An act to regulate elections and to prescribe penalties for its violation
Sec. 29. If a citizen, after re-
ceiving his poll tax certificate of exemption,removes to another county be may his new residence in such county by presenting his pol tax receipt or certificate of the loss of his plle a afridavit to the precinct election judge of election. that he is the identi cal person described in suc pon tak receipt or exemptio in the precinct where he to vote and has resided for the last six months in the distric or county in which he offers vote; but he shall not be allowe to vote for county or precinct officers, or in any special or iocal election confined to the limits of such precinct, unless he shall have resided for the last six months within the county in which he offers to

Sec. 30. If the county collec tor does not personally know one who apples to pay his pol tax or procures his certificate of exemption from its payment a being a resident in the precinct which such person claims as that of his residence, it shall be the duty of such collector to require proof of such residence, and if he has reason to believe that such person has stated his age. occupation, pre
cinct of his residedce, or the length of his residence in the State and county, he shall re quire proof of such statement, and if on inquiry he is satisfied that said person has swor
falsely, he shall make a momor andum of the words used such fulse statement and presen the same to the foreman of the next grand jary.
Sec. 31. The county commis sioners court shall furnish, five days before each election, and cause to be delivered in each precinct to the presiding judge of election, all necessary paper forming lists, ink, stationery, sealing wax mucilage and wooden rubber stamps required for the proper conduct of the election, all of which shall be paid for by the counts

Sec. 32. Precinct judges at all general elections shall be served with a copy of the order desig nating the number, name an bounds of the election precincts and of their appointment judges.
