Discovery Well 4 Miles West Of Carbon

Eastland county has what appears to be a new oil field after a wildcat test 4 miles northwest of Carbon near Mangum showed in completion tests. The well is the Clark P. Chandler et al, San Angelo, No 1, Ethel Hitton Coates.

Five offset locations in the same general area have already been staked.

Pay was taken from the Upper Ranger sand. The top of the sand was 3,298 feet and the bottom 3,316.

The well was sand tracked on Monday afternoon and a potential test is due to be run later in the week.

Drill site for the well is one mile southwest of Mangum in the west central part of the county.

A test was run early last week showing 18 feet of sand.

After the test was completed and allowed to set for 72 hours, completion work was begun Friday afternoon. The well was opened again Saturday morning and flowed for 20 minutes.

A five and a half inch pipe was used with ground elevation 1,512.

During the test 780 barrels of oil rose in casing and 1,360 pounds of flowing pressure was shown.

The well is located about 1,500 feet east of the first well.

Vaccination For Hog Cholera Is Urged by Agency

AUSTIN, Oct. 21. — With mid-west swine raisers again facing possible million-dollar losses this fall from hog cholera, the American Foundation for Animal Health urged farmers today to adopt proper vaccination measures.

"The fact that there are now seven types of hog cholera vaccination which have been government approved has confused many farmers," the Foundation said. "It would be a tragedy if this confusion interfered with having hogs vaccinated for protection from the nation's number one hog killer."

The choice of the proper type of vaccination is important for maximum protection, officials said. Each method has certain advantages and disadvantages depending on the local situation.

Such factors as herd history, the presence of hog cholera in the past, general herd health and other variable factors all cover into the choice of the proper vaccine. The Foundation pointed out also that vaccination at the wrong age or wrong time must be guarded against.

"Every farm and every herd is a different problem," the Foundation said. "That is why a herd owner would be wise to leave the selection of the proper type of vaccination and the proper time to vaccinate to his veterinarian."

The Foundation urged all farmers to have their pigs vaccinated this fall.

"Vaccination is the only reliable means for controlling this swine disease," officials said. "Failure to protect the herd will increase the chances for heavy losses."

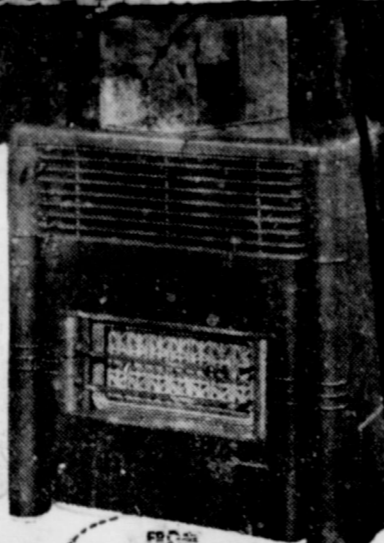

Farm Bureau Report

Directors and members of the Eastland County Farm Bureau were given reports of the state convention at their regular monthly meeting Thursday night, Nov. 12, at Eastland. President A. Z. Myrick was in charge of the meeting.

Four topics were presented by Howard Wadrian, state representative, and A. Norris, state representative, at the 20th anniversary of the Texas Farm Bureau in Mineral Wells.

Mr. Wadrian recommended the re-organization of the state and co-work with the state to help solve the immediate needs of farmers in the state.

Mr. Norris stated that the state should help solve the immediate needs of farmers in the state. He also mentioned the state's policy development and construction of roads to help solve the immediate needs of farmers in the state.

The various resolutions presented were analyzed by Mr. Myrick. He stated that regardless of differences of opinion, we still have confidence in each other and can work out our problems together.
