Chamber of Commerce, said about 25 men had signed up for the contest by Tuesday noon. Monday was the first day for signing up, but those who wish to enter the contest may do so any time. The only requirement is that they be clean shaven when they sign, Mrs. Marks said.

Prizes will be offered in three categories. Both Briley and Meyers had to "begin all over again;" Briley had been wearing a moustache, and Meyers had for several months worn an Able Lincoln style beard, but shaved it off to be eligible for the contest.

City Taxes To Be Up 20%

Winters City Council Monday approved a change in the tax formula for the City of Winters which will, when adopted by ordinance, increase city taxes by 20 percent across the board. The tax rate formula was approved by voice vote Monday night at a regular meeting, but will not become official until adoption of a rate ordinance in May.

This is the first tax increase for the

City of Winters since 1961, city officials said.

Under the new formula, property valuation would be increased to 75 percent of actual value, from the present 50 percent, and the tax rate lowered from \$1.50 per hundred valuation to \$1.20 per hundred. Use of this formula would cause an increase of 20 percent overall, it was pointed out. The new rate would be effective for 1975 taxes.

Little League Officers Named

Lynn Billups was elected president of the Winters Little League Baseball Association, at a meeting held in the Winters Community Center last week. Other officers elected were Preston Barker, vice president; and Mrs. Milton Gerhart, secretary-treasurer.

Mrs. J.B. Guy Jr., was elected player agent, and Mrs. Jerre Bailey, conces-

sion stand operator.

Little League play will begin about the middle of May, association officials said. All children between the ages of 8 and 15 may pick up registration blanks from the office of the Elementary School principal, or from the High School office. Deadline for registration will be April 25.

Blizzard Band Won Sweepstakes Award

The Winters High School Blizzard Band, under direction of Kirke McKenzie, won a First Division in concert playing, and a First Division in sightreading, in the University Interscholastic League contests held in Bal-

linger Tuesday, cinching a coveted Sweepstakes Award. The Winters high school band won a First Division rating in marching last November, and the two firsts won Tuesday gave them a perfect Sweep-

stakes score.

The Brady high school band was the only other Class AA band in Tuesday's contests to win a Sweepstakes award. This is the third consecutive Sweepstakes Award for the Blizzard Band, and the fourth in five years.

Amendment Election

Voting was light in North Runnels in the special Constitutional Amendment election Tuesday, as had been anticipated for the entire state.

In the Winters box, proposition No. 1, having to do with state retirement programs, carried 127 for to 100 against. In the Wingate box, 23 voted for Amendment No. 1, and 22 against.

As had been expected in most quarters, Amendment No. 2, concerning legislators' salaries, was not approved by North Runnels voters, with 106 for and 121 against in the Winters box, and 16 for and 29 against in the Wingate box.

Street Paving To Begin June 2 Here

Paving contractors will begin paving some of Winters' streets June 2, Buford Baldwin, city secretary, said this week.

Baldwin said the City has contracted with Reece Albert, Inc., of San Angelo, for the paving, with about 15,000 square yards scheduled. Cost of the paving was to be \$1.13 per square yard, with a reduction to \$1.03 if 15,000 square yards was reached.

Several other propertyowners have indicated they would sign for paving on their streets, Baldwin said, and if they are signed up, the paving will be done during this project. Others who desire paving should contact the City Hall for information, he said.

City Operating Within Budget

In a report by Buford Baldwin, city secretary, to the City Council Monday night, it was revealed that the City of Winters is operating with the budget set last year, for the first six months of the fiscal year.

The city secretary told the Council that all department operations were within the budget. The general fund budget had been set at \$293,500 for the fiscal year; the water department, \$89,900; and the electric department, \$201,200.

There will be separate contest for children in the 1st and 2nd grade, 3rd and 4th grade, 5th and 6th grades, and the 7th grade. Silver dollar cash prizes will go to the winners, with ribbons for second and third players.

The three-leg sack race will be open to everyone. First prize for the winning team will be two silver dollars.

A greased pig chase will be open to students in the first through seventh grades, with one division for Girl Scout leaders and parents. A trophy will be awarded.

Admission will be 25 cents, for spectators and contestants alike, for the afternoon events.

Children must be five years of age by September 1, 1975, to be eligible for the kindergarten program.

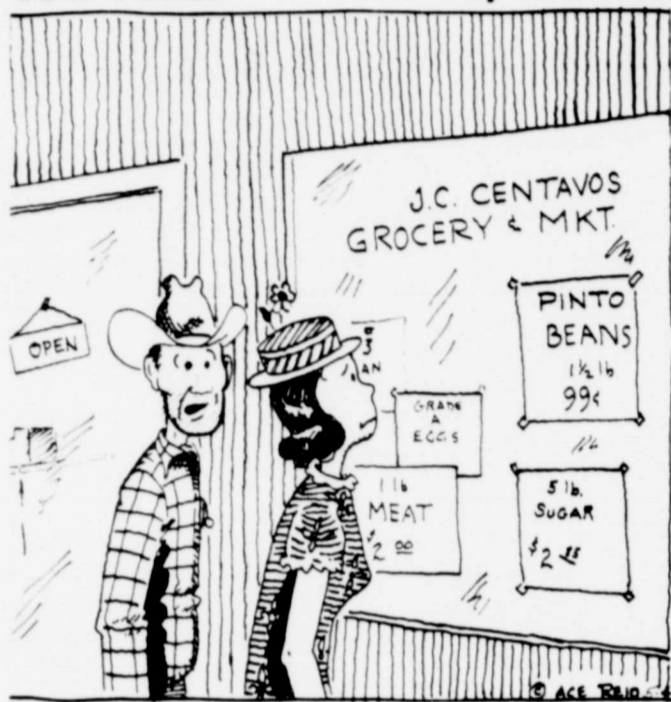

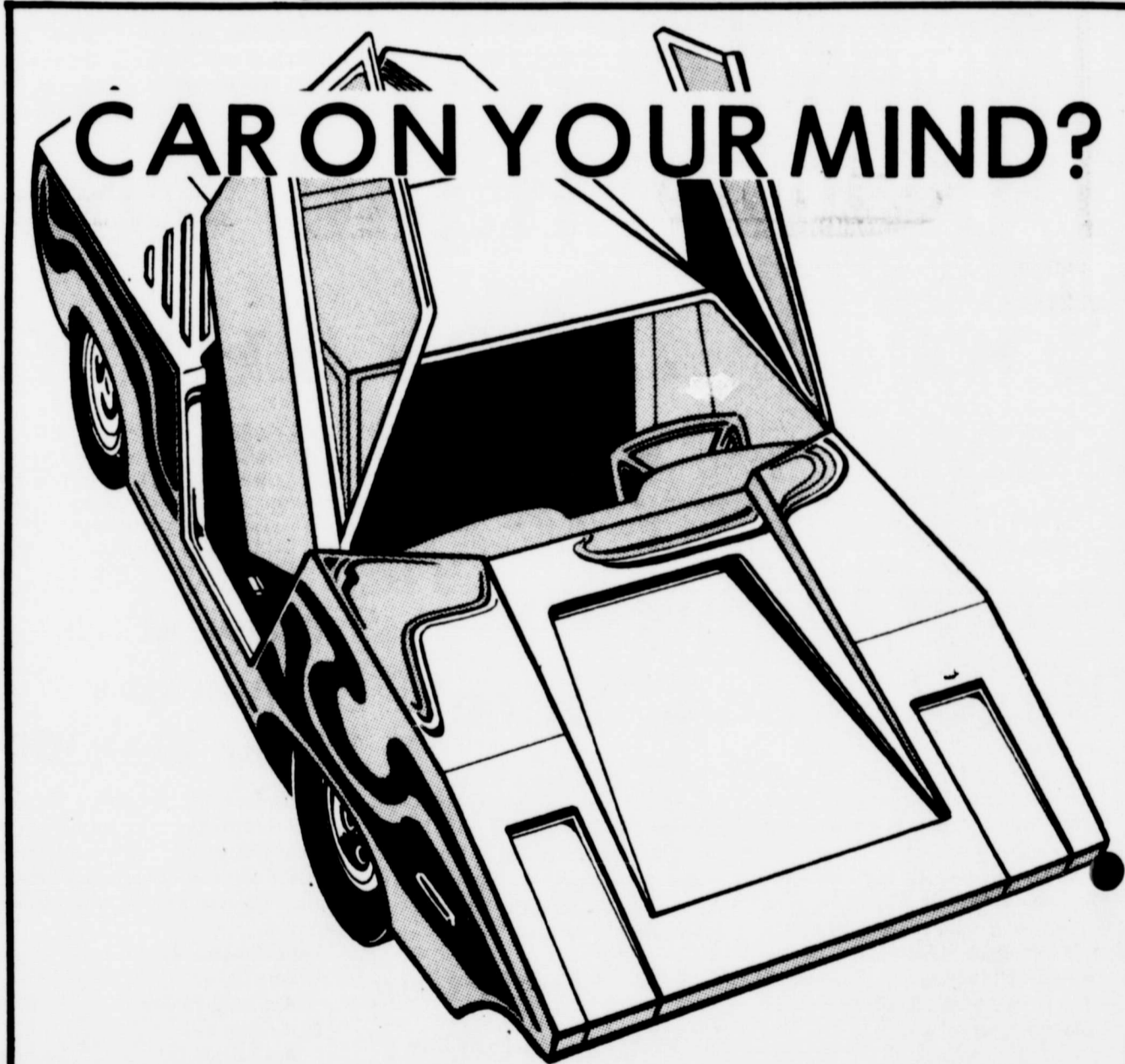

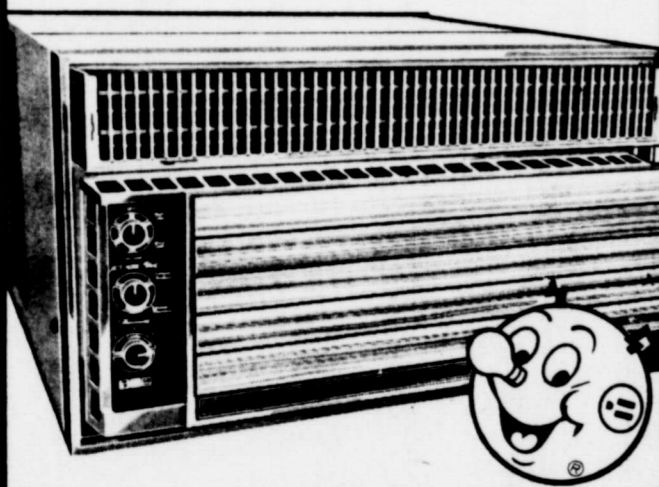

Hundred On Tour of Historic Sites

One hundred people attended the historic site tour sponsored by the Runnels County Historical Survey Committee April 20, visiting several places on the Colorado River.

The Marion Hays Ranch and the site of Waldthall townsite and school. The original two rooms of the ranch house were built in the 1870's, and later remodeled, and in 1953 Marion Hays remodeled again and used some of the lumber from the Waldthall post office and the telegraph building.

The second stop was the Old Joe B. Johnson rock house on the J.W. Little Ranch, which was built in the 1870's.

The group also visited the Bethel school building, the first consolidated school in Runnels County; the old R.A. Smith rock house on the

Woodrow Wilson Ranch; site of Pony store, gin, and school; the old Hoffman Home, originally built in 1860. The rock smoke house and cistern on the Hoffman place were built in 1864 and the house was added onto in 1906.

The touring group also visited Buffalo Bluff on the Woodrow Wilson Ranch. This beautiful bluff overlooking the Colorado River got its name from the legend that the Indians ran large herds of buffalo over the bluff where they fell several hundred feet to be killed, and later dressed by the Indians for food and hides for tents and clothing.
