



The contents of the two-inch diameter peach (including the seed, as I have no way of knowing how large it is) is 2 multiplied by 2 multiplied by 2 equals 8 multiplied by .5236 equals 4.1888 cubic inches. The contents of three-inch diameter peach is 3 multiplied by 3 equals 27 multiplied by .5236 equals 14.1372 cubic inches—a difference of 9.9484 cubic inches. Therefore, it is cheaper to buy a basket of twelve three-inch diameter peaches for 60 cents.
