## ECHOES FROM THE ELECTION

### All Democratic Nominees Elected in Texas. HUGHES FOR GOVERNOR IN NEW YORK

As usual the general election in Runnels county was a tame affair, at some boxes there being hardly enough votes polled to count. At Norwood there was only seven votes polled. The Ballinger box, where there is something near six hundred voters only 214 voted. Of this number 34 voted for the Republican candidate for representative. There was only about 450 votes polled in the entire county. Of this number the Republican candidate received less than 100. In Tom Green county the Re-

publican candidate received about twenty-five per cent of the vote polled, and while all the counties in the District have not been heard from it is estimated that the Republican candidate got about 25 per cent of the vote polled. In other words the Democrat Mr. Silliman won by about three to one. The vote was light all over the state, but all Democratic nominees for State and District offices were elected.

Considerable interest was manifested in the New York Governor's race, and the latest report over the wires is that most of the Democratic ticket was elected, but Mr. Hearst the Democratic and Independent candidate for Governor was defeated by Mr. Hughes, the Republican by about 50,000 votes.

Politics are quiet now and the good people will have to start something else to keep times lively in the way of public issues.

### MORE DEER DYING

San Angelo, Texas, Nov. 5.—Reports brought here by different travelers through the section of country southwest of San Angelo, report great numbers of the different species of deer to be dying from a disease styled black tongue. The death rate is alarming, and from present indications there will be but few black tail deer in West Texas by the first of the year, unless the fatality of the contagious malady desists. One ranchman says he found seven sleek deer dead in his pasture, and several other like reports have been heard. Venison is rare food now, even in districts where deer have heretofore been plentiful. Ranchmen are afraid to kill what fat, healthy looking bucks and does that they come upon, not knowing but what these animals are afflicted with the disease in its early stage.

## OPEN SLEEPERS TO NEGRO PASSENGERS

### Pullman Representatives Surprised by Railroad Commission's Orders.

Austin, Nov. 7.—The order of  
the railroad commission which  
proposes that that body shall as-  
sume jurisdiction over the Pull-  
man company and make a hori-  
zontal reduction in its rates for  
seats and berths in Texas, came  
as a complete surprise to the rep-  
resentatives of that company in  
Texas, as well as to the railroads  
which operate its cars. It has  
been known for a long time that  
Commissioner Allison Mayfield  
favored such a proposition, but  
it had heretofore always been op-  
posed by Commissioner O. B.  
Colquitt. Chairman L. J. Storey,  
without committing himself on  
the proposition one way or the  
other, indorsed Mr. Mayfield's  
motion as being willing to set it  
down for a hearing.

Mr. Colquitt has heretofore  
contended that the Pullman com-  
pany is not a common carrier,  
would be to give the negroes the  
right to ride in sleeping cars,  
unless separate sleeping cars  
were provided for the negroes,  
which is impracticable. Mr.  
Colquitt, it is understood, has  
not receded from his position  
that the Pullman company is not  
a common carrier, but he now  
takes the position that it may be  
possible to treat its cars as part  
of the equipment of the rail-  
roads. This is a distinction  
without a difference.

If the cars are treated as part  
of the equipment of the rail-  
roads, the Pullman company  
must be considered to be a com-  
mon carrier, it is claimed by good  
attorneys. When this view is  
taken it throws the sleeping cars  
open to negroes. The hearing  
on the subject Nov. 27 promises  
to be interesting. It is supposed  
that the Pullman company will  
enter vigorous opposition to the  
railroad commission taking juris-  
diction over its service in this  
state, particularly in view of the  
fact that a big reduction in rates  
is proposed.

It may become a rule, but we  
don't believe it. And when ever  
the Pullman Company begins to  
bed negroes in the same coach  
with white people, there is going  
to be something doing in Dixie  
Land. The idea of a big nigger  
buck occupying a berth in the  
same car with ladies. Gee Whiz!
