We pay our Negro teachers an average monthly salary of $\$ 45.00$ which they do not earn, for the very
good reason that they are incompetent to instil in a negro childs head anything except impudence and
In Brazoria county there are 30 White and 44 Negro teachers. In Fort Bend county there are 25 White and 34 Negro teachers. In Harrison county there are 54 Whites and 72 Negro teachers According to the average, the
White teachers draw $\$ 1500$ per month in Brazoria county th Negro teachers draw $\$ 1980$ per month; while in Fort Bend the
Whites draw 1250 and the Negoes $\$ 1530$ per month, and in Harrison county the Whites draw $\$ 2700$ and the Negroes $\$ 3240$ per month. Each one of these counties has a school fund of about $\$ 7.00$ per child.
