 At no distant futtre Texas promises to unarch at the head of the procession, not only in quantity and quality of materia products, but also in things po represented in the United States senate with greater United States senate with greater zeal andability than Texas. Senators Culberson and Bailey are toth Culberson and Bailey are both men of great ability and in the prime of life physically. These men have great careers before hy, and we can see no reason why they, or either of them nay not attain the highest hono in this giant republic. But a ew weeks ago Senator Bailey was complimented with many notices in connection with the presidency from leading news papers throughout the country and now it seems that Senator Culberson's turn is due. From far off Michigan comes the vibrant strain through the Detroit News, which rightly says that "if the National democracy is looking for a live man for presidential purposes in 1904 it can hardly begin a systematic search without encountering Senator Culberson of Texas. Culberson has come forward surprisingly for a man who has been at Washington so short a time, and, in estimating his qualities, it is, in as well to remember that he jr rived in the senate nine after his introduction to publis life, and has taken a public position there at the end of his first dozen years in politics his first dozen years in politics. It was in 1890 that he was elected attorney general of Texas, and he followed that up by landing in the governor's chair, from which he transferred himself to the senate in a campaign which ended with only three votes against him in the two houses of the legislature. Even if nothing else were known, a record like this is convincing evidence that its owner must be a man of qualities. But Culberson has other things to recommend
