A Veteran Texan Dead.
A local paper at Austin pubiishes the following notice of Captain P. C. Thomson, who died Thursday, October 10. "He was born August 20, 1822 in Giles county, Tennessee, and 1831.

For seventy years prior to his death he was a citizen of the State, sharing all the privations and sacrifices of that trying period, when every bush was the lurking place of the savage. On January 1, 1846, he was married to Miss Mary Jane Christman the eldest daughter of Horatio Christman, one of Austin's original 300 colonists and for many y ars surveyor of that colony.
Of this marriage there was born four children, Horace A., Rector M., and Thaddeus Austin Thomson. who survive, and Francis F. who died in youth. Mrs. Thomson died in Burleson county on February 7, 1877. In December, 1879, Captain Thomson married Mis.s Isabella Matthews, the daughter of Rev. Jacob Matthews, of Washington county, who survives him.
A history of this family from 1821 to 1846 and later forms a large chapter in the history of the State. Alexander Thomson, father of Captain Thomson, conducted the colonists of Nashyille or Roberton colony into Texas in 1830. The decree of Busta pre mante had just forbidaen the urther immigration of AngloAmericans and upon Alexander om of adjusting majters so that Texas. In 1833 he was a memlexas. In 1830 he was a mem ber of the convention that me morialized Mexico for separate statehood for Texas
In 1835 he was a member of the famous consultation and enjoyed in a marked degree the confidence of his fellow citizens. He was a native of Sóuth Carolina and was born in that state in August 1785. From there he removed to Georgia, and from there to Tennessee, where he became interestod in the coloni zation of Texas.
He lived to June 1, 1863, and Hied at his home in Burleson ounty. He had a large family $f$ children, and they bore picuous parts in the early picuous parts in the early truggles of Texas. J. Captain Thomson was a consistent member of the Methodist church from early boyhood, as his father was before him. He was a Mason in high standing, tender and affectionate father and husband, a patriot, a loyal friend and model citizen. Capt. Thomson only a short while ago was the guest of his son, H. A. Thomson of this city The family have hosts of friends hroughout the west who with one accord extend deepest sym pathy.
