

There are two classes of property—

With natural property we are limited in our methods of increasing values, while there are no restrictions to development through artificial property. We may gridiron the State with railroads, dot it with factories build cities and fill the valleys with har homes, but we cannot create another ac of land. The investor may come to Texas and buy land, and if he cared to do so, can sell it later and leave State, with all the property he brought into the State, but the investor who builds railroads, factories, irrigating canals, etc., cannot take that back with him, and he has established permanent



FARM EXPERIMENTS.

Boston Advertiser.

Sir Oliver Lödge in 1908 car- sorts. ried on experiments on a large scale, testing what has become known as the Lemstrom method. In Britton, England, he strung thin wires 30 feet apart on high tension insulators over a 10-acre field. The system of conductors was connected with a generator supplying positive electricity a something like 100,000 volts.

The power required to gener ate the electricity was small, for although the potential was high the quantity was insignificant and the energy was consequently trival. The electricity was gen erated by a two-horse power en gine driving a motor which furnished a current about three amperes at 220 volts.

He found an increase of from 30 to 40 per cent in wheat and an improvement in quality. Strawberries increased 35 per cent. ripened earlier and contained more sugar than the untreated plants. It was shut off at night and found useless on poor soils.

The Massachusetts experiment station has carried on various electrical experiments and obtained an increase in weight of radishes over the normal of 55.98 per cent and in roots of 65.67 per

ADVISE TO GET BUSY.

Get busy and raise hogs is about as good advice as this paper can give to to farmer readers and it therefore advises such action. There are not enough hogs in the country to supply demands and the demand is increasing so rapidly that it will require more than a year of lively breeding to put the hog supply of the country on a level with the demand for pork products. That being true, it follows that hog prices will continue so high that there will be money in the business.

Illinois is short on hogs this year Indiana is short. Iowa is short and Missouri and Kansas, Nebraska, Ohio and Minnesota are all short the number of hogs in some of the states named being nearly 50 per cent less than at this time a year ago, and this is in the face of increased population and an increased demand for pork products.—Ft. Worth Star Telegram
