Henry E. McCulloch camp rewhich the charter was issued. Though moving to another county he continued his membership. Resolved by the re-union that paid his dues and attended the reunions and manifested great interest in the welfare of the camp. He was born in Cass county Missouri on April 9th. 1840, and moved to San Antonio. Texas, when only 10 years old and from there to Hays county about twenty miles south of Austin. After the war he engaged in the stock business up to the time of his death. His wife and four children survive him.

The two following named confederate veterans, whilst they did not join the comp, owing no doubt to their remote residence from its place of meeting, were nevertheless sympathetic in the cause and zealous in the welfare of the camp, viz: C.
