To the United Contederate Veterans:

No nation ever rose so white

and fair,

None fell so pure of crime." "This spotless fame, won by the Confederate states during its brief but brilliant career, is cherished by every true Confederate soldier, and held as dear as life. It is due to those who sacrificed their lives on the glory fields of the South, or languished and died from disease in the field, or in ginhospitable northern prisons, in defense of the right and honor of their home land, that this reputation and characterization of the shrine for which they fell shall be cherished and preserv. +d. \* \* \* Many. after surviving the rigors and dangers of four years deadly strife, and ending valorously in rebuilding the fortunes of the South. and as exemplary citizens, maintaining the dignity and honor of their sections in times of peace, have passed over the river and into the beyord. The survivors of that war are today the aged citizens of the country. When they look back on the ensanguined fields of the past, they now begin to realize that ere long there will be none of them to gather about the campfires or answer to the roll call here. They turn their eyes with unfaltering trust in the hills beyond the present, and feel that the safe keeping of the records and of those who have gone before them is in good hands."-J.W. Blackmore, in an address on the occa sion of the dedication of the Con federate monument, at Gallatin, Tenn. Sept. 13. 1903.
