

The new law compelling counties having 3000 schoolastic or over to maintain county superintendents marks a new era in school supervision in Texas and its supporters claim will have a strong tendency to have better 3000 scholastics the salary is fix- and where they suffered most. schools in Texas by reason of better organization and classification of the schools. Under this new law the authority of the county superintendent is extended so as to include all independents school districts below 500 scholastics; it provides that one institute must be held lasting five consecutive days in the first four months of the schoolastic year; it exempts teachers in independent school districts having more than 500 scholastics from attendance at county instutes, and provides for city institute work to be counted toward the extension of teachess certificates in cities; it provide that the county superintendent shall have an office in the county court house, and that such office shall be furnished with furniture






