Many times worth while organizations are not provided for, and the girls join those which are less desirable. It is hoped that the parents of each teenage girl in the county will think seriously about this matter and will encourage their teenage daughter to become a member. Forest Fires Are Costly To Texas

AUSTIN, Sept. 16. - Texas has burned enough prime pine forest since 1915 to build 50,000 homes for its citizens.

According to figures of the Texas Forest Service and the Texas Insurance Advisory Association, East Texas forest fires annually destroy timber valued at \$2,500,000.

By the end of 1954, Texas will have had an estimated 3,659 forest fires and each will destroy approximately 55 acres of timber. That's enough to fill a train of 40,000 freight cars stretching from Amarillo to Houston.

The carelessness of smokers and campers will account for almost half of the fires. Incendiary blazes will be responsible for more than 30 percent of the loss, and miscellaneous causes will account for the rest.

Peanut Farmers Receiving Checks From Association

Peanut farmers in Texas and the southwestern states, who marketed their 1953 crop through the Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association at Gorman were getting dividends from the associa-

tion, it was learned today. Beginning Wednesday payments were being mailed out at the rate of 1,000 daily until the estimated 15,000 to 16,000 checks have been sent to producers.

The payments will total approximately \$97,000 in cash and equity certificates to the producer. The cash payment of \$1 per ton of the 1953 crop marketed through the association is based on the net ton of farm stock peanuts. In addition there will be a 70 cent per ton equity certifi-cate issued.

The 1954 peanut crop in the southwestern area is now estimated at approximately one half the crop last year. Latest government estimates place this years crop at approximately 70,000 tons as compared with 140,000 tons

produced a year ago.
Some areas which received rains during the summer have reported favorable prospects for a good crop, but on the whole the larger peanut producing areas in the southwest have suffered from drouth conditions this year.

Accident Toll Is Running Ahead Of Last Game Season

AUSTIN, Sept. 18. — The Exceptive Secretary of the Game and Fish Commission said the accident toll for 1954 hunting season was running ahead of the recent yearly rate.

Reports showed four fatalities compared with nineteen deaths from firearms for all of Texas throughout the entire state during the 1953 wildlife harvest.

Two of the deaths involved mourning dove hunters, who came out in force for the north zone opener on September 1.

One hunter was killed by his own shotgun when he stumbled. Another, a 12-year-old boy, died instantly when struck in the head at close range by a shotgun held by his 19-year-old brother.

In the other hunting deaths: A West Texas rancher was killed as he pulled his shotgun toward himself, muzzle first.

A Central Texas boy, age nine years, was fatally wounded while squirrel hunting when a rifle held by his brother-in-law was accidentally discharged.

The Executive Secretary said actual game shooting results in the north dove zone were "generally satisfactory." He said reports from some areas indicated a high dove population while other field observations showed that the doves, as is their nature, "were here today and gone tomorrow."

The Executive Secretary said game wardens' reported fairly good hunter discipline, with some violations concerning over-limits and a few involving shooting bobwhite quail. The quail season under the General State Law does not open until December 1. Some arrests have been made for taking doves in the South Zone where the season does not open until October 1.

GOOD SUPPLY OF WINTER COVER CROP SEED FORECAST FOR U.S.

last year.

AUSTIN, Sept. 7.—Production of hairy vetch seed in Texas this year is estimated by the Crop Reporting Board of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, at 7,450,000 pounds, compared with 7,800,000 pounds in 1953. Acreage harvested, at 52,000 acres, is down 20 percent from a year ago, but is 14 percent above the 1943-52 average. Yield at 145 pounds per acre is 25 pounds above the 1953 yield and only slightly less than the 1943-52 average of 149 pounds.

The total production of Austrian Winter peas, vetch and ryegrass seed in the United States is forecast at 217,745,000 pounds of clean seed, 24 percent larger than last year's production of 175,579,000 pounds and 5 percent above the 1943-52 average of 207,114,000 pounds. The much larger production of Austrian Winter peas and the record ryegrass seed crops this year more than offset the decline in production of vetch seed. Farm, dealer, and Government carry-overs of these seeds on June 30 totaled approximately 61 million pounds, which is less than half the quantity (about 127 million pounds) carried over a year ago.

Production of Austrian Winter peas is forecast at 53,600,000 pounds, 65 percent larger than last year's crop of 32,525,000 pounds but 36 percent below the 1943-52 average of 93,572,000 pounds. On June 30, 1954 only an estimated 3,609,000 pounds of these peas were carried over by rowers and dealers and none by the Government, compared with 50,596,000 pounds last year on the same date when the Government alone owned and controlled 46,-203,000 pounds of old seed.

This year's production of vetch seed is forecast at 54,425,000 pounds, 18 percent less than the

66,514,000 pounds in 1953 and 21 percent below the 10-year average of 69,237,000 pounds. Production of common and Willamette vetch, showing the largest decline from last year among the vetches, is estimated at 10,910,000 pounds, compared with 18,640,000 pounds last year and the 10-year average of 30,489,000 pounds. Carry-over of "other vetches" (mostly common) on June 30 was 10,367,000 pounds, compared with 26,427,000 pounds

The 1954 crop of hairy-vetch seed, forecast at 35,595,000 pounds, is the smallest in 6 years and compares with 38,874,000 pounds in 1952 and the average of 30,938,000 pounds. Carry-over of this seed, mostly by the Government, was 35,355,000 pounds, compared with 33,052,000 pounds last year. Production of purple-vetch seed is forecast at 7,920,000 pounds, compared with 9,000,000 pounds in 1953 and the average of 7,810,000 pounds.

This year's crops of common

and prennial ryegrass seed are indicated to be the largest on record. Production of common ryegrass is forecast at 93,000,000 pounds, 52 percent larger than the 1953 crop of 61,000,000 pounds and nearly twice the average of 48,410,000 pounds. The 1954 production of perennial ryegrass, estimated at 16,720,000 pounds, is 8 percent larger than last year's previous record crop of 15,540,000 pounds and nearly three times the 1943-52 average of 5,895,000 pounds. Carry-overs of common ryegrass are estimated at 8,529,000 pounds this year and 13,207,000 pounds last year, while carry-overs of perennial ryegrass are estimated at 3,447,000 and 3,894,000 pounds respectively.
