In 1890, 10,000 People Resided in Eight Counties; Now Population is Estimated Conservatively at 4235,000.

RUNNELS COUNTY

In 1890, the counties of Taylor, Callahan, Shackelford, Jones. Fisher, Nolan, Runnels and Coleman produced 10,128 bales of conton. In 1900 the same counties produced 66,826 bales. In 1908 these counties produced 245,277 bales.

The population of these counties was as follows: In 1890, 10,000; in 1900, 50,556; in 1908, 239,000.

This shows an increase in assessed values of over 600 per cent during this period and while the other counties named above will hardly show as relatively large claimed that the entire eight counties will show an increase in actual value of between 400 and 500 per cent.

Austin, Texas, Oct. 8 .- The current bulletin of the State Board of Health issued today shows that more or less complete reports of twenty-one cases of pellagra have been received by the department. The cases are distributed as follows: Dublin 2, Cleburne and vicinity 2, Temple 1, Howell 1, Warren 1, Ennis 1, Austin 1, Central Texas 10.

BOARD OF HEALTH

Concerning some of the cases the reports enter extensively into discussion of the prominent symptoms, treatment and progress of the disease and other important topics pertinent to the current study of the malady.

The bulletin shows births reported to the Registrar of Vital Statistics during the months of August to the number of 4.666. Of these, 2,414 were reports of the birth of males, 2,252 of females 4,285 white, 381 blacks; 4,557 alive, 109 stillborn. The total number of deaths reported was 1,602.

GRAND JURY

Four Day's Work and Only One Indictment .- How's That for Runnels County.

To the Honorable John W. Goodwin, Judge of the 35th Judicial District of Texas.

We your grand jury empaneled for this, the October Term of your Court, beg to submit the following as our report.

We have been in session four days and have investigated all violations that have been called to our notice with the exception of a few minor offenses which we consider hardly worthy of our tended to by the different Justices of the Peace throughout the county. We find that the Justices of the Peoce are too much inclined to turn over to the District Court or grand jury for investigation matters that could be attended to in their courts.

We have returned into your court one indictment, which is for felony.

We have made a careful examination of the Court House jail. and grounds and find the same in excellent condition with the exception of some needed repairs at the jail. We would recommend that the arrangement of the jail be such that the jailor will not be forced when entering the jail to be thrown with the prisoners, as this is very inconvenient and dengerous for the jailor. We also recommend that new bedding be furnished for the jail as the bedding now used is in very bad condition. We also recommend that a bath be placed in the jail for the prisoners, which will materially aid in the betterment of the sanitary condition. We find in the jail five prisoners, one of which has received a sentence to the penitentiary at this term of court, one of which was bound over to this term to await the action of the grand jury on a felony charge and against whom no bill has been returned, one boy charged with misdemeanor laying out his fine, and two insanes, one of which is a woman. We recommend that special efforts be made to transfer these insanes to the asylum at the earliest date possible. We recommend that your nonor appoint a finance committee to report on the financial condition of the county.

In company with Esquire Weeks, this reporter inspected a lengthy stretch of road Saturday, and was greatly pleased at the excellent improvements being made. The San Angelo road, about two miles from this city, and an important piece of work 8 miles from town on the Paint Rock road, each deserve special mention.

The former bit of work consists of reducing the sheer bluff of a sudden elevation, making the road more level, and cutting ditches on each side for drainage. The purpose has been accomplished in each enterprise, and as a result farmers can haul a much greater load of products to market, or supplies homeward, on this bettered highway. The second project consists of a dump across a decided swag, with deep ditches on either side, and one strong bridge, with ample room for water passage beneath. Formerly there were four culverts in this valley, within a distance of 300 yards. Now the cost of every-other-year culverts is done away, and a road installed that will be young and full of service when this generation is old. A great deal of grading is being

done at places on these and other roads, and at some future time a fuller discussion of this sub ject will be attempted.



Advertising Airships, With \$10 Bills Attached. Serious for Aeronauts.

St. Louis, Mo., October 7.-The new 60,000 cubic foot balloon.
