But if he was not killed and a period of 12 days has elapsed since the child was bitten, and the dog is still living, you need have no uneasiwhatever, as dogs with hydrophobia die within that time. 

WHAT BELL COUNTY GETS

From the School Fund and What Is Contributed to it.

Temple, Texas, August 13.— Bell county's portion of the State school fund this year will amount to \$56,710. there being 11,342 pupils in the county entitled to the sum of \$5 each from the fund. The amount paid into the permanent school fund in taxes by Bell county amounted to \$26,932, to which should be added \$10,500 in poll taxes, making a total paid in of \$37,432, while the handsome sum of \$56,710 will be withdrawn, a profitable inveatment for the county, since the difference in its favor amounts to \$21,277.



Be hopeful and cheerful, for your disease can be cured. Do all you are told carefully and remember that it will take a long time to get well. You may improve steadily for months, and lose it all by carelessness. Your expectoration or spittle contains germs and is dangerous to your self, your family and your neighbors. It must always be collected in the boxes, as you have been taught, and burned. Never swallow your expectoration. Do not kiss any one upon the mouth. Always wash your hands before eating. The treatment of your disease consists principally in (1) Air, (2), Rest, (3), Food. Medicine will help, but it is not so important. Therefore the cure is principally in your own hands.

1. Air. - Stay in the open air as much as you can. Do not be afraid of cold weather. Remain indoors only on very windy or very damp days. Avoid drafts, dust and dampness Never stay in a hot or close room. Keep at least one window open in your bedroom. Have a room to yourself if possible. If not' be sure to have your own bed. Wear wool next to the skin, but not too much. Never get overheated never get too chilly. Keep your feet warm and dry. Always wear rubbers in rainy weather.

2 Rest-Avoid all unnecessary exertion Sleep at least eight hours every night, and go to bed early. Never run; never get out of breath. Never lift heavy weights; never get tired. If you have to work, take every chance to rest that you can. Go

3. Food—Eat plenty of food, wholesome food. Drink at least one quart of milk a day. Eat from three to six eggs a day, and take them raw if you possibly can. Eat slowly; and avoid anything that causes indigestion. Do not drink liquor, wine, or beer. Do not smoke.

4. Medicine-Take no medicine without your physician's advice. Stop any medicine which upsets the stomach. Report regularly to your physician.

Report immediately if you have indigestion, diarrhoea, constipation, pain, increased cough or hemorrhage. If you cannot report for any reason, send word to your physician. At summer heat the rarest flowers begin to bloom, and nature becomes poetic.

In the world of art, imagination and feeling are not content with a serenity that touches the borders of indifference. The creative instinct is never effective unless at a certain pitch of enthusiasm. It is the sharp, clear, brilliant current of thought that lectrifies the brain. But an dea is worthless unless we can find a form to hold it. In the best work idea, form and feeling appear to the beholder as one. An electric bolt seems a cold thing, yet a stroke of lightning will consume more at one flash than an ordinary fire would consume in an hour.-Francis Grierson, in the Critic.






