GEOLOGICAL SURVEY BEGUN

Prof. Deussen With Party of Capable Assistants Left Monday for Lower Part of County to Begin Work.

Prof. Alexander Deussen, Professor of Geology at the University of Texas arrived in the city the latter part of last week and after afew days of preliminary work here, and after perfecting his plans and securing all necessary camping equipments, he and his party left Monday afternoon for the mouth of Concho river, where the work of making the Geological survey of Runnels county will egin.

Prof. Deussen will be assisted in this work by Hugo Miller a "10 graduate of the University of Texas in the department of mining and engineering. He is the son of C. S. Miller, of this city. Another assistant in this important work will be C. L. Boyer, another student of the State University.

The work of making the geological survey of the county will begin at the mouth of the Concho river and the party will work this way along the Colorado river. A compelte and thourough survey will be made by Prof. Deussen and his capable assistants. They will spend six weeks in gathering the data and in investigating the soils and stratas. When completed the survey will be of inestimable worth to the citizens of the county.
