



How to Cook Husbands.

Add a little sugar in the form of what confectioners call "kisses" but no vinegar or pepper on any account. A little spice improves them, but it must be used with judgment. Do not try him with anything sharp to see if he is becoming tender. Stir him gently the while, lest he stay too long in the kettle and become flat and tasteless. 


