Lawyers are great hands to indulge in reminiscences. Nearly all of them like to tell about their first lawsurt, for usually even the greatest of them began in a very small way. Gov. William I Stone gives the tollowing account ot his first lawsuit:
"As I tecall it now, my first lawsuit involved the munificent sum of 50 c . The plaintiff had done certain work for the detendant for which he rendered a bill ot $\$ 2.50$. The detendant, consid ering the charge exorbitant, re fused to pay. He was willing to pay $\$ 1$ 50, and during the negotiations, by way of compromise, he proposed to pay the plaintiff $\$ 2$. When this proposition was carre to the plaintiff he rejected it with scorn and instituted a suit before the Justice of the Peace. At firs neither party had an attorney Each attended to his own case They had torty or fifty witnesses
subpoenaed between them. The subpoenaed between them. The greater number of the winnesses were used to prove the value ot the jury trial and the detendan appealed. After the trial I was emploved by the plaintiff. By this time the accumulated costs made the case of much greater nnportance to the parties. The original diftercnce of 50 c was lost sight of in view of the large bill ot costs accrued, now amounting to $* 70$ or $* 80$. On the trial we made it appear that no actual tender of any sum had been made to the plantiff, and so I elt pretty sure -ot the costs, no matter what amount the jury gave us. However, the jury re mount claimed. The the full mount clarmed. The costs in the case exceeded $\$ 100$. The
controversy of course was absurd to the point of idiocy, but it gave me a case, \$15 in money and a world of glory. Thenceforth, hike Alexander, I was looking
