## After a Vigilant Search Three Days and Nights.

MANY HOURS WITHOUT FOOD
Alone He Wandered Barefooted Over the Rough Divides of the Conchos from Monday Evening 'till Thursday Morn.
Little Varney Wilmeth, six yeari of age, strayed from the parental roof, at the Bird \& Mertz ranch, twenty-three miles west of San Angelo, Monday evening, May 19th, and had an experience of suffering, fright
and hunger that perhaps he will and hunger that perhaps he will never forget in life. For seventy hours he was lost and wandered
over rough, rocky hills, covered over rough, rocky hills, covered with cat-claw, briars, bear grass
and prickly pears, alone and prickly pears, alone, aimless What we must mavel of food. What he must have suffered, it would be impossible to describe with pen. It is enough to say that he spent three nights in the wilds, where the rattlesnake, the wolf and the catamount are known to dwell, and that many times he must have shuddered from fright at the howl of the oyotes and shrieked from pain at placing his aimless little bare foot upon one of the many thousands of cruel briars of those old mountains.
But at last he was recued, snatched as it were from the jaws of death and delivered parents, whose hearts for those three days and long, long nights must have beat in awful agony. The search was enthusiasti cally conducted by the many volunteers who nobly responded to the call for aid, and as the hours passed by the numbers hours passed by the numbers rapidly increased, until Thurs day morning, when hundreds of men. some mounted, some in buggies and hacks and some
afoot, were in the hunt, and moved abreast across the mountains like a great line of battle, sweeping every thicket, every ravine and every service before them. Day and night they searched, sleeping and eating but little, every man feeling the same deep interest as if it was his own child.
The trail was first found leading across the Bird \& Mertpasture, in the direction of the Dearing ranch on North Concho; a few tracks were found, here and there, in damp places on Brushy creek, and again on the high divide. The last track, found late Wednesday evening, was about two miles from the North Con-
cho river, near the Dearing ranch. A runner was sent at once to the divide where the great bulk of the searching party was at work, and they arrived on the grounds in time to make a daylight search. It was a lone track, yet Mr .
Wilmeth identified it as the footprint of his boy-a last little message from the lost one, written unintentionally in a soft place on the side of the rough hills by the poor wounded feet, which were drifting, God only knows where.
"Could he possibly yet be
alive," that was the question

At the signal they all started keeping a "front dress" as near as possible, and inspect ing every inch of the territory wagous brought up supply These movements were kept up with unabated zeal until afternoon Thursday, when a courier arrived on the scene bearing the joyful tidings that the little wanderer had been found safe and sound at Water Valley. He was found by J. B. Willoughby at 7 o'clock Thursday morning, about a half mile from Water Valley, as he was climbing over a ditch, almost exhausted and chilled through from the rain which had just fallen. Mr. Willoughby took him in charge and dispatched word to the On yents at once.
