The people-and the students, more importantly-of the Win-Independent School District are fortunate that this condition exists here. There are so many schools where such is not the case. There are a good many thousands of teacher positions in schools about the state which are being filled by persons not certificated or basicly trained for the subjects they teach. There just are not enough teachers to go around.

It hasn't been easy to fill all the teacher positions of the Winters system with qualified personnel. It has required a lot of work, and even a lot of traveling and interviewing and sifting on the part of the superintendent and the administration. In the face of a teacher shortage, when all schools are out looking for teachers, it appears at times to be an almost impossible task. One thing has been in favor of the Winters schools, however. Our schools have maintained a position of envy, so to speak, among the ranks of like-size schools. They have been known for the progressiveness of the administrations and the undying cooperation of the public. Teachers, the same as other professions or callings, gravitate toward such a climate. It's important that the public work with the administration and the teachers to keep it that way.



State Commission Sets Waterfowl Season and Limits

The Texas Parks and Wild life Commission in a special called meeting Tuesday set the waterfowl seasons and bag limits for the 1968-69 season.

The duck and coot season will begin one-half hour before sunrise on Dec. 14 and extend through sunset each day through Jan. 12. Daily bag limit is four and may not include more than two wood ducks, one canvasback or one redhead: and two mallards.

Possession limit on ducks is eight and may not include more than four wood ducks and one canvasback or one rehead and four mallards. The daily bag limit on coots is 10 with a possession limit of 20.

· The hunting season for geese and brant will begin one-half hour before sunrise Oct. 30 and . continue each day through sunset through Jan. 12 with a bag and possession limit of five.

In that portion of Texas lying west of U. S. Highway 81, daily bag and possession limit may not include more of the following species than: one Ross's goose and in the alternative one white - fronted goose or one white-fronted goose and one Canada goose or two Canada

East of U. S. Highway 81 the daily bag limit may not include more than one Ross's goose and in the alternative not more than one Canada goose or one whitefronted goose and the possession limit not more than one Ross's goose and in the alternative not more than two Canada geese or one Canada and one white-fronted.

As the result of an auto accident, you are left with continu-

ing pains in your shoulder. At least, so you say. But the driver of the other car thinks you are faking. If it comes to a showdown in court, would your word alone-without supporting evidence - be enough grounds for collecting damages?

That is a difficult question. Accepting a person's unsupported claim of pain may mean throwing the door open to fraud

On the other hand, the pain may be real enough to the vic-

Fortunately, however, there are usually other ways-besides the claimant's own testimonyto establish that he does have

Most persuasive is medical evidence. Although a doctor cannot actually feel a patient's pain, he can find out a great deal through his instruments. For example:

Pain may speed the patient's pulse. It may affect his blood pressure, his metabolism, and is respiration. It may even pu extra zigzags into his electrocardiogram.

Moreover, a doctor can learn much simply by watching a patient's expression. As one judge

'There are symptoms of pain that write their story on one's countenance as clearly as lightning scribbles in the sky.'

Will a court listen also to the non-scientific observations of a layman? Generally Yes, be cause these too may be reveal-

Thus, in one case, an accident pain was proven through the testimony of a fellow patient in his hospital room. The patient vividly recalled the victim's moans, groans, and

Of course, any method of proving that pain is present may also be used to prove that it is absent. Both instruments and observation, both doctor and layman may-in proper circumstances - help to expose false complaints.

One woman, claiming injury in a bus accident, said she had severe pains in her back. But a doctor noticed that when he was touching that area, she winced far too much in some places and far too little in others. Result: she collected nothing
