## Huntsville, Tex

 Dear Mr. Editor:Having been requested I will andeavor to send you a short Sam Houston Normal, and the city of Huntsville.
We had a very pleasant jour ney and were joined at almost gvery station by students coming to the Normal. It was very mteresting to note the change of he country as we left the land of the prairies and mesquites and came to the hilly and wood d land of southeastern Texas
One of the most interesting objects we saw on the road was large cotton plantation situated on the east bank of the Brazo river. It reminded me of description I had heard of the plantations of the old states. It contains several hundred acres of land and scattered over it are about twenty-five or thirty negro cabins and off to one sid is the residence of the over-seer At about 1:30 a. m we reached Phelps, a city of about fifty in habitants, and eight miles from Guntsville. Not a light could we see, but after rambin round in the dark, we finall cound a "hotel" where we stall the remainder of the night. the remainder of the night.
The next morning we rea Guntsville a short while oon.
Huntsville is situated in Walk or county between the Brazo and the Trinity rivers. It is very interesting little place mong the oldest towns in th tate, has about tenty five hun dred inhabitants
We very often take evening walks, and on either side of us are the beautiful pine trees, the *weetgum and the magnolia.
In Huntsville there are tw State institutions, the penitentiary and the Normal. There are about six hundred and ten uumber there has been for years -Gighteen were pardoned just efore Christmas, and just after Christmas thirty more came in
A few days before Christmas we visited the pen. After plac ng our names on the registe We first led inside the walls. We first went to the cells which vere about six feet in length wo single beds, one placed over the other. We then visited the various departments where they manufacture wagons, furniture machinery, hardware and cloth ag. We saw the convicts weav heir stripes, watched the cotto rom the time it left the bale un il it was woven into cloth then aw it cut and made into gar ments. They have a variety fowls and animals,-parrot,dove quail of different kinds, Mexica hogs, deer, aligator and bear
The next place we went to was the kitchen. Theinety gallons, they use four hundred pounds of mea daily, three barrels of flour and twelve bushels of meal, and for Christmas they had hundreds of pies and fruit cakes and two hundred turkeys. They have many pretty flowers and xhrubs. They also have a tibrary of several hundred mes. The convicts give con erts every Xmas and New Year aights for the benefit of the li brary.
I will now tell you something of our school.
