\$500,000 LAND DEAL

The Simmons Ranch Will be Divided Into Four Thousand Small Farms.

San Antonio, Oct. 8.—"The division of the Simmons ranch in Live Oak county will put nearly 4,000 families in Southwest Texas within the next year," said J. J. Fairbanks of Denison at the new Maverick hotel yesterday. Mr. Fairbanks is on his way home from the Simmons ranch, the last part of it having been sold last Friday. The ranch has been divided into 4,200 farms, ranging in size from five acres to 640 acres. Many of the farms are small and by the method of colonization carried out a family will be placed on nearly every farm. The Simmons ranch has been for many years the property of Dr. C. F. Simmons. It is located thirty miles west of Beeville and contained 60,000 acres. The land was sold for a half million dollars.
