The New York papers report that the Health department of that city has seized as dangerous to yealth nearly two tons of go was 65. The report of the analysis of the Health Department stated that it was "an alum baking powder" containing alum and pulverized rock.

The different Health Authorities seem to have different ways of repressing the sale of bad baking powders. In England they have prosecuted the grocers under the general law and broken up the traffic. In Missouri the sale of alum baking powder is actually prohibited by Donica, fireman, drawing sixlaw. In New York they seize the unwholesome stuff and cast it into the river, without any discussion. The latter way is certainly effective.
