Yet King Cotton still reigns supreme, moving a half billion dollars of gold from the European vaults to America, and routing its strongest competitors in value of staple products per acre by \$11.60. Cotton produced a farm value of \$24.97 per acre, and corn its nearest rival, \$13.37.

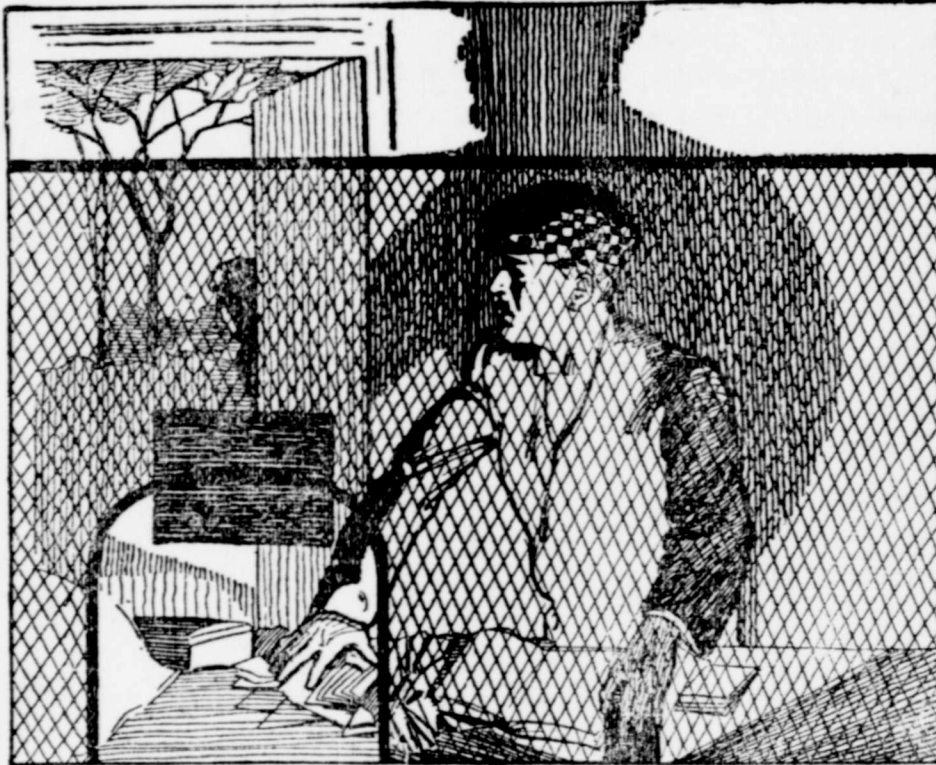

What Do You Know About This.

Dury LaPrelle arrived home this morning from an extended trip over hit trade territory in the west. He states that except in the San Angelo country, the west is not yet suffering for rain though the grasshoppers are pretty bad in some sections out there. He tells of a grasshopper fence which they have found absolutely effective, and which is very inexpensive and easy to construct. The hoppers are not the flying kind, and do not hop very far.

The barrier consists of a board five or six inches high, with a three-inch strip nailed flat on top, projecting on the side from which the hoppers approach the field. He says this simple barrier is entirely effective, and not one out of a thousand grasshoppers ever get over it. After they bank up thickly against the board the farmers come along with torches and burn them. Mr. LaPrelle states that the lumbermen in the infected section are loaning the material to the farmers for the construction of these simple grasshopper fences.—Temple Telegram.

Hill and a number of others who live near Hill School house on your list? Better look up the term vicinity, or people who do not know you might question your veracity. The article was afterwards presented to all on the list 78, except Edgar McQueen, I did not have the paper with me when I saw him, I told him what we were doing and he authorized me to write his name on the list in the presence of Mr. Hopgood. When he sends Bryan after the calves he gets busy at once and brings them in, when he sends Teddy after the calves he runs and jumps and makes such a noise that he turns the calves the other way, when he sends Debs after the calves, Debs true to his party name sits on his haunches and growls.

Mr. Lemmons says in his book "Evils of Socialism" I want the reader to note that the very foundation of Socialism is infidelity and Darwinism. Mr. Lemmons quotes from a long list of recognized leaders to prove his statement. Here is one from J. H. Moore in his "Universal Kinship," p. 107-

And Mr. Lemmons adds, "When I say this is the doctrine of all the main leaders of the Socialist party from Karl Mark down the line through Chas. H. Kerr, Wayland, Col. Dick Maple of the Rip-Saw, Clark and others I speak the truth.

I will now quote from K. Lamity's Harpoon, a paper published at Austin, Texas, under the date March 1912: "That Socialism as a theory or party has absolutely "nothing to do with religion," I am firmly convinced. I have received hundreds of letters from Socialists from all over the United States and even from Foreign lands, and almost without exception the writers are atheists, agnostics or infidels—usually the former—and many absolutely deny the existence of any Supreme Power and brand religion as a "myth or fable."

Socialists covet that which belongs to others, Paul says covetousness is idolatry. Col. 3:5. "Woe unto them that covet fields and take them by violence, Micah 2:1, 2. "A good man leaveth an inheritance to his children's children. Prov. 13:22

Jesus hit the Socialist a hard lick on dividing property when he said: "One of the company said unto him, Master, speak unto my brother that he divide the inheritance with me And he said, man, who made me a judge or a divider over you? The first serious proposition to raise the Titanic has come. It is calculated that, counting the ship and contents \$25,000,000 went down when the iceberg hit it done its deadly work. If the ship could be raised, most of this would be saved, for besides the hull, the staterooms of the wealthy passengers would give up rich treasures of jewels and much money.

A New York engineer calculates that the work of raising could be done for \$1,000,000; perhaps more than that would be required, but \$2,000,000 is an outside calculation, which would leave more than \$20,000,000 a salvage for the passengers and the ship's company. This sum is worth working for.

Where the Titanic went down the water is said to be two miles deep, and that is a way down to fish for anything. But the promoters of the raising scheme contend that because of the increasing density of the water the vessel did not go to the bottom, but it suspended in the water only as far down as her weight could overcome the resistance. If this should be true it would make the proposed raising an entire matter. In the first place, there would not be so much depth to overcome, and in second place the hull would not have to be pulled out of a detaining bed of mud and rock at the bottom of the sea.

The plan under consideration is much as the one first proposed for the Maine. Immense rafts or barges are to be floated around the spot, and these are to be furnished with quantities of the largest and most lofty magnetic

grappling hooks that are made.

With these hooks, fastened by cables chains to the barges, it is proposed to literally "fish" for the sunken hulk. Once the magnetized hook get a magnet-grip on the steel body, the barges will start, drawing the cables taut, and lifting the ship to the surface where pumping engines will be immediately set to work to ball her out to floating weight. And with that the job will be done, the miracle will wrought.

To the prosaic and academic mind the plan sounds like a fairy tale ingeniously contrived, but to the promoters and their enthusiastic friends it is all quiet within the pale of probability. No body can positively assert its feasibility or infeasibility: it will have to be tried to prove its

### BULLETIN ON HIGHER EDUCATION IN TEXAS.

For Free Distribution.

The Educational Campaign Committee of the Hog Organization, composed of F. M. Bralley, State Superintendent of Public Instruction and Executive Secretary, Austin, Texas; President W. B. Bizzell of the College of Industrial Arts, Dean Charles Puryear of the Agricultural and Mechanical College, President S. E. Mezes of the University of Texas, President R. B. Cousins of the West Texas State Normal College, President S. B. Brooks of Baylor University, and Lee Clark, General Agent of the Conference for Education in Texas, has published for free distribution a bulletin on "The State Institutions of Higher Education in Texas, Their Past Services, Future Possibilities and Present Financial Condition."

The bulletin shows what the people may reasonably expect of the State institutions of higher education, what these schools are now doing, and what they could do under the more favorable condition of proper financial support; and discusses the needs of the State's institutions of higher education.

Our institutions of higher education should prepare men and women for the most useful citizen, for efficiency in the various occupations, industrial and otherwise they should apply technical learning to the various resources of business and philanthropy; they should contribute to the sum of human knowledge, offering State through extension lectures and correspondence courses.

To accommodate the needs of the student body, which exceeds 3,000 annually in all departments, and to serve Texas in the largest and most useful way, the University should have a larger teaching force, more buildings, better equipment, and additional courses of instruction. It is conservatively estimated that an increase of 50 percent in the University's income would increase many times the efficiency of the institution, extending its benefits to increase numbers of loyal Texans.

Texas needs, at the Agricultural and Mechanical College, where the number of students has increased from 500 to 1126 within the past five years, several new buildings and additional instructors, in order that efficiency may be increased along technological line and that is the institution may perform in duty to the people.

Likewise the College of Industrial Arts and the four State Normal Schools should be provided with additional buildings, new departments, more teachers, additional dormitory and laboratory facilities to meet present demand. It is also shown that the private, endowed and denominational schools have rendered invaluable service to the state, and that they are rightly entitled to adequate support.

The discussion closes with diagram and tables of statistics of the following fourteen leading States with respect to their institutions of higher education: Tex., Illinois, Ohio, Missouri, Michigan, Indiana, California, Wisconsin, Iowa, Minnesota, Kansas, Nebraska, Colorado, and North Dakota. Of these fourteen States, Texas ranks third in population; but in the financial support of higher education, the following interesting comparisons indicate the rank of Texas: Total income, 13th; income per inhabitant, 14th; income per \$1,000 property, 12th; income per student, 14th; income from State tax and appropriation 10th; income from other sources, including tuition fees, 9th; teachers per 100 students, 14th; value of buildings 8th. Our institutions of higher education should be made as good as the best.

### Items of Interest to Home Mission Workers.

#### Our Policy for 1912.

1. Diligence in carrying forward the Forward Movement slogan: "Double Our Membership; Double Our Offerings."
2. An earnest effort to team with each other in this effort to save America to save the world."
3. Girdle the earth with our prayer for the coming of Christ's Kingdom.
4. Wipe out every standing financial obligation on our buildings, and by systematic collections prevent borrowing money for current expenses.

The Missionary Council at the April meeting adopted a definite policy for the use of the Conference half of dues. It may be used, 1st. For conference expenses. 2nd. Deaconess and missionary scholarships. 3rd. Connectional enterprises and other work approved by Woman's Missionary Council. 4th. Enterprising missions, approved by Executive Committees of Conference Society, with the approval of the Council. 5th. Salaries of workers where communities cannot assume same; workers to be approved by the Woman's Missionary Council. 6th. Permanent investment in approved city mission enterprises; two-thirds of the purchase price on building fund having been secured, a promise of a refund being made to the conference Society for the return of these grants in the event of fire, tornado or war. 7th. These grants to be made due in the annual meeting of the Conference Society; in an emergency by Conference Executive Committee. 8th. A report of these grants shall be signed by the President, Corresponding Secretary and Treasurer of Conference Society.

"It has been said that The Kingdom of God is a collective conception involving the whole social life of man. It is not a matter of getting individuals to heaven, but of transforming the life of earth into the harmony of heaven." "The social service is one of the most important and practical problems that our missionary society must help to solve. There is not a community so small or a city so large, that some things in social service is not practical and applicable. We recommend that the Fourth Vice-President of the Conference and auxiliaries urge the members of our Missionary Societies to affiliate with all organizations that have for their purpose civic improvement, with Humane societies, and other bodies that are working to prevent evil and temptations, and that where there are no organizations, we take the initiative and invite other women of the community to join with us in this work."

### WILL GUARD "CITADEL"

#### REPUBLICAN BLUFF AT REDUCING TARIFF IS AMUSING.

People Indulge in False Hopes if They Imagine the Wool Manufacturers Are in Any Danger of That Sort.

Because the Republican members of the house ways and means committee have introduced a bill which purports to reduce the tariff on wool and woolsens, we are not necessarily to assume that the leopard has changed his spots.

The wool schedule has been denounced by President Taft on several occasions as absolutely indefensible. It is absolutely indefensible because its authors pretended to revise its tax rates downward, but in fact marked them up; because it taxes coarse and cheap goods much higher than fine and costly goods, and because it was notoriously written by agents of the wool growers of the west acting in collusion with the wool manufacturers of the east.

When this infamy was under way in 1909 Nelson W. Aldrich warned the standpatters of the senate that "the wool schedule is the very citadel of the protective system and to reduce that schedule is to destroy the whole system." The wool schedule is the citadel of the protective system because in that measure are centered and combined the selfish interests of agricultural states and the selfish interests of manufacturing states. It bribes the farmer to connive with the mill owner.

The reason why the protective system would be destroyed if this schedule were to be substantially reduced is found in the fact that any truly remedial legislation would be certain to cut off the plunder of the big shepherds of the west and in that case turn the farmers against the tariff generally. For many years it has been the votes of farmers rather than the votes of so-called protected labor that have perpetuated our tariffs of extortion.

These things being true, let no one take it for granted that there has been any change of heart on the part of the Republican members of the ways and means committee. It is against reason to suppose that any Republican tariff bill contemplates a reduction of taxation, no matter what its authors may say. It is flying in the face of all the probabilities to assume that a Republican tariff bill presented in a presidential year is intended to cut off one cent of plunder from the most unconscionable conspiracy in restraint of trade that ever has existed. It is the extreme of ignorance and gullibility to accept in good faith a pretense that is belied by the records of forty years.—St. Louis Republic.

#### More Binding.

Out upon such wild vagaries. The colonel is a good Republican, and the proof that he is going to abide by the verdict of the Chicago convention is furnished by himself.

Hasn't he said that he would accept that verdict?—New York Herald.

Sure. But has the colonel any objections to making an affidavit this time—as a mere formality, of course?

#### Worth Some Consideration.

There are at least two factions in Wall street, and George W. Perkins is a spokesman for one. Is he priming Mr. Roosevelt? If Mr. Roosevelt is nominated at Chicago will Mr. Perkins be the voice behind the candidate in the latter's deliverances about trusts? And if Mr. Roosevelt is returned to the White House will Mr. Perkins be the power behind the throne in shaping the trust recommendations to congress? The two men think alike on the subject.

#### Taxing Wealth.

What militant Democracy can accomplish is shown by the vote in the house of representatives on the bill taxing incomes of partnerships and individuals. Every Democrat recorded himself in its favor, and only forty-one Republicans, nearly all of them from the far east, ventured to vote against it.

Yet this measure was fought to the last by the principal leaders and newspapers of the Republican party. To judge by the expressions of the usual spokesmen for plutocracy and privilege, no Republican in good standing would favor it. When it came to the test, however, only 41 out of 162 stood fast.

This bill taxes property and substance, not need and use. It makes wealth pay, not poverty. It levies on abundance rather than on scarcity. Some day the principle which it embodies will prevail everywhere.

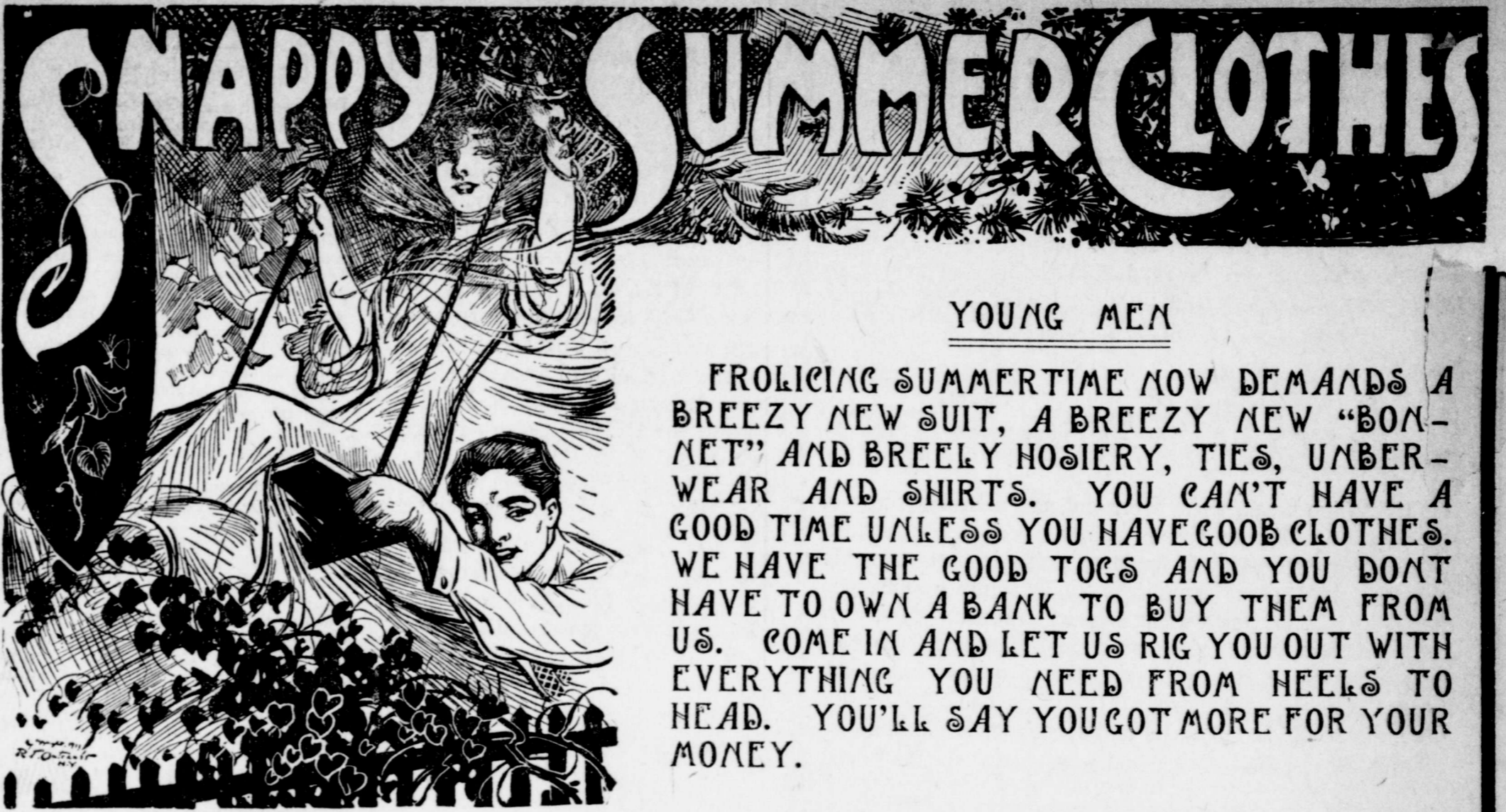

The Training school for Nurses is a fixture and will grow from year to year, thus fitting young ladies for a useful and lucrative calling.

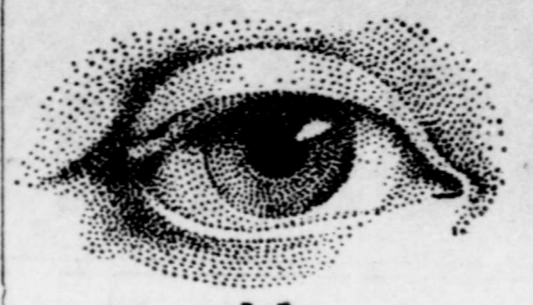
Mrs Grace, nee Miss Estella Underwood, is here visiting home folks, she is now living at Shreveport La., and likes that quaint old city very much.

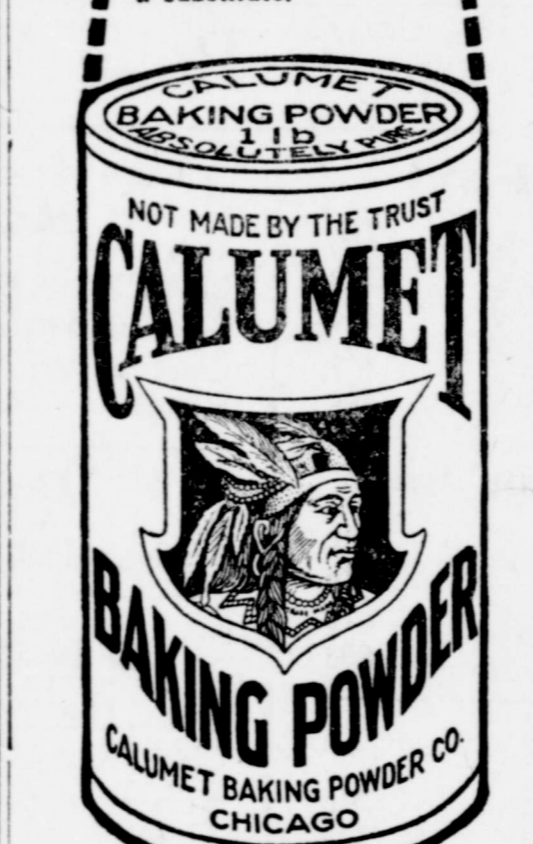
