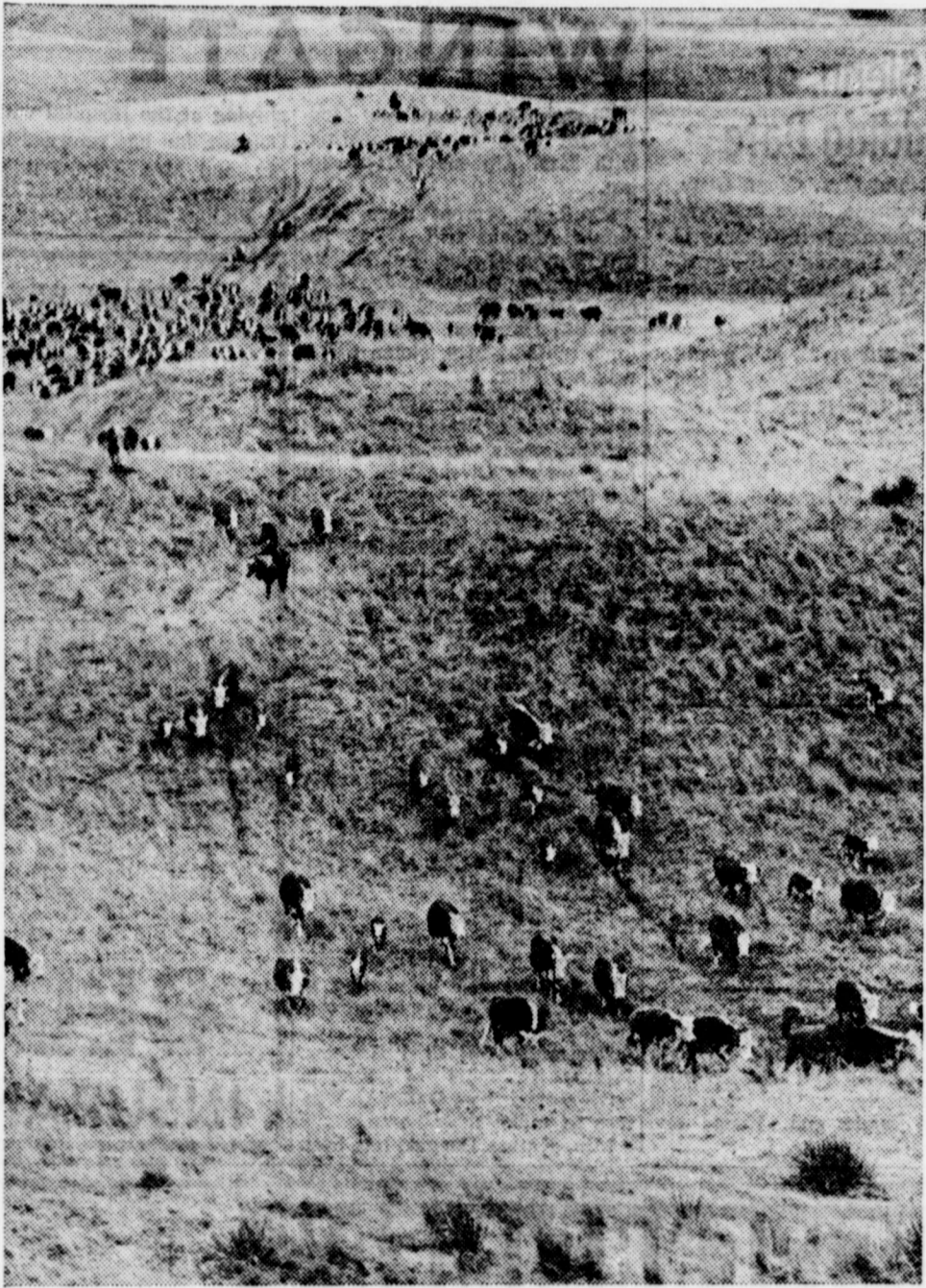

The B girls opened the action at 4:30 by beating the Wylie B girls 32-30. The B team boys also contributed to the victory column by winning 42-40. The varsity games followed.

The Blizzardettes opened the action by losing to a tough Wylie team 63-48. Carla Walker was high with 31 points, but failed to receive the needed help from the other forwards. The girls rematch will begin the challenge match at 7 o'clock Tuesday night in Blizzard gym.

The Blizzard boys seeing their first action of the 1968-69 season played a typical first game. The boys lost to Wylie who had

already played one game this year by the score of 67-46.

The game was nip and tuck with the Wylie boys getting a ten point lead during the first three minutes. That lead never changed until the final two minutes of the game.

carrying with it the stipulation that Winters would not assume any of the indebtedness of the Norton or Ballinger school districts. The question was raised regarding fairness to the Ballinger district having to assume all the indebtedness. It was pointed out that Ballinger was getting all the buildings, which include two school buildings, a gymnasium, agriculture building, fully equipped, and a home economics building, fully equipped, buses, land on which the buildings are located, besides several thousand dollars cash on hand in the old Norton district, and State incentive aid money. Without receiving part of these assets, it was assumed any of the liabilities, which include contracts for five teachers, two of them for two years each, and a debt of approximately \$25,000 on a new building. Assuming these liabilities would also mean that Winters would assume part of the liabilities of the Ballinger School District, it was pointed out.

Valuation of the portion annexed to the Winters district was \$430,436, and of the portion annexed to Bronte, \$139,669.

In the voting on the measure, members of the County Board, W. T. Billups, N. D. Folsom and Eugene Kasberg voted in favor; E. E. King and Herman Prince voted against the motion.

Winters School Superintendent Carroll Tatom, J. W. Bahlman, member of the Winters School Board, and Johnny Bob Smith, Winters School Tax Assessor and Collector, attended the meeting.

Superintendent Tatom said the Winters school bus routes will be changed December 10, and will cover routes in the old Norton District. He said there are about 19 scholastics in the area annexed to Winters. Some of them already are attending Winters schools. He said possible requests for transfers into or out of the district as it stands will be honored.

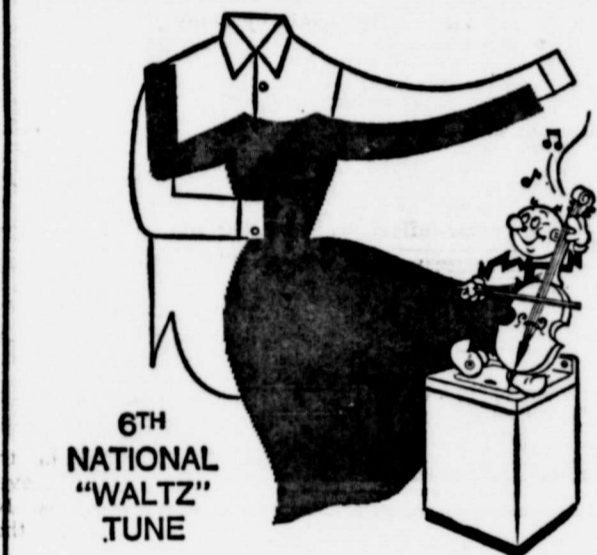

## America's Farmers Can Meet The Challenge

"Today one farm worker in the United States provides the food for himself and more than 42 others," said John G. McHaney, Extension economist at Texas A&M University, in commenting on National Farm-City Week, Nov. 22-28.

It is estimated that the last third of this century will add another 100 million Americans to today's population. But McHaney feels that through the combined efforts of all those associated with agriculture, the challenge to provide an agricultural abundance for this expected large population increase can be met.

The United States has had a strong agricultural economy for many years, and through efficient agricultural production, has been able to release workers to other industries in order that they might produce the other needs and wants of our people, he explained.

Farmers and ranchmen today look toward machinery and fuel producers for their power rather than raising work animals and feed as they did years ago. This is only one example of how people in towns and cities are handling more of the jobs that once were done on the farm or ranch. These people are also a part of the agricultural industry, he emphasized.

The annual value of total agricultural production in Texas, he said, exceeds either the total manufacturing payroll, the total construction awards, or the total retail trade payroll.

Our efficient agricultural industry has been the foundation of our economy and has helped Americans to have the highest level of living in the world. And concluded the economist, National Farm-City Week is a good time for recognizing the achievements of agriculture and those who are a part of the industry.
