Division Superintendents of Annual Junior Livestock Show Are Named

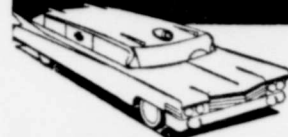
General superintendent and assistant, and division superintendents have been named for the annual Junior Livestock Show, scheduled for Saturday, January 13.

City Searches For Location For Landfill

The City of Winters continues to search for a suitable site for a landfill operation for disposal of garbage and trash, Mayor Wade White said this week.

The present city dump location, southeast of town near the sewer farm, is unsuitable for a landfill operation because of the high water table, Mayor White said. A landfill operation must be comparatively dry, with adequate drainage, to be suitable, he said. An old gravel and caliche pit southwest of the Winters Lake may be utilized as a stop-gap site in the event another site cannot be found, Mayor White said. This area would have suitable drainage, away from the lake, but would not have a large enough area for a long-term operation, he said.

The city has been notified by State agencies that the present city dump is not suitable, and is in violation of anti-pollution regulations, Mayor White said. The city may be notified at any time to discontinue use of the present site, and to dispose of trash and garbage by the landfill method. This method requires digging deep trenches into which refuse is dumped, to be covered with soil taken from the excavation. This eliminates smoke from burning, and reduces the health hazard of flies, rats and other rodents. Some cities have managed to build scenic parks over the covered landfill sites, Mayor White said. This can be accomplished with the right planning in Winters, he said.

Operation of a landfill will require a bulldozer or some other type of dirt digging and moving machinery, it was stated. This additional machinery will have to be purchased by the City, as machinery presently owned is not suitable for this type of work.

Sweepings from the city's streets are being dumped in an old caliche pit in the Winters Lake Area at the present time, the mayor said. This location does not present a drainage problem, and the entire area eventually will be filled and grass planted over the old covered pits to improve the scenic surroundings of the lake, according to plans.

SUPERSTITIONS

Then he cut off the boar's head to retrieve his book and brought the head triumphantly to table.

Lone Star Gas Changes Divisions

W. C. McCord, president of Lone Star Gas Company, today announced a major reorganization of four of the company's operating divisions, as well as the election of a new vice president.

H. H. Merritt, formerly Vice President of the company's Transmission Division, was assigned to the newly consolidated Utility Engineering and Marketing Division in Dallas. Hall's area of responsibility will include the regions of Abilene, Denton, Waco, Wichita Falls and San Angelo.

G. F. Peck, Jr. former Vice President of the Fort Worth Division, will serve in a staff capacity in Fort Worth until his retirement from the company early in 1973.

President McCord stated that all four new operating divisions will be under the direct supervision of Louis B. Hulley, Senior

Vice President for Utility Operations, and that the new realignment and corporate responsibilities are effective immediately.

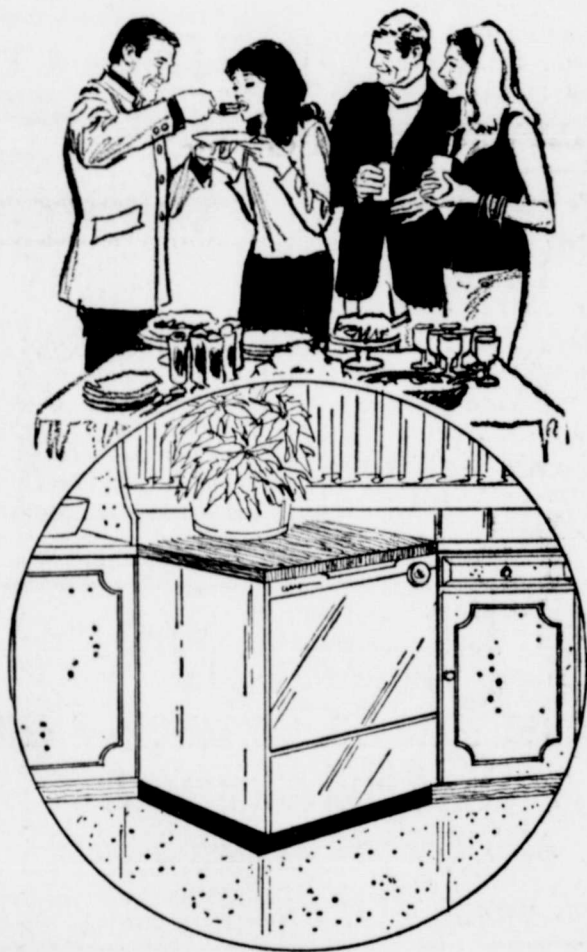

Social Security Rep Sets First Quarter Schedule

The San Angelo Social Security office has scheduled meetings in the several towns in the district for the first three months of 1973.

A representative will be in Winters two days each month to assist people in filing application for benefits. The representative will be in the Winters Chamber of Commerce office from 9:30 to 11:30 a. m., January 15 and 19; February 12 and 26; and March 12 and 26.

If you are unable to talk with the representative personally, you may call the San Angelo office toll free by dialing Operator and asking for Enterprise 2058.

Sidewalk shops and kiosks offer reproductions for sale in glittering array—some of carved wood, some of paper-mache or pottery.

Today, more sophisticated Americans emulate these old-world craftsmen. They make Wise Men, using cans and plastic foam heads embellished with bright and ingenious decorations.

Custom decrees that the Magi be met on Epiphany Eve at the edge of town. In Portugal, young and old go out that night, carrying a variety of food for men and animals. This colorful caravan also offers presents such as artfully arranged bouquets of dried flowers, grasses, and feathers, and splendid metallic palmets bound with beads or mirrors at their centers.

But alas for the welcoming committee, the Magi always seem to slip into town by another road. When the disappointed children have eaten the goodies and returned, they are comforted by finding the Wise Men assembled in the village church. Then they parade in with their wonderful gifts for the wily Kings.

... about your SOCIAL SECURITY

The Social Security Administration's main purpose is to get the right check to the right person on time, said J. M. Talbot, social security manager. But, the vast number of people receiving social security makes it a certainty that some checks will not be received despite the best efforts of the Social Security Administration. Nearly 20 million Americans receive monthly social security benefits in the form of retirement, disability, and death benefits.

Most people receiving social security will get their check by the third of the month. If the check does not come by the sixth, you should immediately report nonreceipt to your nearest social security office. The people at the social security office will immediately begin the necessary steps to see that your missing check is located or that another one is issued in its place.

Mr. Talbot pointed out that one way to avoid having your check come late is to always be sure to notify social security of a change of address or other events which affect your entitlement to benefits.

Willow Creek Project Plan 35% Complete

The work plan development on Willow Creek Watershed in South Runnels County is approximately 35 percent complete.

This is the report the sponsors of the Willow Creek Watershed project received from a report prepared by Joe Camp, the watershed work plan staff leader. The report was prepared December 4.

Consideration for a feasible location for a multi-purpose structure is being studied during the plan development. During the early stages of planning,

the sponsors of this project requested that the planning party look into the possibility of a site for municipal water and recreation area. This decision was based on the fact that while reaching for municipal water, numerous dry holes have been drilled in the Miles area in the past 25 years.

Harvey Kahlden, district conservationist with the Runnels County Soil Conservation Service office, said it appears that the work plan development is moving along satisfactory at this time.

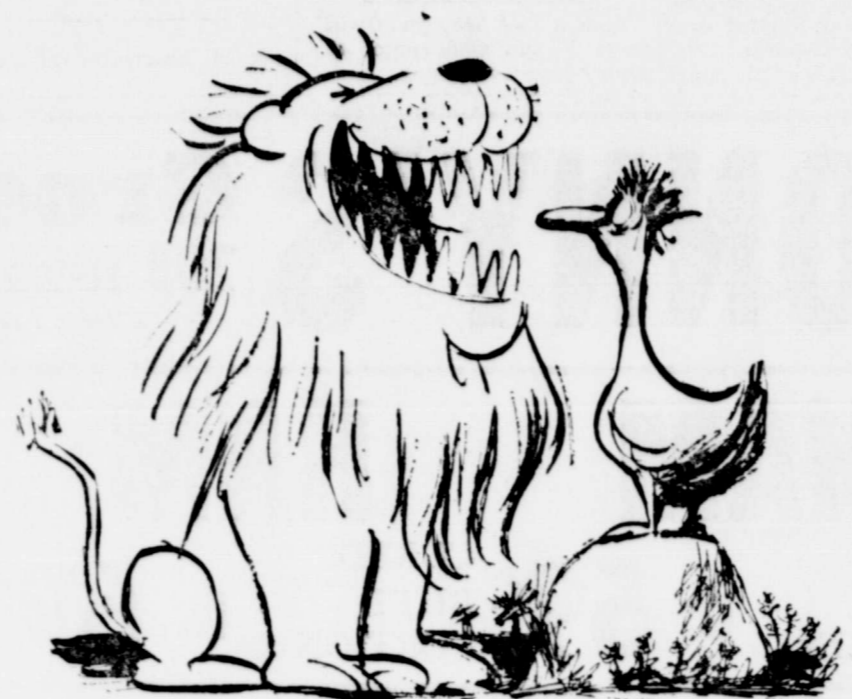

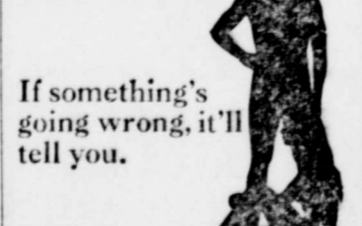

TURKEYS

Let the aroma of roasting turkey set the festive mood for your holiday meals. Always a favorite because it is so delicious and easy to prepare, turkey has through long years of American tradition, become our "holiday bird."

To enjoy a turkey dinner in Grandma's day, you had to buy a big bird and start preparing it early in the day, if not the day before. But today, because turkeys are produced in a wide range of sizes, you can find just the size to suit your needs.

If you're a homemaker who wants a traditional turkey dinner, but something smaller or more convenient, then turkey parts or a boneless turkey roast can solve your problems. Turkey parts—halves, quarters, drumsticks and pieces—although priced somewhat higher per pound than the whole bird, are excellent choices for small meals when no left-overs are desired.

Whether you choose a whole turkey, boneless turkey roast, or turkey parts, you'll be pleased with the wide selection at your grocer's. You should have a wider choice than usual because supplies are abundant. New-crop turkey marketings are expected to be 8 percent greater than in December, 1971, and cold storage holdings for the holiday season will probably top last years.

Besides abundant supplies of turkeys, your grocer has lots of the delicious food-mates that go so well with traditional holiday turkey—fresh cranberries and cranberry sauce, apple sauce, fresh oranges, tangelos and tangerines.

The biggest challenge of preparing a holiday meal featuring turkey is not the actual preparation of the turkey, but what to do with the left-over turkey after the meal. Naturally, some will be used for delicious sandwiches of hot or cold turkey and cranberry relish—but what about the other meals that must be planned so the bird will be consumed without the family getting "turkeyed-out?" Here are some serving suggestions to help you plan interesting and varied meals featuring left-over turkey.

TURKEY DIVAN
1 pkg. frozen broccoli
4 cooked slices of turkey meat
Grated, sharp Cheddar cheese
1 can cream of mushroom soup condensed
1/3 c. milk
Cook frozen broccoli according to package instructions. Arrange cooked and drained broccoli in shallow baking dish; top with four generous cooked turkey slices. Blend together 1 can undiluted cream of mushroom soup and milk. Pour mixture over turkey. Sprinkle generously with grated, sharp Cheddar cheese. Bake in very hot oven (450 degrees) about 10-15 minutes or until well heated and nicely browned. Makes 4 servings.

TURKEY CURRY IN AVOCADO
2 T. butter
2 T. flour
1 1/2 c. milk
1/2 tsp. curry powder
1/2 tsp. salt
1/4 c. finely chopped onion
1 T. lemon juice
2 c. diced cooked turkey
2 medium size avocados
Melt butter in sauce pan, stir in flour and milk, cook until thickened. Add curry powder, salt, and finely chopped onion, lemon juice and cooked turkey.

Bring to boiling point and immediately remove from heat. Cut avocados into halves, lengthwise, and remove seeds and skins. Place avocados in baking dish, cut side up and heap with hot turkey mixture. Bake in 300 degree F. oven about 10 minutes—just long enough to warm the avocado. Sprinkle with sesame seeds and serve. Makes 4 servings.

Obscure Bishop Was First St. Nick

St. Nicholas, the Bishop of Myra, born in the fifth century in Patara, Turkey, was a living legend during his lifetime because of his love of people and his charity.

Nicknamed fondly Noel Baba, he was known as the saint of virgins, for helping poor and unmarried girls to secure dowries for marriage.

He was also the favorite of

seaman. Even pirates respected him because of his uncanny sixth sense about weather.

His bones, believed to have curative powers, were stolen from his tomb and carried to Bari, Italy, 1087, where they rest.

Why is St. Nicholas associated with Christmas?

Festivities of St. Nicholas Day which falls on Dec. 6, used to extend until Christmas time, and were so popular that finally the two were incorporated into one—making St. Nicholas the symbol of Christmas.

The St. Nicholas Festival found its way into the United States with Dutch emigrants and St. Nicholas' name gradually became Santa Claus.

No Christmas services are held in the Church of St. Nicholas in downtown Demre (ancient Myra) because there are no priests or any Christians here now.

The church, with a gendarme station and trees blocking its view from the street, has now been completely restored by the Moslem Turks.

The interior is lighted through

glass-covered arched windows behind the altar. Mosaics on the floor of the 48 by 24-foot nave and frescoes of saints on the walls inside the church and the

courtyard are still visible. In one of the two side aisles of the church is the sarcophagus of Santa Claus, with a marble cover on which two reclining

figures have been carved—that of an adult, perhaps St. Nicholas, and a child.

Forming Good Pruning Habits

The perennial bad habit of formalized plant pruning, or the cropped look is now giving way to grooming the tree or shrub to maintain its natural habit or its natural shape. Closely clipped plants that become man-made ornaments do not truly serve their real purpose as plant material. The following tips will suggest correct methods of pruning in order to contribute the best features of our ornamental plants to the landscape:

The general rule is to prune trees and shrubs in late winter in most of Texas. Spring blooming shrubs are best pruned after blooming, and pine trees are best pruned in late May or early June—after the flush of growth. Deciduous trees are

properly pruned fall and winter. The spring growing season is generally considered the worst time to prune, while hot summer pruning may contribute to sun-scald in some species. For light pruning with most species, prune whenever you have the pruning tools handy!

The reasons for pruning around the home or commercial building are (1) to maintain a pleasing relation or scale between the structure and its accent planting; and (2) to preserve the natural beauty of the plant and (3) to correct damage, improve flowering to remove undesirable parts.

Pruning problems can be minimized if the original planting follows a well thought out landscape plan, i. e., the right plant for the right place. They just grow too large, too quickly. In addition, they're often planted too close to the foundation, hiding an attractive home and creating an ugly picture of bare limbs when one looks out the window. The same mistake is made with ligustrum, aborvitae, oleander, photinia and other estate-size shrubs.

Conifers, are intolerant of shade and dead areas within the shrub result. To reduce size of overlapping shrubs, cut upper branches to introduce more light. Thin out, instead of shear, to maintain natural shape.

Prune for form in most shrubs. Remove old canes at ground level as in abelia, yellow jasmine, mock orange, pomegranate. This will produce new growth without the sheared "butch" look. If you must have a formal hedge, shear it so that the bottom is wider than the top in order to expose more of

the hedge to sunlight.

Prune and groom, don't clip and shear! In grooming for upright growth, cut back the under side shoot. For spreading growth, cut back the upper side shoot. Water sprouts and double large shrubs should be removed early in the life of the plant. A common mistake is to prune all the side branches of newly planted trees to promote faster growth. This only results in weak trunks that are subject to wind damage. Proper pruning early in the life of a tree will determine its future appearance. Look for and remove conflicting cross-branching and girdling roots. Eliminate weak narrow crotches by early correct pruning.

Cavities and scars on trees need understanding. Trimming the scar in an oval shape for maximum healing is important. Cavities should be cleared of soft rotting tissue, the bottom designed for water drainage out of the cavity, and the entire inner surface coated with a sealant against moisture. Concrete filler should only be used—and only over a sealant—for strength or aesthetics.

Lone Star Finds Oil In Mississippi

A new oil discovery has been announced by Lone Star Producing Company in Lincoln County, Mississippi, in conjunction with Craft Petroleum Company of Jackson, Mississippi.

Lone Star Producing Company, has a 50 per cent interest in the well which is named the W. E. Craft and Lone Star No. 1 Richardson. It has been production tested at a rate of 146 barrels of oil a day on a —64-inch choke.

Located just southwest of Brookhaven, Miss., the well was drilled to 10,800 feet and completed in the Lower Tuscaloosa sands at 10,600 feet. Craft Petroleum is the operator. Plans are now being made to drill a confirmation test well near the first well.

Hospital Fund Now \$67,186

The special fund being raised to purchase equipment for the new North Runnels Hospital, now under construction, has grown to \$67,186.50, according to Ted Meyer, chairman of the Special Hospital Equipment Fund Committee.

The money has been invested in Certificates of Deposit, against the time it will be needed to pay for the hospital equipment. Meyer said \$1600 in interest has been received on the investment for 1972.

George Davis Sues Winters School District

George Davis of Winters, a farmer teacher in the Winters Public School, has filed suit in U. S. District Court for the Northern District of Texas, against the Winters Independent School District, its trustees, administrators, and employees, and Carroll E. Tatom, superintendent of the school district, seeking reinstatement and damages. Suit was filed December 11 in San Angelo.

Davis is suing members of the school board individually and in their official capacity as members of the Board of Trustees of the Winters ISD, and Tatom individually and in his official capacity as superintendent.

His petition says he was an instructor with the Winters ISD from 1964 through 1971, but his contract was not renewed thereafter.

The plaintiff's attorney is Larry Watts of Houston.

Davis seeks reinstatement with back salary and other benefits, \$40,000 from the per-

sons sued in an individual capacity, punitive damages, attorney's fees, court costs and further relief necessary.

Named as defendants in the action, as members of the Board of Trustees and individually, are J. W. Bahlman, Dr. C. T. Rives, J. P. Dry, Billy J. Colburn, Delbert Kruse, M. E. Mathis and G. W. Sneed, in addition to Superintendent of Schools Carroll E. Tatom.

Rives, Mathis and Sneed are no longer members of the Board of Trustees, their terms of office having expired last April.

Few Applications Received For Low-Cost Housing

A few more applications for rental of units in Winters' low-cost housing project have been received since last week, Oliver Wood, secretary for the Winters Housing Authority, said Monday.

Only 17 had been rented the first of last week, Wood said, but if applications received during the past few days are approved, this number should increase substantially.

Most of the vacancies are in the section designated for the elderly, it was stated.

There are 46 units in the two-location project, 30 for elderly persons and 16 for low-income families.

Certain minimum income requirements must be met before would-be renters can be approved for the housing, Wood said.

However, there probably are many people who would be eligible after income adjustments are made. Those who believe they may qualify are urged to contact the Housing Authority secretary and make application as early as possible.

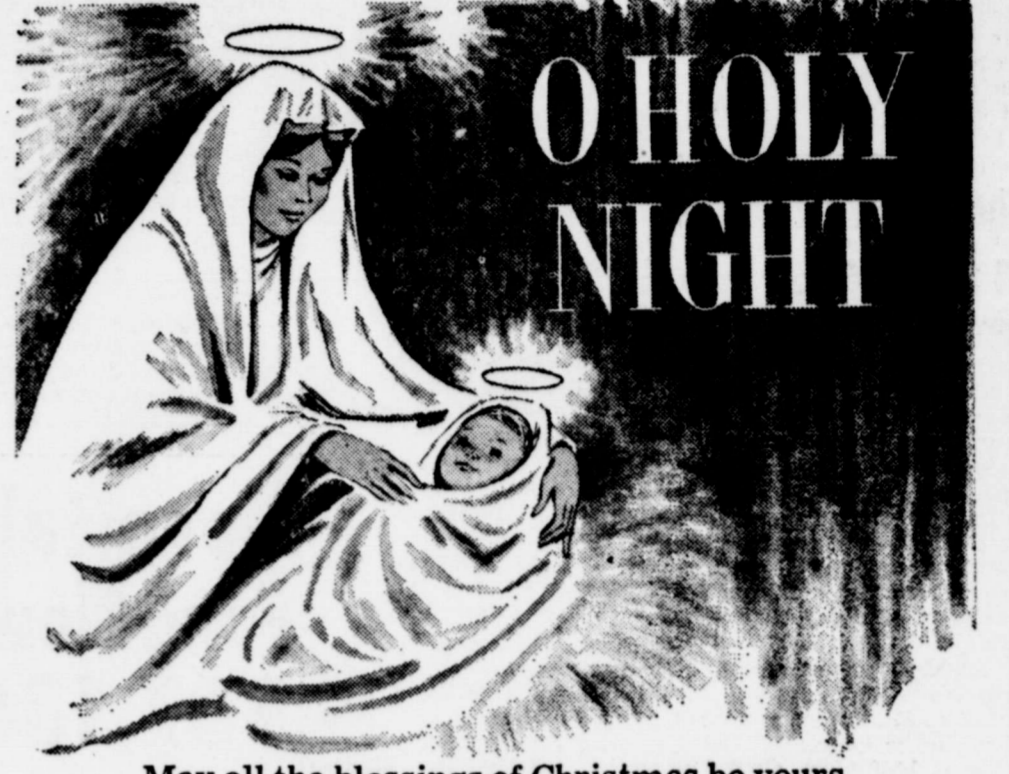

...about your SOCIAL SECURITY

Starting in 1973, people who are working while getting social security benefits can earn more but never lose more than \$1 in benefits for each \$2 earned, according to J. M. Talbot, social security district manager in San Angelo.

"The more you earn, the higher your total income will be," Mr. Talbot said. "Under the new social security law, social security payments will be reduced by \$1 for every \$2 earned over \$2,100 in a year."

Previously, monthly payments were reduced by \$1 in benefits for every \$2 earned between \$1,680 and \$2,880 in a year—and by \$1 for every \$1 earned over \$2,880.

"People over 72 will continue

to get their full social security benefits regardless of earnings," Mr. Talbot said. Under the new law, people under 72 can earn as much as \$2,100 in a year and get their full social security benefits. Different rules apply to people getting social security disability benefits if they work.

In addition, starting in 1973, full benefits can be paid for any month in which an employee's wages are not more than \$175—or he didn't perform substantial services in self-employment. Previously, the monthly limit was \$140.

"Also, starting in 1973, only your earnings in the months before you reach 72 will be used in figuring what benefits are due you for those months," Mr. Talbot said. "Before, earnings in the entire year you reached 72 were counted in figuring benefits due you for months before you were 72."

Another feature of the new law assures that the earnings exemption for people getting social security payments will go up automatically in future years

as earnings levels increase, Mr. Talbot said. The first year there can be an automatic increase is 1975.

Social security pays monthly benefits to eligible retired and disabled workers and their families—and to families of deceased workers who were insured under social security.

First American Christmas Card Printed In N. Y.

In America, credit for the first Christmas card goes to an obscure Albany, N. Y., engraver named R. H. Pease, the promotion-minded proprietor of Pease's Great Variety Store.

The card isn't dated, but most experts think it was done in the 1850s. They note an impish Santa Claus and his reindeer at the top of the card; since the famed cartoon Thomas Nast is known to have been the first to come up with that idea about 1850, the date seems fairly certain.

The first American cards published in any quantity came from the Roxbury, Mass., shop of Louis Prang, a German political refugee who went into the printing business.

The result of all this is that the average American family mailed some 110 cards this Christmas and the Post Office Department collected over \$200 million in stamps, according to spokesmen for a greeting cards trade group.

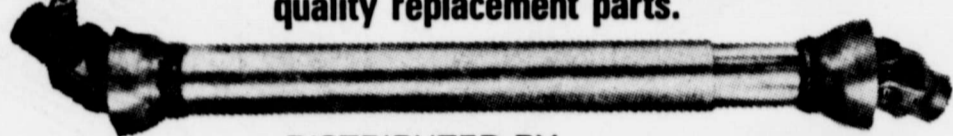

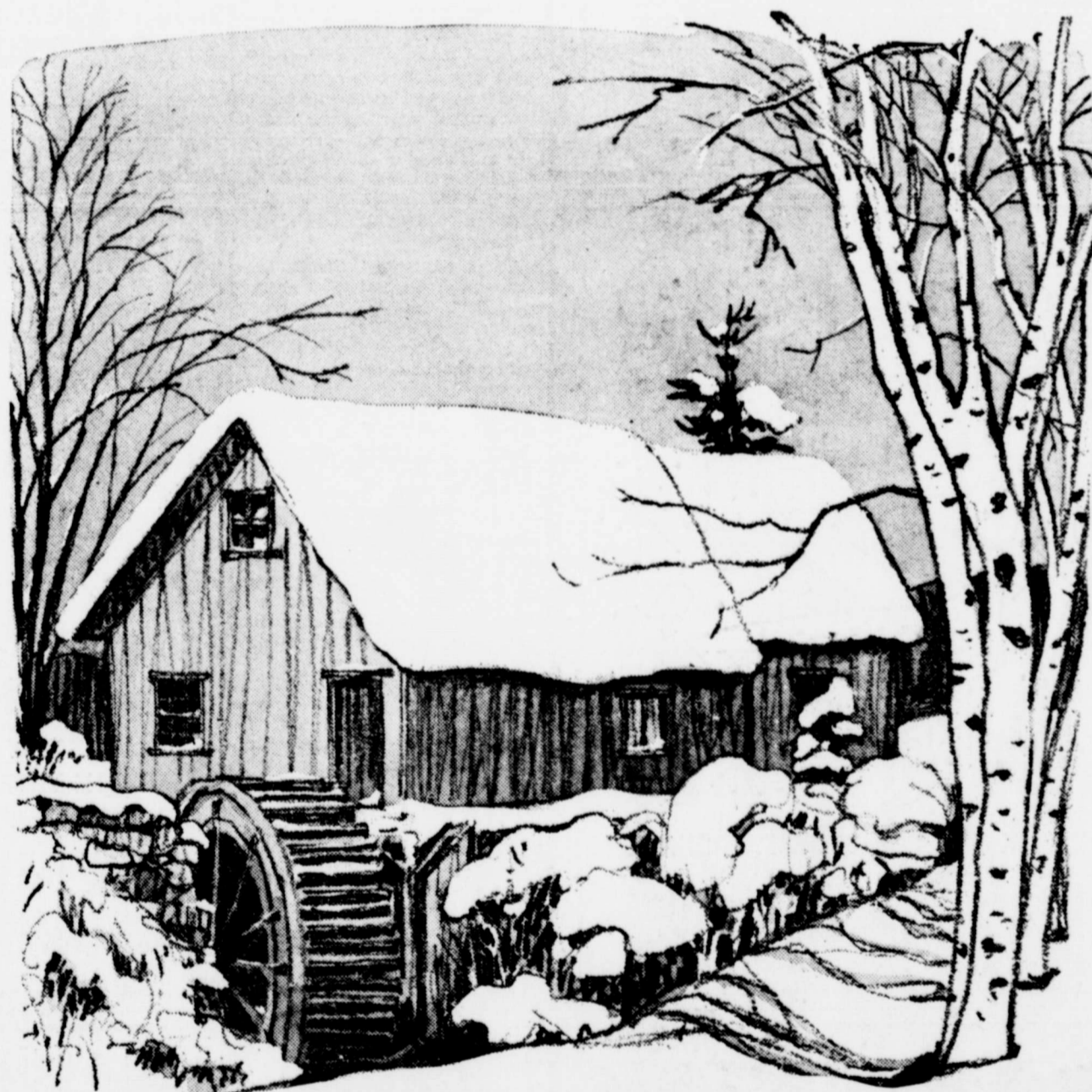

Anti-Pollution Devices Required On All New Cars

Cars are the chief cause of air pollution. But new emission control systems may be able to cut down—or maybe even wipe out—this pollution problem.

Until recently, the manufacturers of both American and foreign cars said they could not meet the stringent air pollution standards set for 1975-76 by the Clean Air Act. They are still plugging for less stringent standards and later deadlines. But General Motors, the largest car manufacturer in the world, is working on a system that might beat the car exhaust nightmare in time.

Antipollution plans of GM involve a catalyst that turns pollutants such as carbon monoxide and gas fumes into harmless carbon dioxide and water. Within a few years, every GM car may have a combination of these converters as well as small ovens called reactors that burn off fumes and clean the exhaust.

There are snags, though. Reactors can be destroyed over a period of time by hot burning temperatures. Excess engine heat and hard knocks may cause the catalyst base to disintegrate. And catalyst materials can be made totally useless by lead additives in gas. Just one or two tankfuls of heavily leaded gasolines will "poison" a catalyst.

Even if the improvements are successful, there will still be about 100 million other, older cars that will be on the road. Some, of course, do have antipollution devices. But many do not. Several car companies claim that engine modifications on 1972 car models reduced gas fumes by 80 percent, carbon monoxide by 70 percent, and nitrogen oxides by 20 percent, but these reductions are counterbalanced by the fact that more and more cars are being sold.

Taking public transportation whenever possible and being sure that your car's antipollution devices are in good working order is something everyone can do to fight pollution. Using Christmas Seals is something else. Contributions to

He attended Southern Methodist University for one year, where he played football. He attended McMurry College three and a half years, and graduated in 1965. At McMurry, he also played football, as a guard.

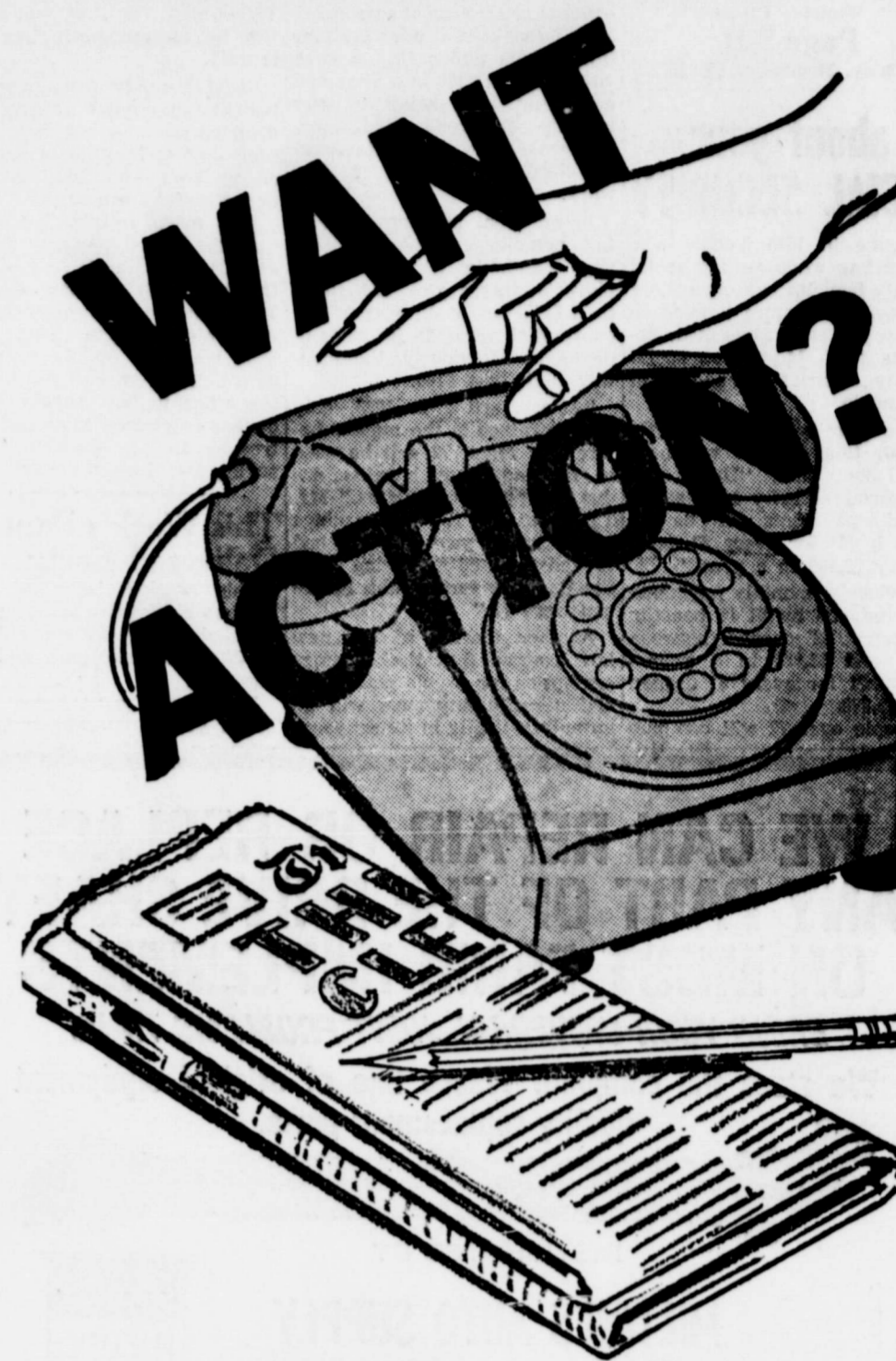

Motorists Asked To Help Prevent Traffic Deaths During Holidays

AUSTIN — Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today asked motorists and pedestrians to help prevent an estimated 87 traffic deaths in Texas through the Christmas and New Year holiday periods.

Speir said the DPS has estimated 46 traffic fatalities will occur during the Christmas period which runs from 6 p. m. Friday, December 22 to midnight Monday, December 25.

The estimate of New Year deaths is 41 between 6 p. m. Friday, December 29 and midnight Monday, January 1.

The DPS director noted that many serious accidents can be prevented if drivers and pedestrians will practice safety awareness during the holidays. He urged Texans to Drive Friendly by obeying all traffic laws and regulations, by avoiding drinking while driving, and by taking frequent rest stops on holiday trips to prevent fatigue.

In an effort to keep expected heavy traffic flowing smoothly during both holiday weekends, the Department of Public Safety will place all available patrolmen on the highways. And Speir said they will be keeping a close watch for motorists who drive too fast for conditions and those under the influence of alcohol.

In addition to stepped up enforcement activities the DPS, local law enforcement agencies and news media of Texas will

again be cooperating in a special traffic safety education program known as "Operation Motorcade." The DPS director said this program seeks to focus public attention on traffic safety through the timely reporting of fatal accidents and unusual conditions during major holiday periods.

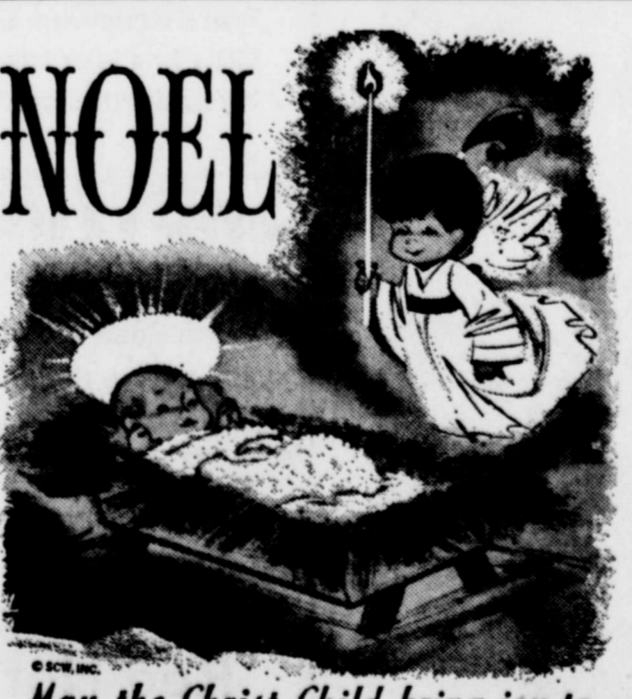

It has to do with preparation.

Advance Planning Important

No serious angler would go to bed the night before a fishing trip, without first of all carefully checking his equipment, his rods, reels, lures, hooks, stringers — his entire tacklebox and everything else that has anything whatsoever to do with his outing, including his car, his trailer and his boat.

Which also means such important mobile items as gas, oil and tires.

To his check list can be added the greasing of trailer wheels, checking for firm attachment of trailer-hitch to trailer-ball, securing the safety chain, tilting the motor and tying down the boat snugly and properly at both bow and stern. This, plus the all important and too often overlooked — doublecheck — to see that the boat's hull is still properly resting on the trailer rollers, guides and bottom supports.

Again, back to the beginning which means a thorough examination of his rods, line-guides and guide wrappings.

Some anglers save empty cardboard cartons that once contained milk, wash them clean (inside and out), fill them with cold drinking water, and store them in the freezer side of the home refrigerator, overnight.

Next morning, when they get ready to leave on a fishing trip they place a few of the frozen-solid cartons in the iced-down cooler to help keep the food, sodas and other canned or bottled refreshments cold. And, their catch too!

When the ice in the cartons melts, the water is used for drinking purposes, for removing the fish odor from the hands, or for tidying up the boat.

Anglers who prefer to toss their catch into an ice box, in-

stead of putting them on a stringer, usually add a wide rubber band or two around each carton. This, after filling the carton with water and folding the tops down flat and tight, helps to keep the aroma of the fish out of the frozen or melted ice and the resulting drinking water.

Most of the time fishermen take along a couple or more of these cartons of frozen water for each person in the party.

Some anglers who want to keep their catch fresh and pictureable, hence don't want their fish frozen stiff, pack a half dozen or so pint-sized frozen cartons of water in the box and use no other means of icing. Mainly, this is a matter of how warm the weather and how far one is from home.

If home base is some distance away, the quart size cartons are utilized.

One of our crappie fishing friends uses a gallon size milk carton for storing his fileted fish. He drops the filets into the ing container, fills the carton with water, folds the top down tight and places the gallon of goodies in his deep freeze.

Sure beats wrapping them in foil individually.

Only trouble here is—that's a lot of fish for one meal, unless you have a bunch of hungry youngsters—or lots of company to feed.

ANCHORING THE BOAT

Anytime there's a big run of speckled trout on the Gulf Coast you can count on hundreds of bay fishing boats rushing to the jetties. A majority of the craft will be fiberglass boats ranging in size from 16 to 28 feet.

Needless to say, such a conglomeration of vessels in itself creates a tremendous nautical parking problem. Conditions eventually get pretty complicated.

Primarily the problem is due to lack of experience on the part of the pilot. Sometimes it's strictly a matter of lack of consideration of "the other fellow"—or, to put it bluntly, just outright lack of common courtesy. "Jetty manners" call for the use of a large, heavy anchor—one that will hold fast and prevent drifting into other boats.

In all cases of anchoring it's important to keep the motor running until the anchor holds. Otherwise the skipper may not be able to start up again in time to prevent rear end collision with another craft or banging into pilings, banks, or

even worse the boulders on the jetties.

Experienced anglers drop anchor some distance from where they want the boat to swing into place. Then they let out line until they reach the desired position.

Sometimes this method of anchoring can prevent not only damage to boats but also some rather bitter arguments — ruffled feelings to say the least.

'Tis well to remember that for firm, dependable anchoring, five feet of anchor line should be allowed for each foot of water depth.

Confidence Catches Fish

Confidence has a lot to do with success in fishing.

One thing for sure, if you don't believe you can catch fish with a certain lure the likelihood of your doing so on that specific lure is very slim.

Without confidence your casting will be poor; the action you impart to the lure will be far from lifelike; your retrieve will be haphazard; if you get a strike you won't believe it possible, therefore you won't set the hook firmly; and finally, you won't boat the fish properly. So your chances of success are really nil.

Frankly, in most instances a top flight angler can catch fish on almost any lure . . . since he possesses the necessary fish-

ing skill and great confidence.

All of which means that most coaches depend on the fisherman's attitude, without which his entire fishing technique goes out of kilter.

Many complain of their memory, but few of their judgment.

NEW YEAR WHITE
