Savings Bond Sales In September \$4577 For Runnels County

September sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds in Runnels County totaled \$4577, according to a report from E. C. Grindstaff, Chairman of the Runnels County Savings Bonds Committee. A total of \$60,595 has been purchased in this county since January 1. This figure represents 20 per cent of the 1970 goal of \$310,000. Texans purchased \$15,033,393 in Savings Bonds during the month compared to \$14,480,583 for the same period a year ago—an increase of 3.8 per cent. Sales for the nine-month period were \$136,303,218 for 76 per cent of the yearly goal of \$179.9 million.

Nationally, new purchases of Series E and H Bonds totaled \$351 million, 9.4 per cent above 1969 sales of \$321 million. The first nine month sales were \$3,501 million—3.9 per cent above a year earlier. Exchanges of Series E for new Series H Bonds amounting to \$182 million were reported for the first

Educator Center Gets Drivocator For Area Schools

The first of two Drivocator vans which will be used in driver education classes throughout the service area of Region XV were delivered this week to the Education Center in San Angelo.

The Texas Education Agency purchased 31 drivocators for contract use by the 20 Education Service Centers in Texas. The two vans that have been contracted to Region XV will be used from four to seven weeks by schools in the 18-county area. The Brownwood Public Schools will be the first in Region XV to use the van in driver education classes.

Because driver training is not included in the regular curriculum of Winters Public Schools, it will be next spring before one of the vans is brought to Winters, it was understood.

The mobile vans are equipped

with a multi-media system including a filmstrip projector, motion picture projector, tape recorders and other media. The multi-media system supplements the classroom phase of driver education. There are currently 18 drivocator film units which comply with the regulations of the TEA curriculum guide for driver education and are correlated with the six state approved textbooks for driver education.

A two-day training workshop was held last in September to train driver education teachers in methods, techniques and procedures of the multi-media system. The vans are also outfitted with an instructor console which provides a cumulative record of each student's individual performance and a percentage measure of the class. The instructor is able to determine who needs special individual help; and when the majority of the students grasp the lesson, it also frees the instructor from time-consuming testing. In addition the vans have student responders that retain each individual's selected answer until another answer is chosen. This allows the student to re-evaluate his original choice. The student is able to respond to a driving situation, evaluate his own progress and exercise judgment making.

The 12 X 60 feet vans contain 17 tables with two students at each table. The student stations are elevated from front to rear. The van is carpeted paneled and is air conditioned and heated.

Runnels Farmers, Ranchers Earn \$70,268 Assist

Woodrow Hoffman, district conservationist for the Runnels Soil Conservation Service, said Runnels Soil and Water Conservation District Cooperators who have Great Plains Conservation Program contracts earned \$70,268 in cost-share assistance in carrying out their conservation programs.

Hoffman said this cost share assistance was earned for planting 757 acres of cropland to permanent grass; reseeding 1,394 acres of rangeland; constructing and seeding 29 acres of grassed waterways; building 486,295 feet of parallel terraces, 1629 cubic yards of diversion terraces, 5 farm ponds, 54,228 feet of fences, controlling brush on 579 acres, and installing 3,166 feet of pipeline for livestock water.

Hoffman said anyone interested in this program can come by the Soil Conservation Office and get additional information.

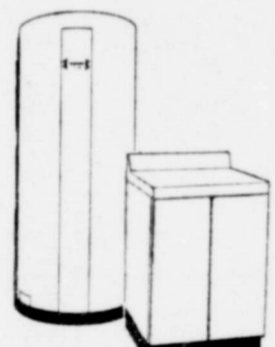

AROUND THE 8-AA FOOTBALL LOOP

The four top teams of 8-AA merized the four bottom teams in middle-conference games last Friday night, piling up 141 points against 22. Eastland goes to Ballinger Friday night, and this probably can be called the Number One game of the district for the week. If Eastland takes this one, they've got another good one coming up with Winters the following Friday, and then to meet Coleman on the 13th!

Winters will meet Hamilton at Winters this week, and this should be interesting... after Hamilton's meeting with Eastland last week. Hamilton previously beat Comanche 26-0, and Winters took Comanche 41-16.

Coleman goes to Clyde this week. Coleman has a 3-1 district score, and Clyde has a 1-3, having beaten only Cisco. Coleman will be working to hold position, in preparation for their coming bouts with Ballinger and Eastland.

Comanche goes to Cisco this week, to decide who remains alone in the cellar.

Altogether, this will be an exciting week of football for 8-AA fans.

A proposal had been made that memberships in the county be transferred to the Concho Valley Council of Governments, with headquarters in San Angelo. Governing bodies of the several memberships — including Runnels County, the City of Winters, the City of Ballinger, and the City of Miles—opposed the transfer, and passed resolutions expressing their desires. Requests were forwarded to Austin that county memberships remain in the original Council.

Councils of Government were established with the idea that several counties, and separate agencies and cities within the counties, could work together to greater benefit in obtaining assistance from the Federal government in any proposed projects which might be undertaken. The Councils act as

clearing houses and planning commissions in assisting membership counties or agencies. All projects, involving Federal funds, must be approved by the Council of which the separate county, district, or city is a member.

An executive committee or board handles the business of the particular COG, with a full time executive director. Pat Pritchard, Commissioner of Runnels County precinct No. 3, is a member of the executive board.
