The season opened with the High School team on the diamond, and the boys have been giving the fans full value for their money.

The Winters High School team came down last Saturday with their colors flying, but returned with their banner dragging in the dust, all because they failed to send a man around the diamond. For nine long innings the Winters Highs tried to score, while the Ballinger Highs galloped around the diamond to the tune of 21 scores. The one-sided game, was due to the many errors made by the Winters team and the splendid slab work of the local artist, Willard Wooden, coupled together with the superb and errorless backing of his teammates. The game was not what it should have been, because the Winters team seemed to be discouraged from the time that Wooden for the locals sounded out a three base hit on the first ball tossed over the plate. The Winters boys can play better ball and will no doubt redeem themselves.

**The Has Beens Vs Ballinger H's.**  
A game that created considerable interest among the local fans was pulled off Tuesday between the old ball players and the Ballinger High School team, and demonstrated very clearly that the old "Has Beens" could not come back. ## SANTA ANNA WOMEN BREAK BOOZE BOTTLES

This afternoon when a man by the name of J. D. Brown, accompanied by another man from Brownwood, signed for a shipment of 450 pint bottles of "booze" at the freight office in Santa Anna, Sheriff Futch, who had an eye on the shipment, stepped up and took charge of the cargo, and Brown and his companion drove away in the direction of Brownwood. The booze was taken up town and within a very few moments some fifty or seventy five ladies appeared on the streets and proceeded to "smash" the bottles on the pavement. The incident was very orderly, but nevertheless created considerable excitement in the lit city of Santa Anna.

Office John Chapman of Brownwood figured conspicuously in the taking of the booze and his example of a few days ago was followed by the Coleman county officials except that Sheriff Futch allowed the ladies of the town to do the "smashing act." Mr. Chapman had expected that the booze would be brought to Brownwood by private conveyance and was determined to spill it upon the streets when found, but the ladies of Santa Anna assisted by Sheriff Futch, cheated him out of this pleasure. He is not greatly displeased, however, because, he don't care for such tasks unless absolutely necessary.

That local "boot-leggers" have been bringing whiskey into Brownwood, by private conveyances from near-by stations is a well known fact to the officers, but they were hardly prepared to receive such a shipment. The low prices prevailing last week at Ballinger, probably had something to do with this.

A telephone message from the Bulletin correspondent at Santa Anna says the incident caused considerable excitement, because it was something entirely new.—Brownwood Bulletin.

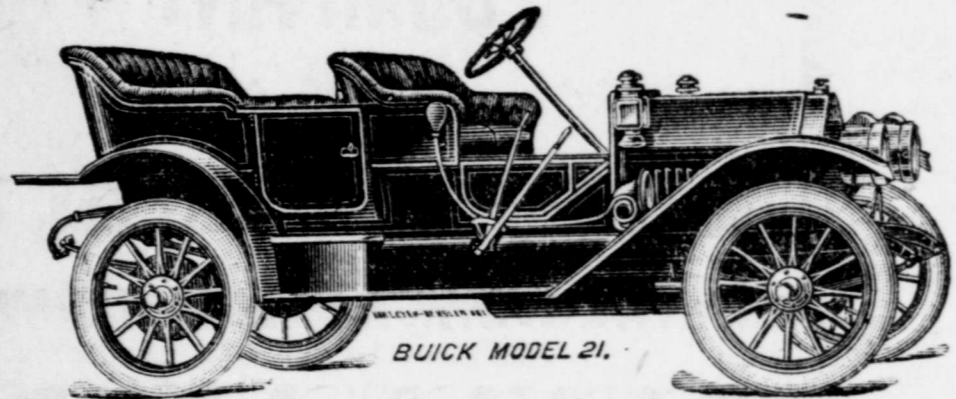

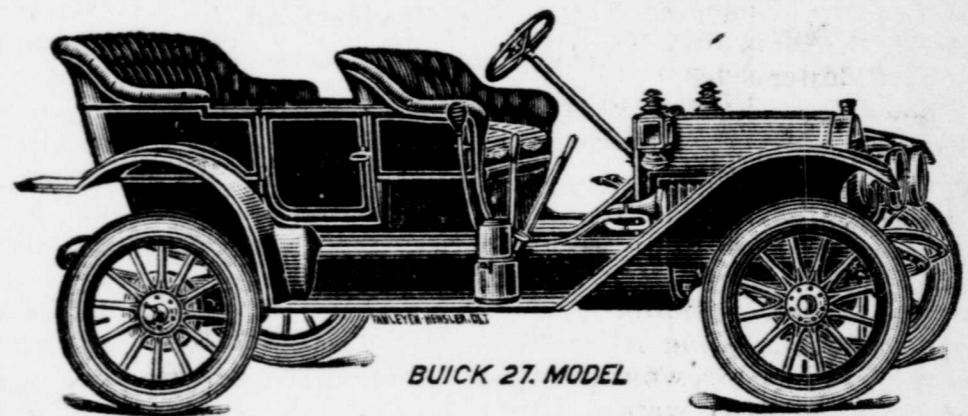

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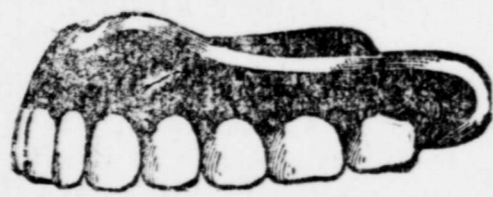

## CAP YOUR GRAIN WHEN YOU SHOCK IT.

In conversation with A. H. Van Pelt this week, he suggested that because of the amount of rain that had been falling this spring that in all probability wet weather would prevail during harvest and that in order to keep the grain from sprouting, that when shocked it should also be capped. This is done by placing something like a dozen bundles together, then breaking down two bundles and placing them over the heads of the grain that is shocked together, placing them at right angles across each other. These caps can be removed when rain falls so that the heads may dry and then placed on again when the sun dries out the shock.

This plan is followed out in the Middle states where it rains during harvest time.

**SUGGESTIONS TO FARMERS.**

We suggest that you do not have your crop too thick. One good stalk of corn or cotton will produce more than two poor stalks. When your corn is fifteen inches high, the small hair-like roots will almost meet between the rows. You should therefore cultivate as nearly level as possible. If you go deeper than two inches, you will cut thousands of these roots and greatly damage your crop. Use a sweep or a very short toothed harrow that is narrow enough to go well between the rows. Pull all weak plants, and destroy all suckers and weeds. These parasites suck the life blood from a plant, just as vermin do from stock.

Plants like animals must have a balanced ration with an abundance of nutritious food, if you expect the best results. The larger the plant, the more food it will need to assist it in its life work of producing and perfecting its crop. It is a very great mistake to lay by and leave the crop when it is one-half or two-thirds grown, and allow it to live on short rations, fight dry weather, suckers and weeds at the most vital period in its career.

To get the best and most profitable results, shallow mulch cultivation should continue until the grain and cotton are fully matured. If it is possible to do so, well rotted manure, cotton seed meal or any other good fertilizers that are easily soluble, should be spread between the rows of corn and cotton and worked into the soft top mulch a short time before the crop begins to fruit. A cotton seed planter with fertilizer attachment set to run very shallow, does this work fairly well, or you can do it by hand.

If you cannot apply these fertilizers you certainly can destroy the suckers, weeds and weak plants, and by constant shallow mulch cultivation, keep the earth from cracking and thereby conserve its moisture, warding off to a great extent the damaging effects of hot winds and a dry season. The dryer it is, the more unpromising things seem to be, the greater necessity for constant work. Keep the weeds down,

suckers out, the top of the earth soft, and you will raise a crop any way.

Guard against damage to land from washing, by terracing and contour plowing, going around rather than up and down a slope. HENRY EXALL, Pres. Texas Industrial Congress.
