## Thirty People Injured Tuesday Near Zephyr.

## ONE MAY DIE

## Three Coaches and Mail Car Go Down an Embankment.

Thirty people are more or less iujured as the result of a rail oad wreck two miles below Zephyr last night. One of these, Mrs R. M. Humphries, has her skull fractured and will probably die. The others will all likely recover.

The injured are all at the hotels or at their homes in Brownwood and are having the very best attention possible. It is thought that none are dangerously hurt except Mrs. Humphries, who will hardly recover. Her two oldest daughters are badly bruised and one has several ribs broken. While their injuries are painful thêy are not regarded as dangerous
The Humphries family were moving from Houston to Brown wood, having recently purchased a home here. The father is an aged Baptist minister and has been here about a month arranging Wove his family of a wife, four daughters and two sons. They way cost the life of the wife and mother and has injured in som may all of the family
The wreck was said by those on the train to have been due to a defective rail and to the rotton condition of the crossties on which it was placed. This rail was a short section, ten or 12 fee long, and a piece two feet long was broken smoothly out of it. It is not known whether the train that was wrecked broke it, or whether it was done by the train that passed over a half hour be-
fore. The fireman states that he and the engineer both noticed it
when the engine trucks fell into the broken place, but the truck Dr. J. W. McFarland. J. C. Weakly, B. K. Hawkins and Sena Arch Grinnan of Brownwood, were all on the train, but non of them were hurt. They rendered all assistance to the injured that could be given them, and give graphic descriptions of the ac cident. Dr. McFarland states that the accident occurred on a very poor piece of track. He says that the cries of the injured, the ap peals of the children, the blood-stained clothing, the ghastly wounds of the twenty or thirty injured and the general confusion made an indescribable scene

## NOTES

The unfortunate train was in charge of Asa Wilder, conductor Jeff Crossland, brakeman, Tom May, engineer and E. H. Vaden, fireman. The crew did everything possible for the comfort of the injured.

Deputy United States Marshall Hodges. of San Angelo, was in the smoker that went wild in the wreck. He said that the car ran into the brush about a hundred feet without turning over, breaking trees and
half mile.

How Mail Clerk Maxwell escaped alive is a mystery. His car umbled down a twenty foot enbankment and turned completely

Brakeman Jeff Crossland was in the rear of the chair car when he felt the jolt of the car in front. He jumped for the air brake and the engineer had already put it on. Before he could think of anything else he was among the wreckage. He soon got out and without paying any attention to his own cuts and bruises went to the relief of the passengers. In fact he said it was an hour before realized that he was hurt much

Rouge was so complete that not a single human being was left to tell the awful story. Ajouba Buillen is in ruins, but the loss of life at that place was not so great as at Morne Rouge. About 200 persons were killed at Ajouba Buillen, and over 400 injured, many of whom will die.
Mont Pelee has been showing signs of renewed activity for a week, but the subterranean rumblings and explosions occasioned no alarm, as the people had become accustomed to them. Early Saturday morning a sudden eruption occurred which spread terror throughout the island. A column of fire shot up from the crater of the volcano about daybreak which lighted the heavens for rundreds of miles. A few minutes later this was followed by an explosion which sent forth a gigantic stream of scalding water and mud. Morne Rouge was and whelmed in an instant, and every soul in the place perishe soul in the place perished Ajouba Buillen was struck by the river of mud and flying vol canic stones and
was left standing.
The sea became terribly agi tated when the eruption occur red and a short time afterward a tidal wave swept the whole coast. Le Carbet a village near flooded away Mont Pelee, was flooded away and many of the inhabitants drowned, After the explosion more than a mile of the coast end of the island sank into the sea.
The inhabitants of Martinique are panic stricken with fear. and they are clamoring to leave the island. They believe that the whole island is doomed to destruction, and they ore ap pealing to the governor to furjacent islands.
Basse Terre, Island of Guade oupe, French West Indies, Sep lember 2.-It has been learned from the gendarmes of the is persons were killed, 1500 injured during the last eruption of Mont Pelee. According to an official account the eruption of Aug. 30 was one of the most severe that has been experienced. Morne Rouge and a great part of Ajouba Buillen were destroyed, The zone between the river Capote and Fonds Marie Peine has been devastated. Mont Capote suffer ed severely and the hills aroun Basse Pointe were burned.
The governor of the island is arranging for the evacuation of the northern parishes and the removal of the wounded.

PR0POSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION, T0 BE SUBMitted to vote of the people on tuesday NOVEMBER, $4,1902$.
Amending Article 5, Section 2, of the Constitution of the State Amending Article 5, Section 2, of the Constitution of the State of Texas requiring all persons subject to a poll tax to have paid a
poll tax and to hold a receipt for same before they offer to vote at any election in this State and fixing the time of payment of said tax.
be it resolved by the legislature oe the state oe texas: Section 1. That Article 6 Section 2 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:
Section 2. Every male person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications, who shall have attained the age of twenty-one years and who shall be a citizen of the United States, and who shall have resided in this state one year preceding an election and the last six months within the district or county in which he offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; and every male person of foreign birth subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications, who not less than six menths before any election at which he offers to vote, shall have declared his intention to become a citizen of the United States in accordance with the Federal Naturalization Laws, United States in accordance with the Federal Naturalization Laws,
and shall have resided in this state one year next preceeding such and shall have resided in this state one year next preceeding such election and the last six months in the county in which he offers to
vote, shall also be deemed a qualified elector; and all electors shall vote, shall also be deemed a qualified elector; and all electors shall
vote in the election precinct of their residence; provided, that vote in the election precinct of their residence; provided, that electors living in unorganized county may vote at any election precinct in the county to which such county is attached for judicial purposes; and provided further, that any voter who is subject to pay poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall have paid said poll tax before he offers to vote at any election in this State and hold a receipt showing his poll tax paid before the first day of Februaty next preceding such election. Or if said voter shall have lost or misplaced said tax receipt, he shalı be entitled to vote upon making affidavit before any officer anthorized to administer oaths that such tax receipt has been lost. Such affidavit shall be made in writing and left with the judge of the election, and this provision of the Constitution shall be self-enacting without the necessity of further legislation.
Sec. 3 The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue miting this amendment to the ned vers of Texas at the next general election.
