon drawn by four white horses trips were made to many surrounding towns to play for weddings, box-suppers, picnics, old settlers reunions and political rallies.

Longer trips were made by wagon to Ballinger, the nearest railroad, and continued by train. Brownwood, San Angelo, Coleman and Big Spring were included in the itinerary. Any trip out of town required at least three days and more often the celebration lasted that long.

The most exciting trip they ever made was to Brownwood for the first prohibition campaign in Brown county. "We were hired by the pros and the Granbury band, a third larger than ours, was hired by the antis. We were furnished band wagons and each side had parades for three days," one member recalled.

"The father of Cyclone Davis was the pro speaker and a man named Anthony spoke for the antis. He announced he would speak at the courthouse and we broke up the meeting by marching round the courthouse, carrying kerosene torches, and yelling at the top of our voices. Needless to say, the pros won the election."

Charlie continued to direct the band for 15 years, or longer, until he moved to Corpus Christi. Dr. Grant had moved to Ballinger in 1904, and to Corpus in 1922. During the flood Charlie lost everything he had. He and his family spent the night in Dr. Grant's upstairs office. He later moved to Austin where he and his wife both died. She was the former Mattie Curry, a Winters girl. Their daughter, Mrs. Katherine Gray lives in Austin.

"We've kept up the music in our family," says Mrs. Cordill. "I have an old fashioned pump organ and a cord organ that I try to play. My son, Bill, played in the Christy Brothers circus band for two years, 1927-28." Bill is now employed in the Ballinger post office. Mrs. Cordill's husband was a jeweler in Ballinger for 50 years and died in 1950. There are two daughters, Mrs. James C. Parish of Ballinger and Mrs. O. H. Layton of Fort Worth.

Mrs. Cordill was born in Grandview in 1878, the youngest of seven children. Her father died when she was four years old and the family moved to Denton where she grew up and attended school. The family came to Ballinger in 1895, and her mother moved to Winters in 1899 to be near Dr. Grant, who had come to Winters in 1894.
