Of course we are mostly aware at all times—or pretend to be—the "big picture," but fail to recognize the welders of the brushes which make the fine strokes to build the whose. # City's Income Up During 1969

Audit of the books of the City of Winters indicates that the City's income for the year ended Sept. 3, 1969, was up from the previous fiscal year, but an increase in expenses counteracted the slight increase.

The audit was completed shortly before the first of the year and a report made to the City Council recently. Auditors were Cherry, Eckert and Story, Certified Public Accountants of San Angelo.

Statements of revenue and expenses of all departments of the City show that income was up for all departments except for the hospital, with expenses taking a like increase. This will be the last fiscal year the Municipal Hospital will show on the City's books, as all assets of the Winters hospital were transferred to the North Runnels County Hospital District effective Oct. 1, 1969.

**GENERAL FUND**  
Revenue for the General Fund of the City of Winters, as indicated in the statement of revenue and expenses, rose to \$216,311.95 for the fiscal year ended Sept. 30, 1969. The previous year's figures showed revenue at \$181,938.01. However, some of the increase reflected in the last audit included the gift of a building to the City by Humble Oil Co., valued at

\$13,246.00 on the books. Also, payments from insurance companies for damage received on City property during the June 12, 1969, hailstorm is included in this revenue column. This amounted to \$12,054.37, but was offset in the expense column following repairs.

Ad valorem taxes received during the 1969 fiscal year were down, according to the statement of revenue and expenses: \$89,906.74; the previous year, this amounted to \$93,119.93.

Several other revenue sources in the General Fund also showed some increase: Park revenue was up from \$2,823 for 1968 to \$3,410 for 1969; and interest on investments up from \$15,208 to \$19,772.

**WATER FUND**  
Operating revenue for the Municipal Waterworks showed an increase over the previous year \$64,877.02, against \$61,932.85 for the previous fiscal period. Actual water sales were \$60,556.85, with miscellaneous income making up the difference.

Operating expenses for the water department climbed to \$46,287.92 from \$41,433.38 for the previous year.

Non-operating expenses charged to the water department included \$16,417.79 depreciation and \$3,535.00 interest on bonded debt.

**ELECTRIC FUND**  
Electric power charges amounted to \$143,826.11 for the year in the Electric Department, with a total of \$150,177.00 total operating revenue. Insurance claims amounted to \$2,941.29, classified as operating (Continued on Page 6)

**Car Plates Are Here, To Go On Sale February 2**  
New 1970 motor vehicle license plates have been received by the Winters sub-office of the Runnels County Tax Assessor-Collector, but will not go on sale until February 2.

The new system of issuing plates to vehicle owners goes into effect this year. Most owners already have received the envelopes from the Texas Highway Department containing the license plate renewal application. These may be mailed to the assessor-collector's office, or vehicle owners may pick up their plates in person.

Mrs. Ted Meyer, deputy in the local office, said plates for this office have prefixes of HPG, HPH and HPJ.

## County Judge Rumpy Announces For Re-Election

Runnels County Judge W. H. Rumpy announced this week his candidacy for re-election to that office, on the Democratic ticket.

Judge Rumpy has been Runnels County Judge since appointment by the Commissioners Court No. 27, 1951, to fill an unexpired term. He was a State Representative from 1940 until 1951, but resigned that office to become County Judge.

Rumpy was manager of the Winters Chamber of Commerce from 1943 for about seven years, was in the retail business a year, and then was again named Chamber of Commerce manager.

## Davis and Dry Sign For Winters School Board

Two candidates have filed for the two vacancies which will occur on the Board of Trustees of Winters Independent School District.

Willis Davis, incumbent member of the board, has filed for re-election. J. P. Dry, general manager of Dry Manufacturing Division, Wallace-Murray Corporation, has filed as a candidate.

Raymond Lloyd, the other member of the board whose term of office expires this year, announced this week he would not seek re-election. He has been a member of the board, and has been secretary of the board, for 15 years. He first was elected in April, 1955.

Election will be Saturday, April 4, with deadline for filing 30 days prior to the election.

## Calendar For 1970-71 School Year Is Approved By School Administration

The calendar for the 1970-71 school year has been approved by the administration and board of the Winters Independent School District, Superintendent Carroll Tatom has announced.

Effective next school year, all teachers are required to be on contract and on duty 190 days, and school must be in session a minimum of 180 days, in compliance with State statute.

Regular classroom work will begin Monday, August 24, with May 25 to be the last regular day of school. Make-up days to compensate for bad weather, if any, will be added to the end of the school year.

## Voter Certificates Issued To 856 In Local Sub-Office

With only two weeks to go before the cut-off date for issuance of voter registration certificates, the Winters sub-office of the Runnels County Tax Assessor was doing a fairly brisk business.

Mrs. Ted Meyer, deputy in the Winters sub-office, said Monday that to that time 856 certificates had been issued in the local office. Many more North Runnels residents probably have registered through the main office at Ballinger, she said.

Mrs. Meyer also said she expects a good many more certificates to be issued here before the deadline.

To be eligible to vote in any election during the 1970 voting year, otherwise eligible residents must register not later than January 31. Mrs. Meyer said that although the local office will not be open on Saturday, January 31, the deadline date, applications for registration certificates mailed to the office and postmarked not later than January 31, will be honored.

Ground breaking ceremonies will be held Sunday by Winters' First United Methodist Church for construction of a new church building. It is hoped actual construction will begin in the spring, according to spokesmen for the church.

Dr. William Greenwaldt, District Superintendent of the Brownwood District, Central Texas Conference, will preside for the ground breaking service, which will be held immediately following regular morning worship services. Dr. Greenwaldt will also deliver the morning sermon.

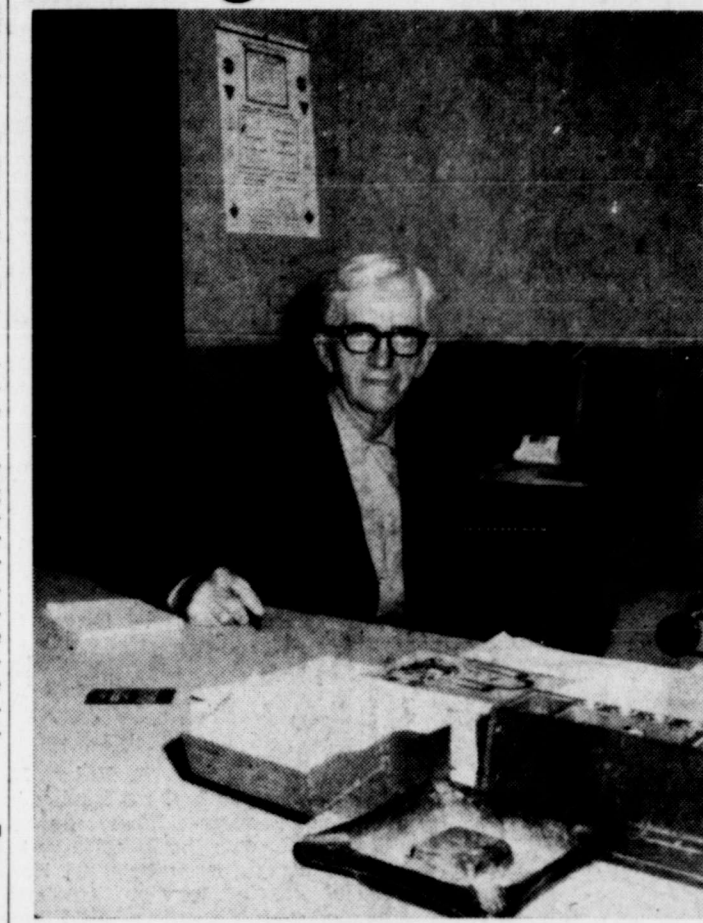

Plans are to begin demolition of the present church building in February, the Rev. Bowman said, with hopes of beginning construction in the spring.

The new church building will cost approximately \$105,000, it was stated. Part of the old building will be left to be used for classrooms, fellowship hall and choir rooms, with the new structure to be tied to the old building. New construction will be about 72000 square feet, with 4-400 square feet in the sanctuary. Main entrance to the new sanctuary will be on the southeast corner, on Church Street, with pulpit and organ on the north.

The organ for the new sanctuary has been given to the church by Mr. and Mrs. Donald C. Chapman of Columbus, Ohio. The organ will cost \$40,000. Mr. Chapman was reared in Winters.

# Hensley Sells Control of Wingate Security Bank

Controlling interest in The Security State Bank of Wingate has been sold to George D. Crews, Brownwood banker, Duncan Hensley, who has been president and principal stockholder of the bank for many years, announced this week.

Crews is president of The Southwest State Bank of Brownwood.

Press Galloway of Farmington, N. M., will move to Wingate to manage the bank, it was learned. It was not known when Galloway would take over management of the bank.

Hensley will remain for an indefinite time as manager of the bank, until the new manager takes over, he said.

The Wingate bank was established in 1917 as a private bank and operated as such until September, 1958, when a State charter was obtained and the name changed to The Security State Bank.

Duncan Hensley has been associated with the bank since April 1, 1920, when he became cashier. Through the years he acquired a majority of the stock. The late John Q. McAdams, founder and president of The Winters State Bank, was a minority stockholder, and Hensley and McAdams owned the bank until the State charter was issued in 1958 and stock sold to other individuals to meet requirements of the State banking regulations.

A regular consolidated report of condition of The Security State Bank at the close of business on December 31, 1969, revealed that total assets of the bank amounted to \$1,212,746.69. Total deposits were \$1,042,387.29, and loans \$523,168.20. Total par value of common stock was \$52,500.00.

Miss Leila Harter is cashier of The Security State Bank, and Mrs. Ruby Bryan, bookkeeper. Directors of the bank at the time of the sale were Hensley, president; Raymond Dunn, vice president; Leila Harter, cashier; and T. A. Smith and Larry Hensley.

The bank was originally located in a frame building across the street from the present location. That building burned, and the bank re-opened in another building on the same side of the street, the building now occupied by a laundry. The present building was erected in 1924.

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## "Follow Instructions" Is Advice When Registering Motor Vehicles

The Texas Highway Department is sporting a red face.

In recent news releases announcing the new computerized motor vehicle registration system, Department information specialists wrote:

"Easy-to-follow instructions are printed on the three-part form."

That must be a mistake—because a lot of motorists haven't been following instructions. And mistakes generate confusion.

This is the first year that the Department has gone to the new system, which includes an order-by-mail program for obtaining 1970 motor vehicle license plates.

But just to make sure that motorists do understand the "easy-to-follow instructions," they are:

1. Each motorist whose vehicle was registered last year has or will receive in the mail a long, narrow envelope with a printed message on the front reading: "Important—This is Your License Plate Renewal Application."

2. The envelope will contain a three-part form. Do Not Separate The Three Parts.

3. You may renew your motor vehicle license registration during January and February by mailing the three-part form (intact) and your check to your county tax collector. Add \$1 for postage and handling charges for each vehicle. License plates will be mailed February 1 and thereafter.

4. You may renew your motor vehicle license registration during February and March by taking the three-part form (intact) and your check to the tax collector's office or substation.

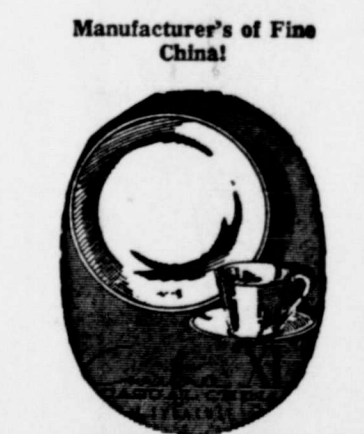

### Credit Cards No Good For Payment Of Income Taxes

The Internal Revenue Service announced today that it has not entered into any arrangements with banks or others for the payment of taxes by credit card or through any other credit means. The IRS said it will not accept credit cards and that any credit arrangement for the payment of federal taxes is strictly between the taxpayer and his bank or other credit company.

On the other hand, if a check or other document issued by a bank or credit company and used by a taxpayer in payment of taxes is acceptable by the Federal Reserve District concerned as a negotiable instrument for banking purposes, it will be accepted by the IRS. The IRS said, however, that if a check or similar instrument is not honored by the bank on which it is drawn, the taxpayer may be subject to penalties.

The tax laws provide a penalty of \$5.00. This is in addition to other penalties and interest for non-payment of taxes.

### 7773 Bales In

Ras Gideon, manager of the Winters Warehouse, said Tuesday morning that 7773 bales of cotton from the 1969 crop have been brought to the warehouse from North Runnels County gins.

Although harvest of the crop is just about completed, there still is some cotton in the fields which must be gathered, as weather permits.

The USDA Cotton Classing Office in Abilene reports that 7,800 samples were classed for the week ending January 16, compared to 3,500 for the same period last year. The season's total for the area served by the Abilene office is now 228,500 samples classed, compared to 453,500 a year ago.

B. B. Manly Jr., in charge of the Abilene office, reports that grades are holding fairly steady with 22 percent in the white category, 65 percent in the light category, with 42 and 52 the two predominant grades at 40 percent and 24 percent respectively. Twelve percent of the samples were in the spotted category and 23 percent were reduced in grade because of bark. This is an increase of 7 percent over last week. Two percent of the samples classed were below grade.

The Consumer and Marketing Service, Abilene, reports average gross prices for some predominant qualities are: 5129 brought 17.45; 5130 brought 18.05; 4229 brought 18.30; 4230 brought 18.85; 5229 brought 16.85 and 5230 brought 17.35.

revenue. Revenue for the previous year was \$134,562.77.

Operating expenses were higher than the previous year, partly because of increased cost of materials and labor. Some increase was noted in line maintenance, laid to damage to uninsured property, such as meters, which were damaged during the June 12 hailstorm.

Operating expenses for the previous year were \$90,742.17—for fiscal 1969, \$107,143.98.

Non-operating expenses amounted to \$19,842.90 for depreciation, and \$7,441.25 interest on bonded debt.

### HOSPITAL FUND

Total revenue for the Winters Municipal Hospital for fiscal 1969 was \$78,524.34, \$3,578.86 of which was for an insurance claim. Room service amounted to \$32,702.00.

Total expenses for the year were \$96,740.32.

### INVESTMENTS

The City of Winters received \$18,129.45 in interest on investments of various funds during the fiscal year. These are funds, such as taxes, which are received within a short period of time of the year but which are earmarked for later use and invested until needed.

Some of the City's contingent funds are invested in U. S. Treasury Bonds, but most are in certificates of deposit with the Winters State Bank.


