Tohn opinion, released by Atty. Gen. John Hill, states that fees charged by public schools for such things as
workbooks, driver education, band workbooks, driver education, band
uniforms, laboratory supplies, and uniforms, laboratory supplies, and

unconstitutional unless the legislature specifically authorizes them.
If followed immediately, Supt. Graves indicated, the effect woul

the driver program is paid by the state the driver program is paid by the state,
but the program does not receive credit from the education foundation program.
The local schools also charge lab fees for certain classes, shop fees to cover cost of materials, and for workbooks Lions Club has for some time provided extra funds to pay for workbooks, etc. for students who cannot pay for them.) not believe that the $U$. Government should subsidize the sale of grain overseas by offering foreigners lower
interest
rates than are interest rates than are
available to Americans, I avaiable to Americans, I
believe it is necessary to
trade with other nations and trade with other nations and
we must sell them those we must sell them those
things which we produce the things which we
they want to buy.
The products that we have
which others want most ar which others want most are
agricultural. If we wish to buy from foreigners such prodio and television sets,
rader cars, etc., we must have something to sell in order to be able to pay for them. Last
year the cost of foreign year the cost of foreign
purchases of our products came to $\$ 12^{1 / 2}$ billion, or as much as we pay for imported oil. American farmers were
able, by their able, by their ability and
enterprise, to produce agri enterprise, to produce agrer
cultural products cheaper than foreign farmers do. Thus we sold three-quarters of our wheat crop, one-half, of
our soybeans, and one-quarour soybeans, and one-quar
ter of our corn, and still had enough for domestic consumption. Some people argue that such sales increase prices at home, hut this is no
necessarily the case. And it is unrealistic to think that we could buy from overseas without selling to people
overseas as well overseas as well.
