Wives of members of the Lions Club will be special guests.

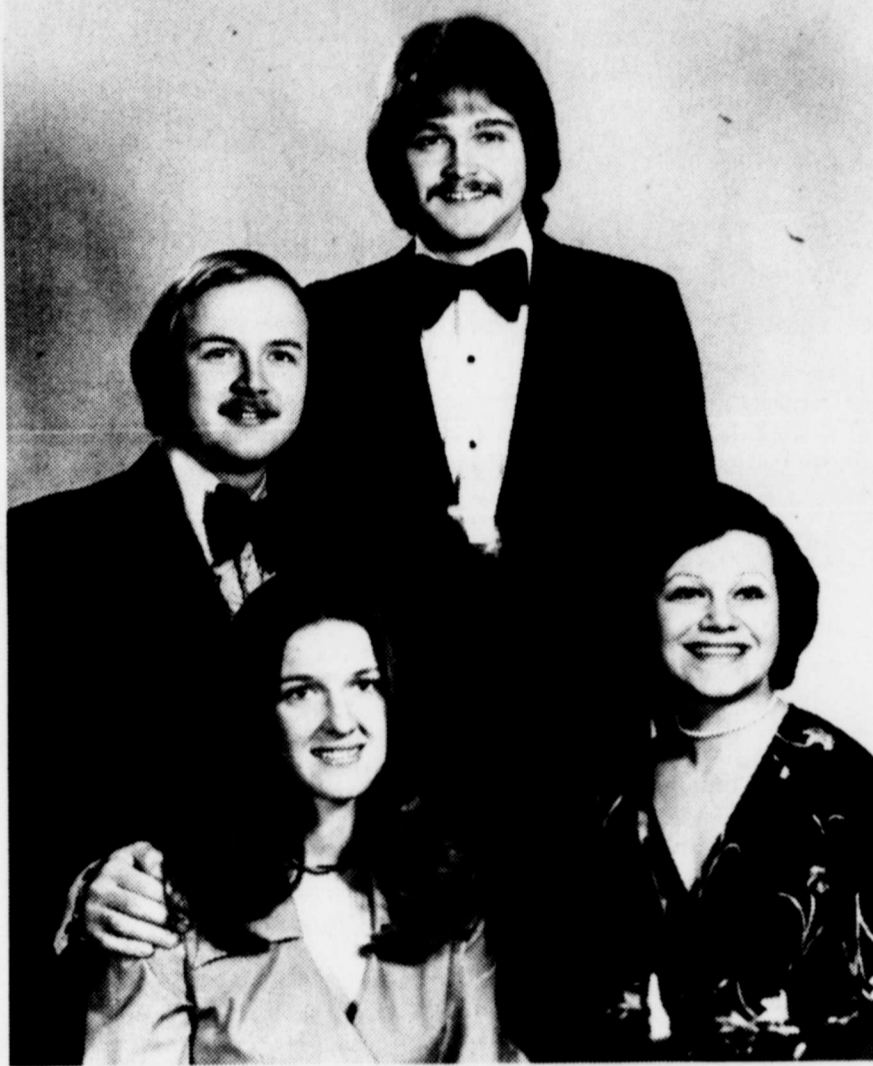

## Light Voter Turnout Here

A light voter turnout was the rule for three elections Saturday, with only a small percentage of registered voters making the effort to visit the polls.

Only 211 ballots were cast in the City election; 264 in the Winters Independent School District election; 251 in the North Runnels County Hospital District election; and only 27 ballots marked in the Wingate Independent School District election.

### CITY ELECTION

Mayor Homer Hodge, who had no opposition in this election, was returned to office, receiving 165 votes.

Earl Roach and A.L. Seates, newcomers to the city political scene, were named to the City Council, with 106 and 96 votes respectively. Incumbent E.E. Vaughan, up for re-election to the Council, received 86 votes. Cecil Scott received 91 and Jimmy Guevara, 28, in the City election.

### SCHOOL ELECTION

In the trustee election for Winters Independent School District, Roscoe Morrison, with no opposition, was returned to Place 3 with 235 votes. Wesley Vogler was elected to Place 4, defeating incumbent R.C. Thomas, board secretary, 163 to 95 votes. Wesley M. Hays, incumbent with no opposition, received 218 votes to return to Place 5 on the board.

All trustees in Winters Independent School District elected to specified places, with no overall voting. The "places" on the school board do not represent specific geographical areas of the district.

Other members of the board of trustees of Winters ISD are Delbert Kruse, president; J.P. Dry, Gene Wheat, and Billy Joe Colburn.

Truitt Billups, incumbent member of the Runnels County School Board, for Precinct No. 2, received 145 votes to return to office.

### HOSPITAL DISTRICT

Morris Robinson was elected to the board of directors of North Runnels County Hospital District, receiving 222 votes in the Winters box and 11 in the Wingate box. Roger (Spec) Robinson also was elected to the board, with 205 in Winters and 15 in the Wingate box.

Decision of the third board member in the hospital district is still up in the air, as E.F. Albro and Hollis Dean received an equal number of votes to tie. Albro received 158 in the Winters box, and 21 in the Wingate box. Dean received 152 in the Winters box, and 27 in the Wingate box. The board was to seek an opinion from the Attorney General and seek assistance from the Runnels County Commissioners' Court in solving the tie problem, as of Wednesday morning.

### SCHOOL ELECTION

#### Wingate

Only 27 ballots were marked in the Wingate School District election. No names were printed on the ballots, and write-ins determined the outcome. Gilbert Smith received 23 votes to return to office; Jack Pritchard was returned with 20 votes; and Suvern O'Dell was elected to fill a vacancy with 13 votes.

## Another Step Toward Water

More than one hundred members of North Runnels Rural Water Supply Corporation met in the Community Center Monday evening, and unanimously approved the proposal to meet conditions set forth by the Farm Home Administration in order to obtain grants and loans with which to finance the project to supply water to a wide area.

This was the last step in obtaining the FHA loan of approximately \$337,000 and a grant of about \$307,000 for the project, LaDell Davis, chairman of the board of the corporation said.

The amounts which are expected to be approved immediately will finance the first two phases of the project, and additional requests will be made at a later date for funds to complete the entire project, Davis said.

It was understood that the money is available, and this last action by the local non-profit corporation was all that remained before final approval.

It was expected by officials of the corporation that once the grants and loans receive final approval, work should begin on the project within a short time.

## Company Okeyed For Cable TV

Texas Cablevision of San Angelo apparently has been granted an operating certificate from the Federal Communications Commission to install and operate a cable television outlet in Winters, according to Buford Baldwin, Winters City Secretary.

Texas Cablevision had obtained a franchise from the City of Winters some months ago, and had applied for a permit to operate. In a letter from the FCC within the past few days, the City of Winters was notified that the San Angelo cable company was to receive a permit, Baldwin said. The company already has acquired land on the south edge of Winters on which a tower and other equipment will be built, he said, and it is expected that work will be started within a short time to provide the cable service to Winters residents.

Baldwin said the FCC's letter pointed out that Texas Cablevision's request for a permit had been objected to by another cable television company, which for some time had held a franchise from the City of Winters, but the objection had been denied by the

FCC. A company from Brownwood had obtained a franchise some time ago, but had not acted to meet time requirements, he said. Therefore, the franchise had been withdrawn and another issued to the San Angelo company.

## Junior Hi Band To Cisco Event

Winters Junior High School Band, under the direction of Kirke McKenzie, will go to Cisco Saturday to take part in the third annual Cisco Senior Music Festival.

The Winters band, about 90 musicians, will be the only junior high school band participating in this festival.

Bands will perform against University Interscholastic League standards in concert, sight reading, solo and ensemble sections, for First and Second Division ratings.

Several high schools of the area will perform Friday, and others will play Saturday. Winters students will begin playing at 9 a.m. Saturday.

## School Board Organized

The board of trustees of Winters Independent School District was re-organized Tuesday night, following official canvass of the ballots from the election held Saturday.

Delbert Kruse was re-elected president of the board, and Billy Joe Colburn was named vice president. W. M. Hays was named secretary of the board.

Other business taken up by the board at the regular meeting Tuesday night was a review of the kindergarten program; a review of the financial report; study of student and athletic insurance; and a study of the driver education program.

The board also made further plans for construction of an administration building, and adopted a school calendar for the 1975-76 school year. The trustees also selected the firm of Eckert, Story, Ransom & Ingram of San Angelo to conduct an audit of the 1974-75 school records.

**Wallace Murray Sales Up, Net Down For Last Year**

Sales and earnings for Wallace Murray Corporation in 1974 were favorably influenced by the strength of the Illinois Gear Division and the company's Canadian operations, according to the Wallace Murray annual report to shareholders.

"These strengths partially offset major cutbacks in the building products area, a turndown in the demand for automotive components and industrial tools, and several major strikes," the report says.

Wallace Murray's board of directors elected in September

to change its U.S. accounting policy from the "First In, First Out" (FIFO) method of accounting for inventory to the "last in-first out" (LIFO) method, effecting a net income reduction for 1974 of \$7,550,000 and reducing earnings per share on a primary basis by \$2.46 and on a fully diluted basis by \$1.53.

Net income for the year amounted to \$8,094,000 compared to \$10,596,000 in 1973. Sales were \$318,594,000 versus \$295,695,000 in 1973.

Vice-chairman Mrs. Paul Gerhardt opened the business and Mrs. H.O. Abbot gave the opening prayer.

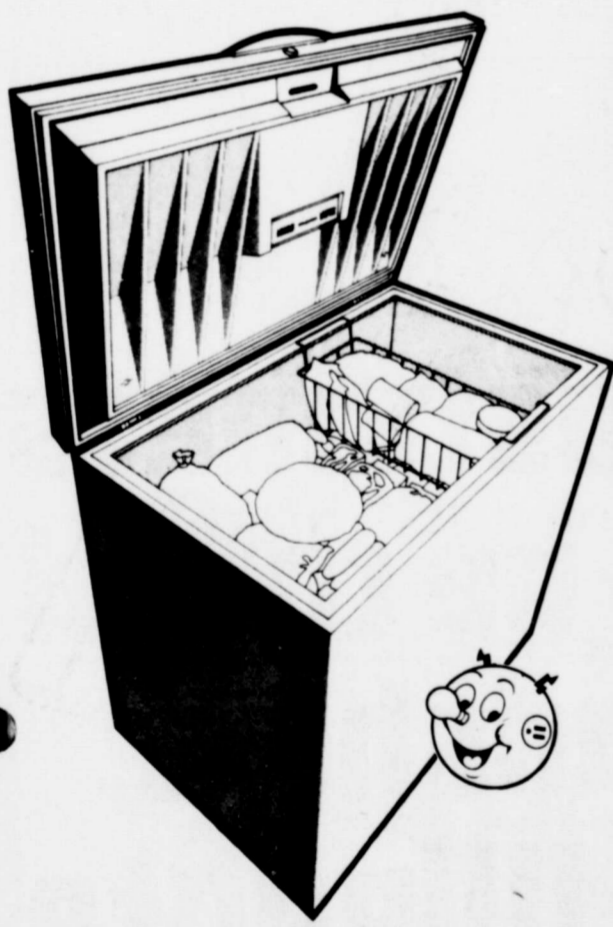
Mrs. Vada Baston gave the devotional. The program on "Faith or Fear and Future Shock" was discussed by all the members.

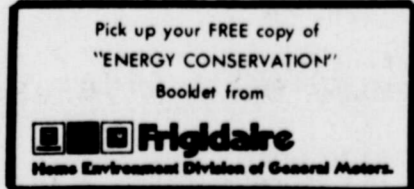

Lock in flavor: Use moisture and vapor-proof materials especially designed for freezers to wrap your foods. Tightly sealed, these lock in flavor and moisture and prevent "freezer burn" (surface drying) on foods. Don't use wax paper, bread paper or regular cellophane for freezer foods.

Label packages: Date and identify freezer packages so (1) you don't accumulate a lot of mysterious shapes and (2) you'll be able to pick out foods that have been in the freezer longest.

Take advantage of sales: Avoid overstocking with commercially frozen food that's always available; use your freezer as your own bargain counter and store foods you can buy on sale. But do allow space for short-time baked goods, leftovers and special party foods.

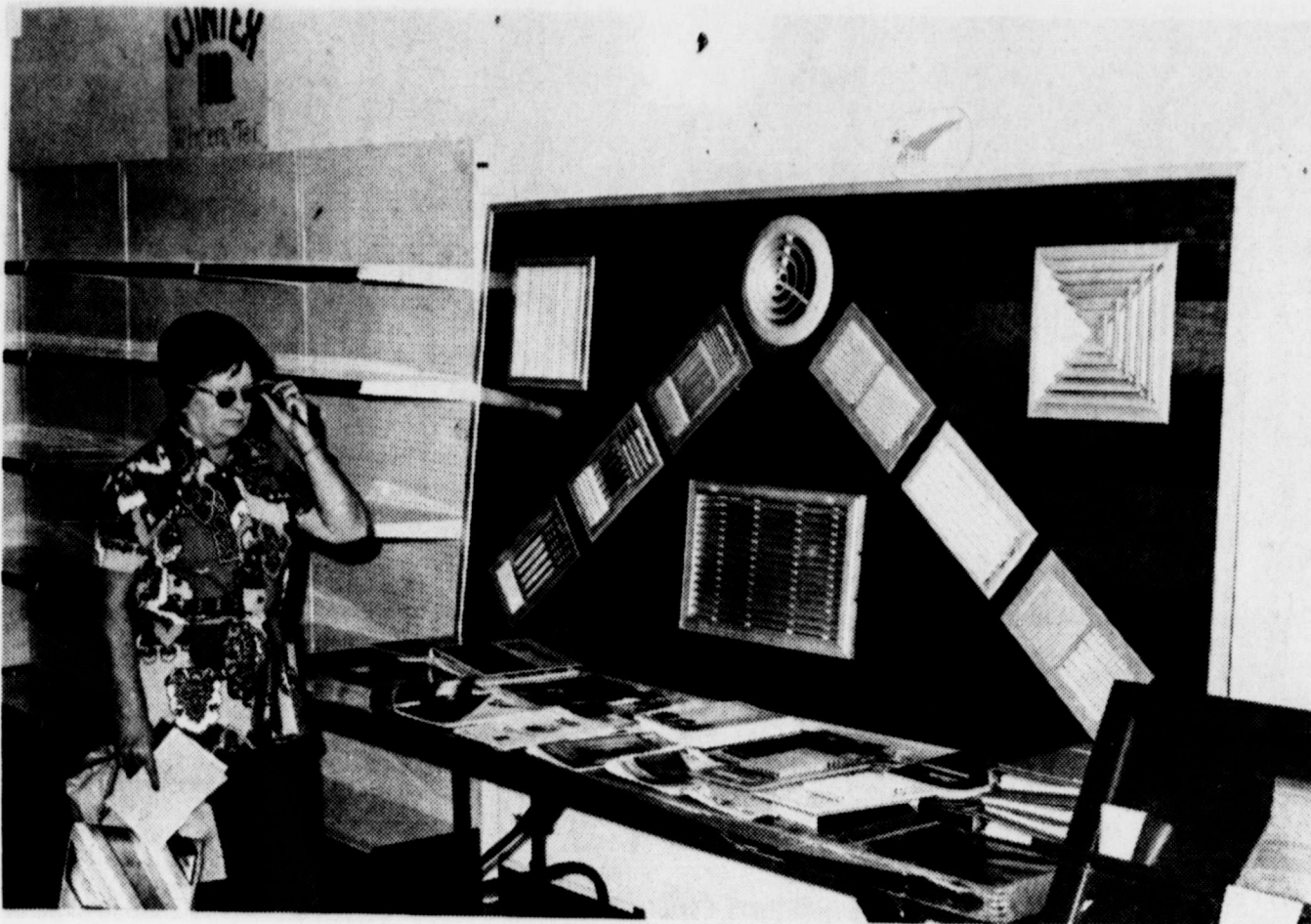

## Ocie Hunt Died Last Wednesday

Ocie Hunt, 82, longtime Nolan County Democratic leader and Sweetwater insurance agent, died at 6:30 p.m. Wednesday of last week at Simmons Memorial Hospital.

Mr. Hunt was born April 27, 1893, in Old Moro, South Taylor County, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. C.M. Hunt. He married Nell Irvin April 21, 1917, in Bradshaw.

At 17, he quit school to go to work. After training at the Bank of Bradshaw for four months, without pay, he was elected assistant cashier on his 18th birthday.

Mr. Hunt developed a correspondence school habit which remained with him for most of his life. He earned a diploma from the American Institute of Banking and took three University of Texas law courses by mail.

Later, he completed all of Air University's professional officer education courses, including the War College Extension Course. He was the first Civil Air Patrol to complete the course, the most exclusive one in the Air University curriculum.

Mr. Hunt's business career included 28 years as president of the Bank of Bradshaw (1912-1940) and formation of an insurance agency after he moved to Sweetwater in 1943. In between, he was a collector for the Internal Revenue Service in Dallas.

A Democrat, he was party chairman in Nolan County from 1950 to 1974. He was a member of Highland Heights United Methodist Church and the Odd Fellows Lodge. He also was a 32nd degree Mason and a Shriner.

Survivors include his wife; a daughter, Olivia Horn of Lubbock; a brother, Wayne of Bradshaw; two sisters, Mrs. Cozette Jones of Abilene and Miss Opal Hunt of Bradshaw, and two grandchildren.

## Foxworth-Galbraith 75th Year In Business

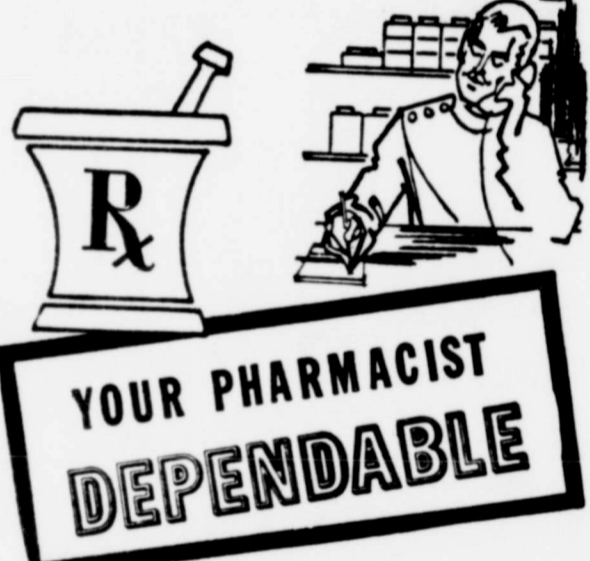
