

WHITES VS NEGRO PUBLIC

We pay our White school teachers in Texas an average salary of \$50.00 per month, which they certainly earn. We pay our Negro teachers an average monthly salary of \$45.00 which they do not earn, for the very good reason that they are incompetent to instil in a negro childs head anything except impudence and a healthy aversion to honest labor.

In Brazoria county there are 30 White and 44 Negro teachers. In Fort Bend county there are 25 White and 34 Negro teachers. In Harrison county there are 54 Whites and 72 Negro teachers. According to the average, the White teachers draw \$1500 per month in Brazoria county the proposition.
