



On the other hand, if a check or other document issued by a bank or credit company and used by a taxpayer in payment of taxes is acceptable by the Federal Reserve District concerned as a negotiable instrument for banking purposes, it will be accepted by the IRS. The IRS said, however, that if a check or similiar instrument is not honored by the bank on which it is drawn, the taxpayer may be subject to penalities.


