Water Board Calls Meeting

Approval of loans and grants from the Farm Home Administration for development and construction of the proposed rural water system for North Runnels rests with meeting of several "conditions" by the membership of North Runnels Rural Water Supply Corporation. These "conditions" have been drawn up by the FHA, and apparently the last step in getting this long-sought-for project underway, LaDell Davis, chairman of the board of the rural water organization, said.

Davis said a meeting of the membership of the rural water organization has been called for Monday, April 7, at 8 p. m., to discuss the conditions laid out by the FHA. The meeting will be held in the Winters Community Center.

The board of directors of the water supply corporation met with representatives of the FHA last Tuesday night, at which time the FHA agency people presented a "Letter of Conditions" which must be approved by the membership of the corporation. This is only a routine matter, Davis suggested, and needs only the approval of the membership before the loans and grants can be made by the FHA.

The proposed project, which already

has been engineered by an Abilene engineering firm, has been divided into four phases. The FHA probably will approve loans and grants for completion of the first two phases, upon approval by the water corporation of the requirements set forth by the FHA. A loan of approximately \$337,000 and a grant of about \$307,000 would finance the first two phases of the project, it was stated. Additional applications must be made for loans and grants to finance the second half of the project.

It was understood that the money is available, once all conditions are met, and it is imperative, Davis said, that the organization immediately meet the "conditions" stated by the FHA in order to "tie down" these funds before an early deadline.

Davis urged all members of the rural water supply corporation to be present at the meeting.

Winters Jaycees Formed Monday

be Arnold Thormeyer, and local directors will be Mike Briley and Jerry Hood.

The Winters Jaycees were organized under the sponsorship of the Abilene Jaycees. Regular meeting dates and times have not been designated, Pinkerton said, but this will be done at another meeting next Monday night. Also, the president of the new organization said, committees will be named within a few days, so that projects may begin. It is understood that the newly organized Jaycees will work with the Chamber of Commerce in promoting the 85th Anniversary celebration of Winters, to be held some time in June.

The Jaycees had been organized in Winters several years ago, but had since disbanded.

Elections Set Saturday, 5th

Electors of Winters, Winters Independent School District, North Runnels County Hospital District, and Wingate Independent School District will go to the polls Saturday, April 5, to name aldermen, school district trustees and board members.

The Winters City election will be

held in the City Hall; the Winters school district and hospital district elections will be held in the office of the Winters Chamber of Commerce; and the Wingate school district election will be held in the Wingate school. A voting box for the hospital district also will be available at the Wingate school.

City Election

There are five candidates filed for two seats on the Winters City Council. Mayor Homer Hodge, seeking re-election, has no opposition in this voting.

E. E. Vaughan, incumbent alderman, is seeking return to the City Council.

Other candidates for the two seats are Earl Roach, Jimmy Guevara, E. A. Seates and Cecil Scott.

Woodrow Watts, incumbent alderman whose term expires, is not seeking return to office.

Voting in the City Election will be in the Fire Station at the City Hall.

School Election Winters

Three trustees will be elected in the Winters Independent School District election.

Roscoe Morrison, incumbent trustee, is seeking re-election to Place 3; Richard C. Thomas, incumbent, is a candidate for re-election to Place 4; and Wesley M. Hays is seeking return to the board of trustees, Place 5.

Wesley Vogler is a candidate for school trustee, Place 4, challenging Thomas for that position.

All school trustees are elected by place instead of at-large.

The Winters School election will be held in the office of the Winters Chamber of Commerce. George Garrett will be election judge, with Fred Young, Gattis Neely and Joe DeLaCruz, clerks.

Hospital

Terms of office of three directors of North Runnels County Hospital District expire in April, and there are four candidates for the three vacancies.

E. F. Albro, George R. Hill and John W. Norman, who have been members of the hospital board since the formation of the hospital district, end their present terms in April. Hill and Norman are not candidates for re-election. Albro is a candidate for return to office as a director.

Other candidates for the three vacancies on the hospital board are Morris Robinson, Roger (Spec) Robinson, and Hollis Dean.

The hospital board election will be held in the Winters Chamber of Commerce office, with George Garrett

Wingate area residents who reside within the hospital district may vote at the Wingate school, where a box will be available. M. B. Folsom will be election judge, with Mrs. Ethel Polk Clerk.

School Election Wingate

Three school trustees will be elected to the board of Wingate Independent School District in the Saturday, April 5 election.

Polls will be at the Wingate school, with M. B. Folsom, election judge, and Mrs. Ethel Polk, clerk.

Trustees whose terms of office expire in April are Gilbert Smith and Jack Pritchard. A third member will be elected to fill a vacancy.

Concert Saturday

Arrangements have been completed for the appearance of the Texas Lutheran College Concert Choir in Winters Saturday, April 5, the Rev. Mel Swayer, pastor of St. John's Lutheran Church, has announced. The concert of choral music will be given at St. John's beginning at 7:30 p. m.

The 53-voice Choir, under direction of Sigurd O. Christiansen, presents a concert of choral music from the heritage of the church, the Rev. Mr. Swayer said.

Now in its 45th year, the TLC Concert Choir has appeared in hundreds of cities in the United States and Mexico, and has presented concerts in seven European countries from Norway to Switzerland. It has earned an enviable reputation among laymen and professional musicians.

Industrial Show Set For Friday and Saturday

"Made In Winters" may not be as universally known as many other "Made In" phrases which are so commonly associated with the daily lives of millions of consumers, but through the years, among certain distribution outlets and specific users, those products which are being manufactured in Winters, Texas, have become as familiar as any other products of the same categories.

Products which are manufactured in Winters are being distributed and used over a large part of the United States, and in many instances, have entered into the overseas market channels.

Local residents may have an opportunity to see examples of those "Made In Winters" products at the Winters Industrial Exhibit, to be held Friday and Saturday, April 4-5, in the lobby of West Texas Utilities Co. The exhibits will be displayed for public inspection from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. each day of the special showing.

The Industrial Exhibit which has been planned for this week is a project sponsored by the Industrial Committee of the Winters Chamber of Commerce, and products of all the local industries, plus special exhibits of equipment of oil field service companies will be on display.

During the showing, coffee will be served in the lobby of West Texas Utilities Co., and door prizes will be offered to the visiting viewers.

Manufacturing companies which will have examples of products on display include John's Inter., Inc., Dry Manufacturing Division, Wallace Murray Corporation, Winters Welding Works, Wintex Industries, and Alderman-Cave Milling & Grain Co. Oil field service companies which will have equipment exhibited include Mac Oil Field Co., Winters Construction Co., Pool, Bishop & Sons, and Haliburton.

John's International, Inc., specialty manufacturers, fabricate and distribute pickup tool boxes in a variety of sizes, a special farm tractor fork lift designed for hay hauling and other farm-related jobs, grain trailers, and other items. These JI items are marketed over a wide area of the U. S.

Dry Manufacturing Division, Wallace Murray Corporation, makes many types of air diffusers, registers and grilles, which are distributed throughout the United States.

Alderman-Cave Milling & Grain Co. manufactures livestock feeds which are distributed throughout a wide area of

West Central Texas, and the company, by virtue of its consumer-oriented sales plans, also becomes a ready market place for grain producers of the area.

Winters Welding Works, which for many years has been an oil field pipeline and construction company, also manufactures and distributes auxiliary fuel tanks for pickups and trucks, and heavy-duty grille guards for pickups and trucks.

Wintex Industries Manufactures and distributes a complete line of retail store metal shelving, and provides fixtures to large nationally operated chain stores.

Virtually all of the items manufactured by Winters industries are made of metal, with the exception of the livestock feed made by Alderman-Cave. In addition to maintaining their own distribution centers, some of the companies manufacture products for nationally-known retail chains.

According to some sources, Winters is unique in that there is more industry per person than in any other town of similar size in the country. These industries provide a ready source of employment for the area, and are vitally important in the economic scheme.

Dr. Prince Died March 31 In Fort Worth

Dr. Judson Prince, 63, of Fort Worth, died at 12:45 a.m. March 31 in the Kent Nursing Home, Fort Worth, after a long illness.

Funeral services were held in Riverside Baptist Church, Fort Worth, at 4 p.m. Wednesday. Burial was in a Fort Worth cemetery.

Dr. Prince was born Aug. 7, 1911, at Portia, Ark., and moved later to Chapman Ranch, Tex. He married Lucille Neely of Winters in Brownwood, Dec. 21, 1932, while both were attending Howard Payne College. He received his bachelor's degree in 1934. He served on the board of trustees for Howard Payne, and received a Doctor of Divinity degree from that college.

He served as pastor of Rochelle Baptist Church; First Baptist Church of Hamilton; First Baptist Church of Cisco; First Baptist Church of Odessa; Riverside Baptist Church for about 14 years, and was pastor when the present sanctuary was built. In 1951 he organized two churches in Fort Worth, Oakhurst Baptist and Yeca Avenue Baptist.

He retired in 1967 because of ill health, undergoing heart surgery.

He is survived by his wife; two sons, Judson Prince Jr., of Houston, and Joe Prince of Northfield; four grandchildren; two brothers and two sisters.
