Mrs. Hood said state law provides that all children enrolled in school must have the complete DPT series, polio, rubella and rubeola. Smallpox vaccination is no longer a requirement. If children have received immunization shots from their physicians, the proper certificates must be presented so school records can be kept current, Mrs. Hood said.

Blizzards Held To One Touchdown As Eldorado Rolls To 27-7 Win

The Winters Blizzards were limited to only one touchdown by the Eldorado Eagles Friday night, with a 27-7 score, which brought the season record to one win and three losses for the Blizzards.

A combination of Blizzard mistakes gave the Eldorado Eagles three easy touchdowns in the first half.

Early in the first quarter, Jim West intercepted the Eldorado pass to break up their forward drive. The Blizzards then had to punt and the Eagles ran the punt back to the Blizzard 7-yard line. Two plays later on a power sweep, running back Mike Manning went over for the first touchdown with 3:27 left in the opening period. Ken Peters kicked the extra point to make the score 7-0.

On the next kickoff, the Blizzards fumbled, giving the Eagles the ball on the Winters 30-yard line. Three plays later, again on the power sweep, Manning scored from the 9-yard line with 1:50 left in the first quarter. Peters again added the extra point, making the score 14-0.

On the following kickoff, again the Blizzards fumbled and gave Eldorado another easy chance to score. So early in the second quarter, the Eagles scored again on an 8-yard keeper by QB Gene Nixon, with 11:09 remaining. The kick failed. The score now 20-0.

Late in the second quarter, the Eagles fumbled to give the

Blizzards the ball on the Eagle 30-yard line, setting up the only Winters touchdown of the night. Four plays later (after the Eagle fumble), Ricky DeLaCruz ran in from the 4-yard line on a counter play up the middle. Johnny Ray Liggins added the extra point to make the score 20-7.

A Blizzard drive late in the second quarter was halted when Stan Tatom threw an interception which ended the first half with the score 20-7.

The Eagles' final touchdown came when Nixon threw a 31-yard touchdown pass to Timmy Farris late in the third quarter. Nixon added the extra point to make the score 27-7.

Mrs. O'Connor's Weekly News Column

KEEP FOOD SAFE ON YOUR PICNIC

Autumn is a favorite season for picnics in this part of the country because the weather is so favorable.

However, you should take the same precautions with food as you do in summer, says Mrs. O'Connor.

To keep food safe to eat on a picnic, follow these simple rules:

—Keep cold foods below 45 degrees F. Make sure there is plenty of ice in the cooler.

—Keep hot foods above 140 degrees F. Transport them in an insulated container.

—Start food preparations with clean hands, clean utensils and a clean work area.

—Wash anything that touches raw meat or poultry before you let it come in contact with cooked foods. Cooking temperatures kill bacteria present on raw meat or poultry, but cooked food can be recontaminated.

—Use something disposable like wax paper, when you handle raw meat.

—Take along extra forks and spoons for serving so you won't have to re-use the one you cooked with.

—Use a clean plate for food from the grill, instead of the one used for the raw food.

—Use low temperatures and cook food farther from the fire

to have more even cooking and less shrinkage. Cook ground meat, pork and poultry thoroughly.

—Wrap leftovers in clean foil and put them back in the cooler immediately after you're through eating. Make sure you have enough ice for the return trip home.

FRUITFUL PEARS

Fresh pears are the basis for this simple but elegant salad. Mix 1 package (3 oz.) softened cream with 1/4 cup real mayonnaise; stir in 3/4 cup chopped candied fruit. For each salad arrange 2 fresh pear halves on crisp outer leaves of western iceberg lettuce; top with cheese mixture.

BAKE PEAR-ORANGE

Place 6 fresh pear halves in shallow baking dish; sprinkle with 1/2 tsp. cardamom. Spoon 3/4 c. orange juice combined with 1/4 c. brown sugar over pears. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes. Serve hot or chilled, garnished with whipped cream and grated orange rind.
