This I think would be very serious aud grievous error, ery I do not think that it would be wise or business like on the part of the Council, who have secured the services and advice of a competent engineer and chemist on this subject to cas aside his recommendations and
undo what has been done. I have no word of criticism utter against our worthy alder and intend to do in securing all he water they can from Elm Creek, which I consider afford the only water fit for all pur poses for constant use, and jus as long as wholesome water can
be pumped from Elm Creek it hould hould be done.
