Cablevision Assured Within Few Months

Linemen began about two weeks ago stringing "strand," or support cable, in Winters for cable television service, which is expected to be available about the first of the year. Workmen have been stringing the "strand" during the weekend, when traffic has been lightest.

Frank Settle, general manager of

Texas Cablevision Co., of San Angelo, told The Enterprise some time ago that work would begin about the first of October in installing the cable, and getting other on-site equipment ready for the project. A building has been put up for the receiver-transmission equipment which will be necessary for the cable television service. A tower

will be erected soon, according to information.

Following installation of the "strand," transmission cable will be put up. The system will require about 18.5 miles of cable, offering service to about 1166 homes and business. There will be six video channels available, in addition to a weather channel.

Equipment which will be needed is being built under contract, it was said, and will require "bench testing" before installation locally.

Settle said some time ago that most viewers are expected to be "on the line" within 90-120 days after cable installation is started. Homes and businesses will be put on the line in

sections, and some in some sections of town may have the service before the rest of the installation and hookups are completed, it was understood.

Texas Cablevision Co. has a franchise with the City of Winters to provide cable television service. The franchise was obtained several months

ago, but legal technicalities prevented work being started on installation until this month, it was said.

No announcement has been made on cost to cable television service customers. However, it was expected that the company would make such an announcement within a short time.

Paving of Streets Now Completed

All planned street paving in the current project has been completed, Buford Baldwin, City Secretary, said this week.

Financing of this program has been through assessment against property owners affected, Baldwin said. Payments for the paving by individual property owners are due now, he said. Although some property owners will pay outright for the paving, others will be given an opportunity to make instalment payments, it was said.

Only 54 Bales Into Winters Warehouse

As of Tuesday morning, only 54 bales of cotton from the 1975 crop had been received by the Winters Warehouse. All had been ginned at the Wingate Gin, but most of the cotton had been produced in the Winters area, it was understood.

Only two gins are in operation in North Runnels this year, the Wingate gin and the gin at Wilmet. The Winters gin has not opened, and it is not known if it will be in operation this season.

NED Tests Will Be Given At WHS

The National Educational Development tests will be administered to all tenth graders of Winters High School Wednesday and Thursday, October 22 and 23. Mrs. Lee Harrison, guidance counselor, has announced.

Mrs. Harrison said the NEDT program is being used because it will give the school, students, and parents the type of information which will help the students make more realistic decisions concerning careers and aid the students to plan wise for future education.

"The program will reveal how well the students can apply the skills they have acquired since entering school," the counselor said. "It will help us recognize the strengths in each student's educational development, and, at the same time, will pinpoint weaknesses. This information will enable us to know how we can help a particular student while in school, and will guide us in improving our programs."

Joe Chapman With Runnels County SCS Office

The Blizzards, light, inexperienced and with little depth on the sidelines, have been taking beatings from bigger and more experienced teams, but Coach Jimmy Stubblefield expects all of them to be ready to go by Friday night.

Monday's practice session was limited to viewing the films of last Friday night's game with Hamlin, when they lost 59-8. The rest of the week will be used for regular practice, however, with much honing and shaping up in preparation for Friday's encounter with the Coahoma Bulldogs.

Winters and Coahoma have played no common opponents this season. Winters had a 2-2 record for pre-conference play, and now has a 0-2 record for district. The Bulldogs, though they won only one game in pre-conference, are leaders of the district by virtue of their 14-4 win over Colorado City, and their 15-14 squeak-by over Anson last week.

In pre-district, Winters lost to Clyde, won over Merkel, lost to Coleman, and then beat Eldorado, and in district play, lost to Ballinger and Hamlin.

Coahoma, in pre-district competition, won 13-6 over Reagan County, lost 20-0 to Post, lost 20-14 to Cisco, and lost 19-12 to McCamey.

Jake Joyce, HS Principal, Died Sunday Morning

Double funeral services were held Monday afternoon in the First United Methodist Church for B. J. (Jake) Joyce, principal of Winters High School.

Memorial services were held at 2 p.m. for the school faculty members and students. The second service, for the public, was held at 3:30 p.m.

Capacity crowds attended the two services, evidence of the respect of the entire community for this man, who was a popular and well-liked high school principal, and a civic and church worker and leader.

The Rev. Bob Lindsey, pastor of the church, officiated. Burial was in Lakeview Cemetery, under direction of Spill Funeral Home.

Classes in Winters Public Schools were dismissed at 1 p.m. Monday in memory of Mr. Joyce.

Mr. Joyce died at 5:25 a.m. Sunday at Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene after an illness of about two months. He was 57.

Mr. Joyce joined the faculty of Winters schools in 1964 as a vocational agriculture teacher. He was named principal of Winters High School a year later, succeeding Robert Christian, who had been named superintendent of schools.

Mr. Joyce was a vocational agriculture teacher at Coleman for many years before moving to Winters, and also had taught at Novice and Raymondville.

He taught at Coleman from 1945 to

1964. While in Coleman, he was named honorary Lone Star Farmer in 1950 and honorary American Farmer in 1957.

He was an incorporating officer of the Vocational Agriculture Teachers Association of Texas and served that group in many capacities. He received a Distinguished Service Award from the group in 1962.

Mr. Joyce was born Sept. 18, 1918, at Rising Star. He graduated from Rising Star High School in 1936, and from Texas A&M University in 1940.

A member of the First United Methodist Church, he served on the Council of Ministry, and was teacher of the Harvesters (couples) Sunday School Class. He was a member of Atoka Masonic Lodge at Novice.

At the time of his death, Mr. Joyce was president of the Winters Housing Authority. He was a member of the Winters Lions Club, of which he was a past secretary-treasurer. He also was a member of the Texas State Teachers Association and Texas Association of Secondary Principals.

He married Hortense Paxton, July 26, 1942, in Elkhart.

Survivors include his wife; a son, Gene of Austin; a daughter, Ann Joyce of Preston, Wash.; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John W. Joyce of Fort Worth; and a sister, Mrs. W. I. Lane of Fort Worth.

Fallbearers were Stanley Blackwell, Jerry Neely, Terrell Graves, Lee Harrison, Bill Graves, Carroll Tatom, Johnny Bob Smith and Dr. T. L. Russell.

Blizzards Lost To Hamlin 59-8

A spunky Winters Blizzard squad went to the wire Friday night, still fighting in a hopeless situation which saw the Hamlin Pied Pipers score almost at will and in every quarter, to crush the locals 59-8 in their second conference defeat of the season.

A faster, more experienced and heavier Piper bunch took advantage of every mistake made by the inexperienced Blizzards, allowing the Winters squad to cross over only one time during the evening.

In the first period, Hamlin's Delbert Thompson went 23 yards for a score, but the PAT attempt failed.

Hamlin scored three times in the second quarter, on a 47-yard pass play, on a run from five yards out, and on a 15-yard run. For the two TD's in this quarter, only two PAT's were added. Just before the first half ended,

Winters quarterback Marvin Moore went over the goal line from four yards out for a TD. He then passed to end Leroy Jones for the two extra points.

This was the one and only time the Blizzards were allowed to get on the boards, however. Hamlin got three more scores in the third, and then scored twice more in the fourth.

Leroy Jones was the leading pass receiver for the Blizzards, with 56 yards, plus 1 PAT reception.

Marvin Moore was the leading rusher for the Blizzards for the evening, with 47 yards, including the TD run.

Fleet McNeill had 28 yards in pass receptions.

Outstanding offensive Blizzards were Marvin Moore and Jeff Russell, passing and rushing; Leroy Jones, pass receptions; Doug Rogers, blocking; and Tye Rougas, blocking.

Outstanding defenders were Doug Rogers and Jack Fairey. Kent McNeill and Tye Rougas did good jobs on defensive assignments.

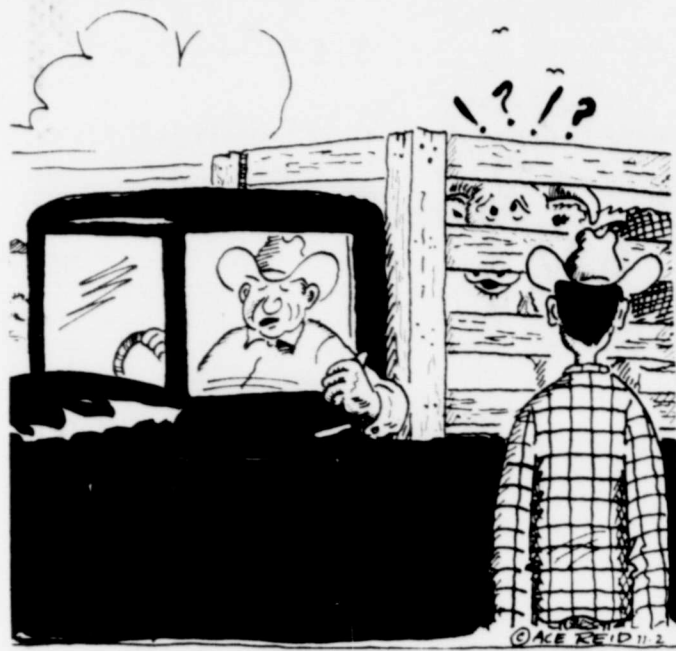
Jack Fairey received the "Big Hit" award for the evening.

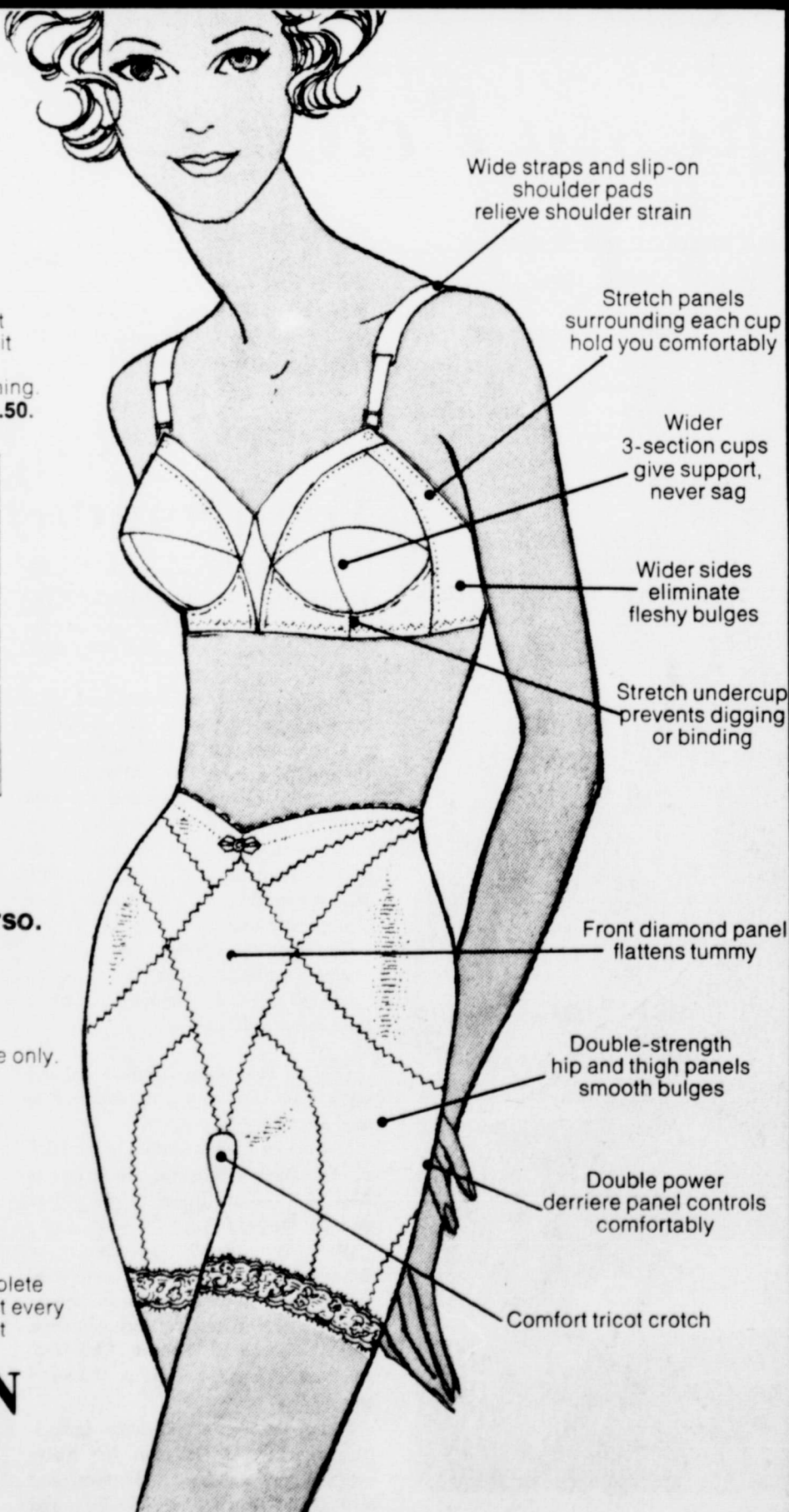

Albert L. Lewis, 63, died at 5:45 a.m. Sunday in the North Runnels Hospital. He had been admitted to the hospital less than two hours prior to his death.

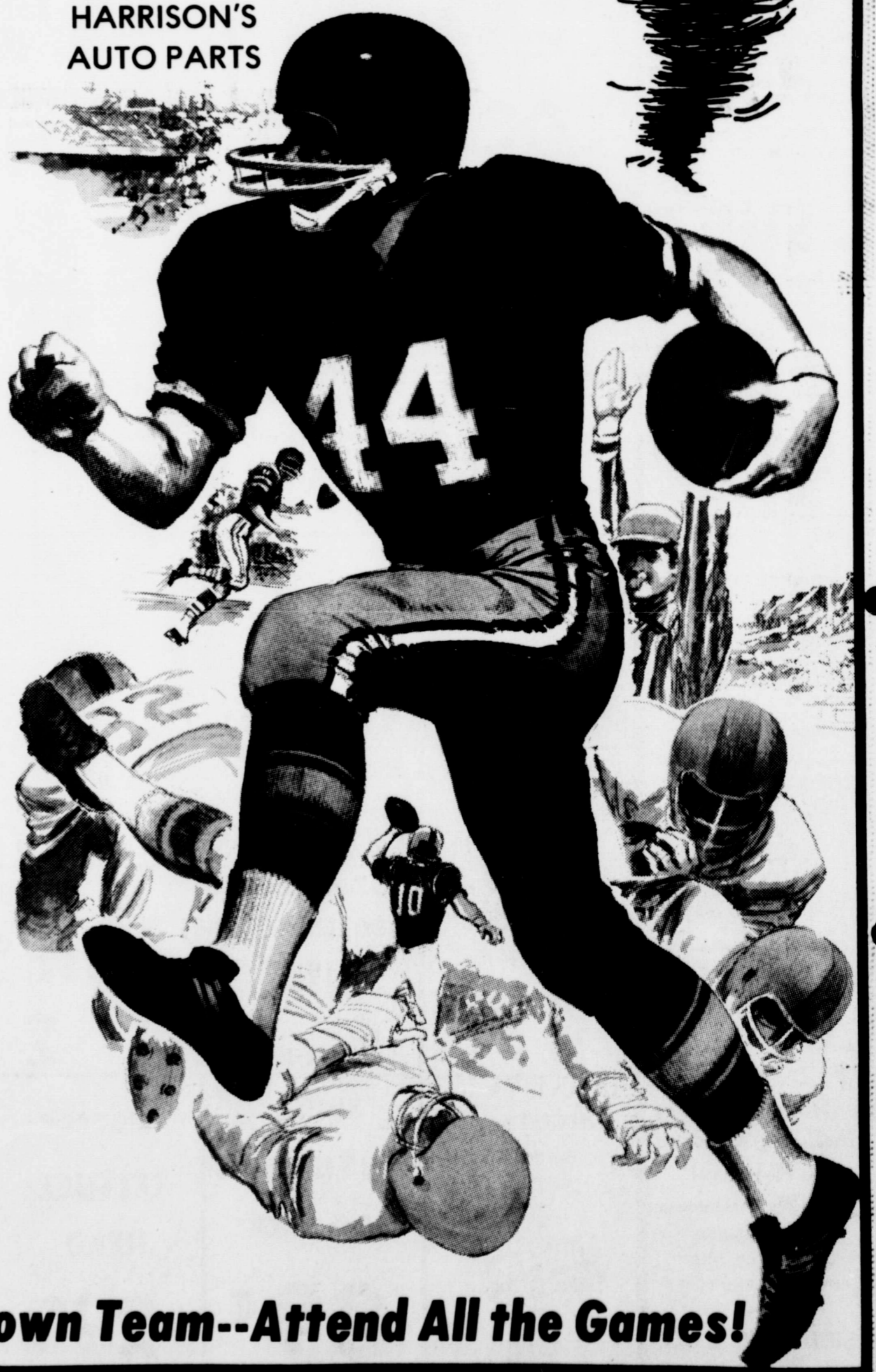

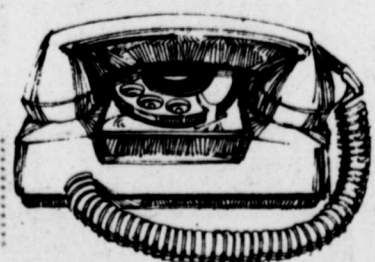
