## 'Finis' To Suit Against School

Apparently, the damage suit against Winters Independent School District by George Davis is over.

Donald W. Griffis, San Angelo, attorney for the school district in the case, has notified the Winters school superintendent and the board of trustees that he has received a letter from the United States Court of Appeals, Fifth Circuit, New Orleans, stating, in effect:

"A check of our docket indicates that we have never received a notice from the Supreme Court of the filing of the petition of writ of certiorari in the above cause (Davis vs. Winters Independent School District, etc., et al). Accordingly, this Court's judgment as mandate was issued on June 17, 1974, and the record on appeal and all exhibits were returned to the Clerk of the United States District Court together with this Court's judgment as mandate."

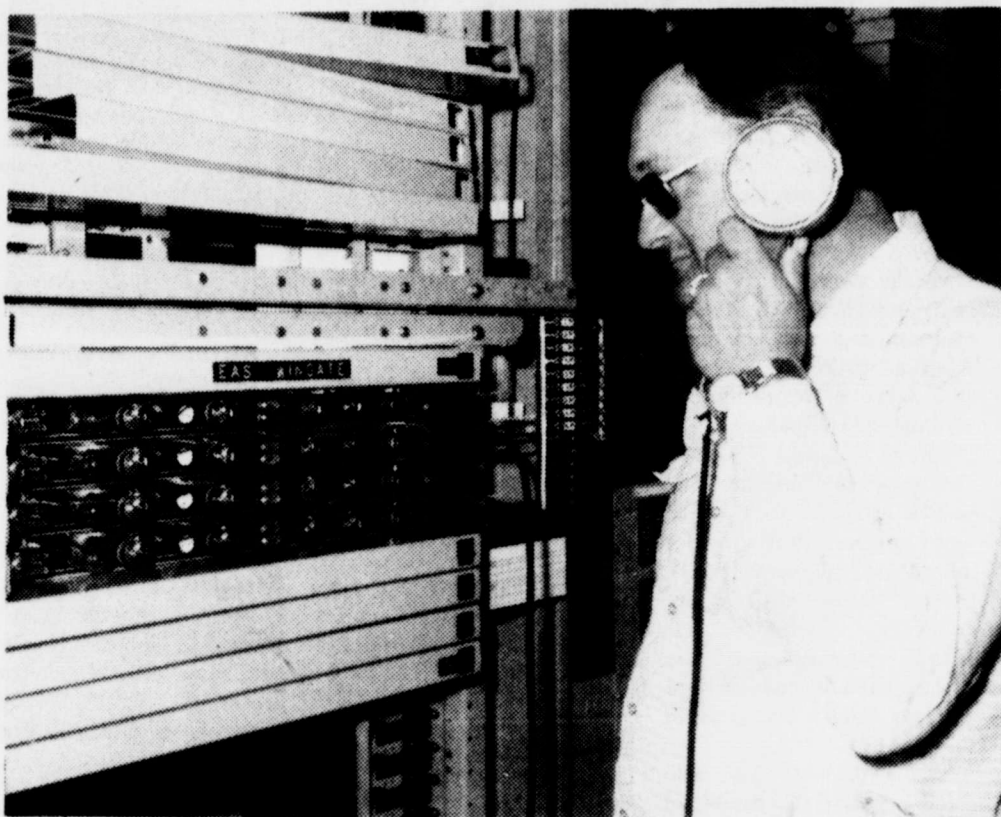
The Fifth Circuit Federal Court in New Orleans had upheld the Winters Independent School District's case in the civil suit heard on appeal in New Orleans in April of last year.

The case first was heard in May of 1973 by Judge

Halbert O. Woodward of the U.S. District Court of Texas, San Angelo District, who handed down a judgment in favor of the Winters ISD. The case was appealed by Davis.

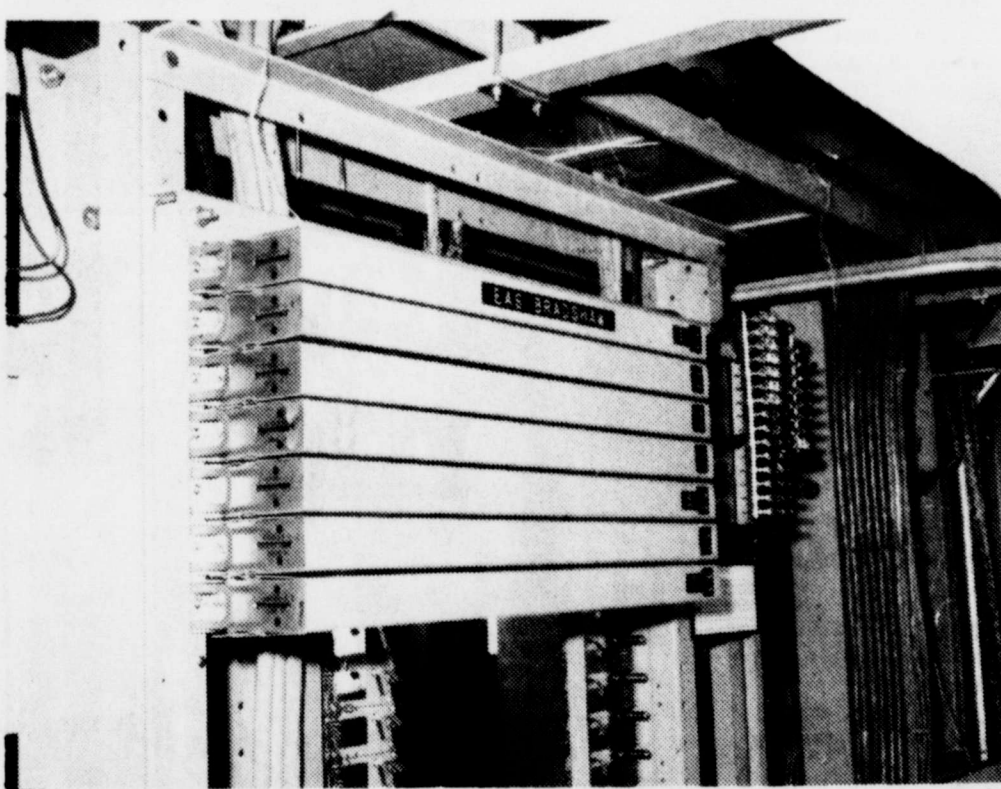
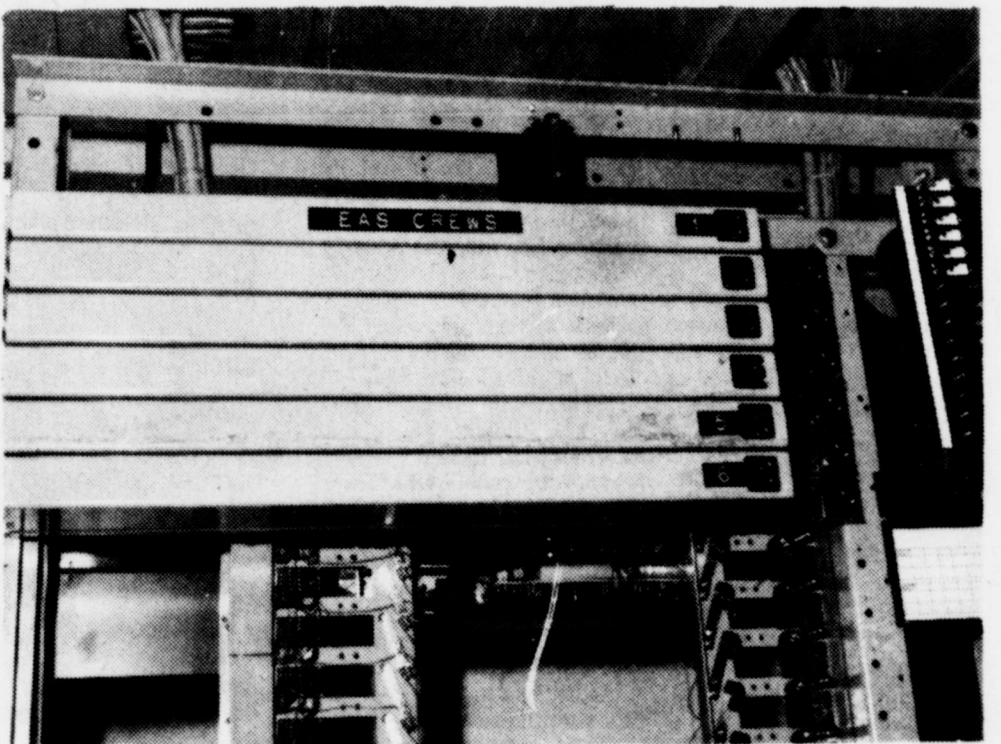
George Davis of Winters had filed suit against the school district in December, 1972, for non-renewal of his teaching contract in March, 1971, for the 1971-72 school year. He had charged the school district with violation of his constitutional rights, guaranteed under the First and Fourteenth Amendments. He asserted there was a defacto tenure system in existence in the Winters School District at such time; that his non-renewal came about because of his activities in the local Classroom Teachers Association; that the defendants acted arbitrarily and capriciously in not renewing his contract.

Davis had sought reinstatement of lost salary and benefits, attorney fees and court costs from the school district. He further sought declaratory relief and compensatory damages in the amount of \$40,000, and punitive damages from individual school board members and the superintendent of schools.

## EAS For North Runnels To Become Reality

Beginning April 1, telephone subscribers of Winters will be able to dial a number at Wingate, Crews or Bradshaw, without going through the operator for a "long distance" call. Residents of those three communities may

also call Winters toll-free. After many years of study, work, and anticipation, telephone Extended Area Service for most of North Runnels County will become a reality April 1.

Officials of General Telephone Company of the Southwest said this week that equipment will be ready for EAS by April 1, and this long-awaited service will be available to subscribers. General Telephone and Taylor County Telephone Cooperative have worked for many months—even years—in ironing out all the details to make this service available to subscribers of both companies.

## School Board To Call For Bids On Ad Building

The board of trustees of Winters Independent School District Tuesday night approved a resolution calling for preparation of plans and call for bids for construction of a new school administration building.

As proposed, the building would be constructed on the vacant lot on Heights Street adjacent to the school campus. The district purchased the lot some years ago with plans in mind to construct an administration building at some future date.

It was explained that the recent expansion of the voca-

tional agriculture program to two teacher units, and the growth of the program called for more room for the program. The school administration offices presently occupy a part of the vo-ag building. It was also stated that application has been made for an additional vocational counselor for the Winters program.

Although complete plans have not been received, the proposed building would contain about 2800 square feet, and be of brick construction.

In other business, the board approved offering of contracts to teachers.

With the new EAS, subscribers of Winters, customers of General Telephone, may dial any number in the Crews, Wingate or Bradshaw without toll charges. Customers of Taylor County Coop may call Winters without toll charges. However, they still will not be able to call any of the other communities, without paying the extra toll charge.

Officials of General Telephone this week said that this new service "will play a big part in the continued growth and development and progress of all communities involved."

General Telephone spokesmen said the beginning of EAS for these communities is a culmination of several years of planning, and many months of work, involving laying of underground cable, from Winters to Ballinger and to other outlets, in addition to the three communities involved along with Winters in the EAS project. They said this has been a long-term project, involving expenditures of approximately one-quarter of a million dollars.

There will be some increase in rates telephone subscribers will have to pay for this service, it was pointed out, but the overall advantages "would tend to offset this small extra cost," they said.

## Arts and Crafts Bazaar To Benefit Public Library Fund

Stall rental paid by exhibitors in the annual Arts and Crafts Bazaar, scheduled for March 22 and 23, will go to benefit the Winters Public Library, it was stated this week.

The annual bazaar is being sponsored by the Junior Culture Club.

The club is seeking lists of exhibitors who plan to enter their handmade work in the bazaar. Articles may be entered only for show, or

may be offered for sale. It was explained that the money collected by the individual exhibitors will not be turned over to the Junior Culture Club; only the stall rental fee and other voluntary contributions will go to the library fund.

Show and sale booths will be assigned exhibitors, with individual booths to be rented for \$2.50 each and organization booths for \$5.00. No commission charges will be made for items sold by exhibitors during the show.

## Stockmen To Sponsor AI School Here

The West Texas Livestock Improvement Association will sponsor an artificial insemination school here, beginning March 17 and running through March 20. Classes will be held in the high school vo-ag building, and at the school show barn.

Bobby Robinson, of Curtiss Breeding Service, will be the instructor for the school. A tuition will be charged for the course, and a minimum of ten livestock owners will be required to fill out a class.

Those stockmen interested in this course may register with Stanley Blackwell or Charles Alcorn at the vo-ag department, or with Dr. Jimmy Smith, DVM.

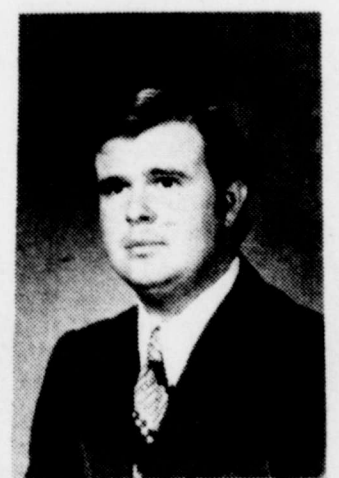

## Student Teacher Begins Work In Vo-Ag Department

C. T. Kent, senior agricultural education major in Tarleton State University, is doing his student teaching in the Winters Public Schools vocational agriculture department, under the supervision of Charles Alcorn and Stanley Blackwell, vo-ag teachers.

Kent will be in the community from March 1 through May 7 for the purpose of receiving training for vocational agriculture teaching. This arrangement has been made by mutual agreement between Bill Graves, superintendent of schools, and Tarleton State University.

## Nigerian Preacher To Speak Here Saturday

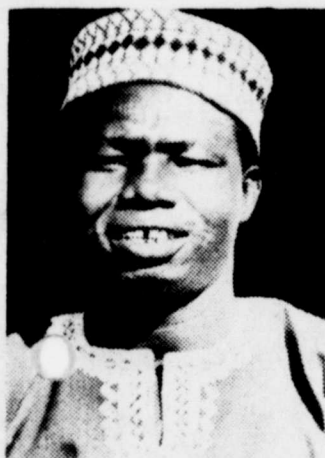
David Windibiziri of Jos, Nigeria, Africa, will speak at St. John's Lutheran Church in Winters, Saturday, March 15, at 8 p. m.

tian faith in 1949. He served for several years as an agricultural assistant and civil servant with the Nigerian government.

In 1963, although well established in a good position with good pay, he and his wife decided to give it all up and go to the seminary. Mr. Windibiziri was ordained in 1972, and now serves a congregation of 200 members in Jos, Nigeria. He also serves on the executive council of the Lutheran Church of Christ in the Sudan.

The Rev. Mel Swoyer, pastor of St. John's Lutheran Church, said, "This speaker (should) inspire us Christians in America to be more evangelistic in our churches and their outreach to non-Christians. While our American churches are losing members, the churches of Africa are growing by great numbers."

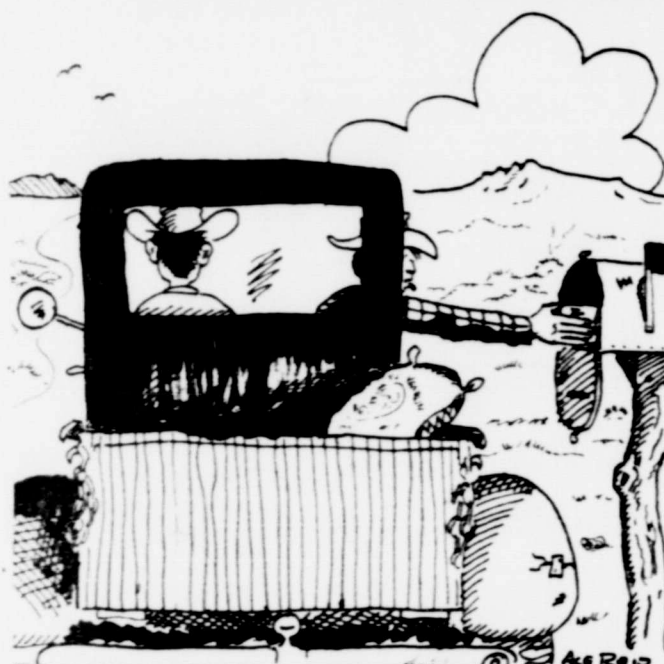

On this the 14th day of January, 1975, the Board of Trustees of Winters Independent School District convened in regular session, open to the public, with the following members present, to-wit: Delbert Kruse, President; Roscoe Morrison, Billy J. Colburn, Richard Thomas and Johnny Dry, and the following absent: Wesley Hays, Gene Wheat, constituting a quorum and among other proceedings had by said Board of Trustees was the following:

WHEREAS, the term of office of Roscoe Morrison, Richard C. Thomas and Wesley M. Hays, members of the Board of Trustees of this School District will expire on the first Saturday in April, 1975, said first Saturday being April 5, 1975, and on said date a trustee election will be held in said School District.

WHEREAS, it is necessary for this Board to pass an order establishing the procedure for filing for and conducting said trustee election;

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF WINTERS INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT:

1. That an election be held in said School District on April 5, 1975, for the purpose of electing to the Board of Trustees of said School District, Positions 3, 4 and 5.

2. That all requests by candidates to have their names placed upon the ballot for the above mentioned election shall be in writing and signed by the candidate and filed with the secretary of the Board of Trustees at the superintendent's office not later than 30 days prior to the date of said election.

All candidates shall file with said application the loyalty affidavit required by Art. 6.02 of the Election Code.

The Secretary of this Board of Trustees shall post on the bulletin board in the building where the Board of Trustees meets the names of all candidates that have filed their applications in accordance with the terms and provisions of this Order, and said Secretary shall otherwise comply with the terms and provisions of Art. 13.32 of the Election Code.

3. That said election shall be held at the following places, and the following named persons are hereby appointed officers for said election:

a. In School District numbered 904 at Chamber of Commerce Building, in Winters, Texas, in said School District, with George M. Garrett as Presiding Judge and Fred Young and Gattis Neely and Joe DeLaCruz, Clerks.

The polls at the above designated polling place shall on election day be open from 8:00 o'clock a. m. to 7:00 o'clock p. m.

4. J. B. Smith is hereby appointed Clerk for absentee voting, and Jean Sneed is hereby appointed Deputy Clerk for absentee voting. The absentee voting for the above designated election shall be held at Winters School Business office within the boundaries of the above named School District and said place of absentee voting shall remain open for at least eight hours on each day for absentee voting which is not a Saturday, a Sunday, or an official State holiday, beginning on the 20th day and continuing through the 4th day preceding the date of said election. Said place of voting shall remain open between the hours of 8:00 a. m. and 5:00 p. m. on each day for said absentee voting. The above described place for absentee voting is also the absentee Clerk's mailing address to which ballot applications and ballots voted by mail shall be sent.

Absentee voting, both by personal appearance and by mail, shall be by paper ballots and shall be canvassed by a special canvassing board, and

George Garrett, as Presiding Judge, Fred Young, Gattis Neely and Joe DeLaCruz, as Clerks, are hereby appointed the Special Canvassing Board for said election.

6. The manner of holding said election shall be governed, as nearly as may be, by the Election Code of this state, and this Board of Trustees will furnish all necessary ballots and other election supplies requisite to said election.

7. Immediately after the votes have been counted, the officers holding said election shall make and deliver the returns of said election and perform all other duties as provided by the Election Code.

8. The Board of Trustees shall give notice of said election, and this combined Election Order and Notice shall serve as Notice for said election. The President of the Board of Trustees is hereby authorized and instructed to post or cause to have posted said combined Election Order and Notice at three public places where notices are customarily posted in this school district, and said posting shall be made at least 20 days before the date of said election.

The President shall also cause a copy of this combined Election Order and Notice to be published one time in a newspaper of general circulation in the county where this school district is located. Said publication shall be not more than 30 days nor less than 10 days before the date of said election.

It is further found and determined that in accordance with an order of the Board of Trustees, the Secretary posted written notice of the date, place and subject of this meeting on the bulletin board located in the central administrative office of this school district, a place convenient to the public, and said notice, having been so posted, remained posted for at least 72 hours preceding the day of this meeting.

It is further found and determined that in accordance with an order of the Board of Trustees, the Secretary furnished a notice of the date, place and subject of this meeting to the county clerk of Runnels County, Texas, the county in which most, if not all, of this school district's pupils reside.

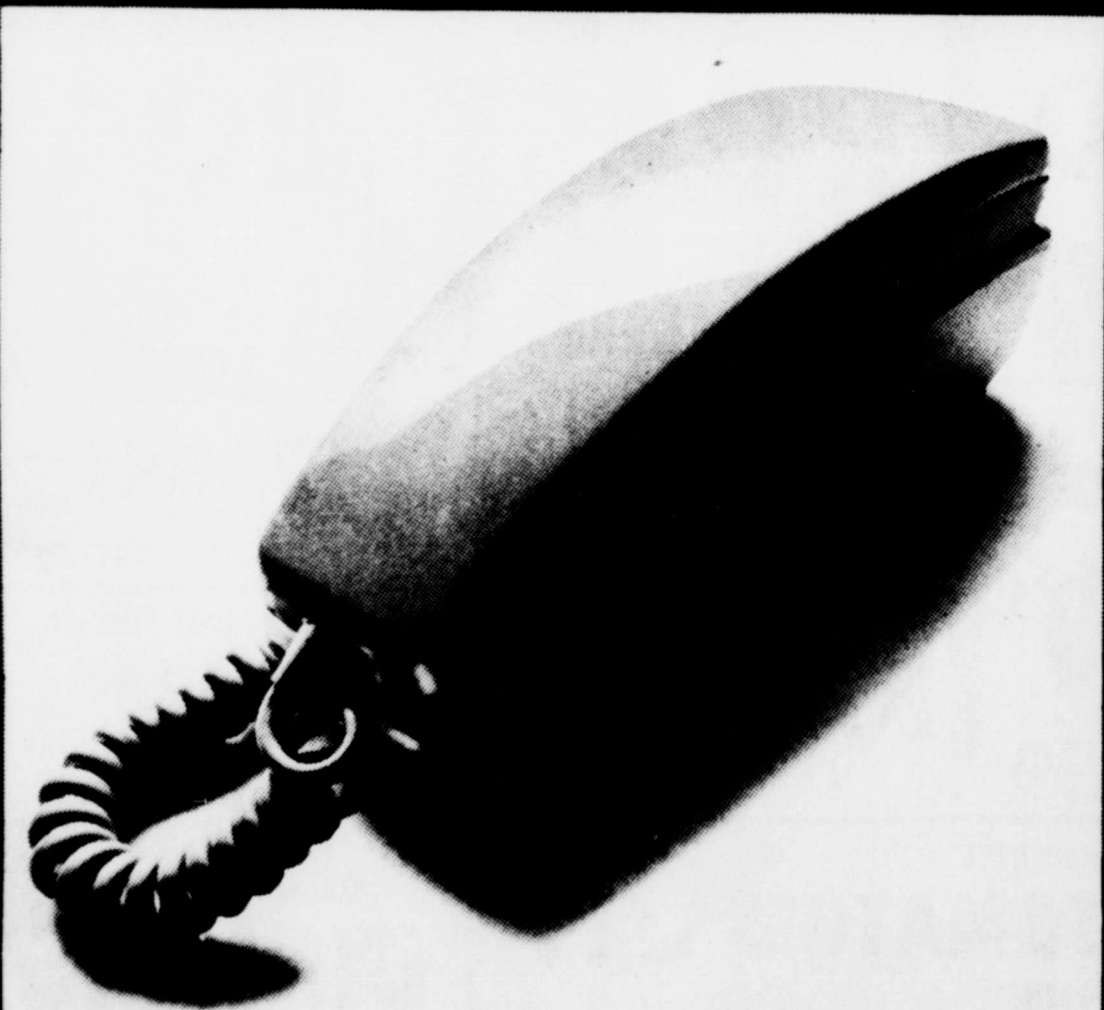
