



JUDGE POINDEXTER ON THE CONVENTION

Following is Judge Poindexter's opinion of some of the phases of the work of the State Convention in recent session at Galveston as taken from the Cleburne Enterprise, which said paper published a lengthy interview from the Judge in its issue of Saturday, August 13th.

"I assume that the indorsement of Governor Campbell's administration is as strong as could be obtained under the circumstances.

"Yes, I was opposed to the ninth plank of the platform and especially to the part which assumes to dictate to the legislature now in session, what it shall do, and when it should adjourn, and voted to strike it out. The language involved the statement of no principle, the convention had no jurisdiction over the subject and the declaration, in my opinion, was unfortuaite.

"As every one knows, I was and am in favor of the quart law. the daylight law and the law inhibiting the drinking of liquor on the premises where sold, pending in the legislature, as thousands of Democrats are, and as all Democrats ought to be, and I believed and yet believe that the legislature ought to have been left to act upon these measures free from interference of the convention.

"With these exceptions, the platform, as far as it goes, will meet the approval of all good Democrats. Of course I would like to hav eseen a strong plank in the platform recommending reform in the procedure of our courts, and also one condemning the improper use of money in our Democratic primaries. These reforms will come at some time in the future."

Santa Fe Hog Exhibit Draws Large Crowd. Authorities o Hogs Lecture on Hog Culture

The "squealer special," hog demonstration train run by the Santa Fe, reached Ballinger Tuesday at noon in charge of Garrett A. Dobbins, colinization agent and Tom Frazier of Morgan, a successful hog grower.

The train was stopped on the siding near the depot and many farmers visited the car and inspected the fine hogs, and at two o'clock heard Mr. Frazier lecture on "hog culture." The hogs exhibited were used to illustrate to the farmers the kind of hogs to raise to meet the demands of the packing houses.

Mr. Dobbins made a short talk and explained to the farmers something about what kind of hogs the packers wanted, and said the hogs they were exhibiting were furnished by the packers of Fort Worth as samples of the hogs best suited for sale. Mr. Dobbins said they had visited more than thirty towns on the trip. They started at Longview and made a trip down through East Texas, and out on this branch of the Santa Fe, and judging from the interest that was being manifested along the road much improvement would be made in hog raising, better hogs and more hogs being raised.
