CHAS. R. MILLER.

The death of Chas. R. Miller, resident of Houston, occurred at 2 o'clock yesterday morning in St. Mary's infirmary at Galveston where he went about three weeks ago to recuperate from a long lingering illness.

Mr. Miller was born in Martins burg, W. Va., Dec. 7, 1855, his parents being Norman B. Miller and Juliet B. Miller (nee Briscoe.) He was a descendant from the old Puritan stock of the New England States on his father's side and related on his mother's side to many of the prominent and historic families of the Virginias and Maryland. Mr. Miller came to Texas at the age of 21 years and settled in Galveston. About four years later he married to Miss Helen James Crosson, daughter of Judge J. M. Cros son, an East Texas jurist.

Mr. Miller was a successful merchant for many years, but for the past few years had been engaged in the cotton business, mak ing Houston his home. He is survived by his widow, three sons, James C. Miller, Charles R. Miller and Thomas B. Miller; three daughters, Helen James, Francis Elsie and Vera Cordelia; two brothers, Francis C. Miller of Ballinger and J. II. Miller of Washington, D. C., and one sister Mrs. Elizabeth M. Gassaway of Maryland. He was a member of the United Commercial Travelers the Weedmen and the Masonic orders of Livingston.

The funeral cortege left Galveston at 1:25 o'clock yesterday afternoon accompanied by Mrs. Miller and daughter Miss Helen, Mr. and Mrs. F. C. Miller of Ballinger, Mrs. C. S. McCartney of Brownwood, Mr. and Mrs. C. R. Miller Jr. of Brownwood and J. C. Miller of San Benito. The body was met at the depot by the Settegast-Kopf company and con veyed to the family residence, 3505 Louisiana street from which address the funeral will take place at 10 o'clock this morning.
